
As soon as a date for groundbreaking is set, we will let you know via email, phone, announcement, etc. Please be anticipating that announcement as we hope you can be present for this celebration!

SANCTUARY REFRESH & WORSHIP TIME CHANGE

The work for which Pastor Paul Hoffman was retained is also coming to fruition as we anticipate a refreshment of our worship spaces. The details of this work were presented to Council and Worship Committee as well as during Table Talk gatherings.

In summary, we will be moving the primary worship space to the main floor of the sanctuary. The current (raised) chancel area will become a chapel area for small services, personal reflection, prayer, and meditation. Pews will be replaced by worship chairs to allow for flexible seating, meaning we will be able to set up the worship space in different configurations depending on our needs. We will also have



the option of setting the sanctuary space as it is currently for larger worship services. The current asbestos backed flooring will be replaced as a part of the deferred maintenance work.

On November 26th, we anticipate a move of Luther Memorial's worship time, as we will begin sharing sanctuary space with Harbor Church.

On November 26, 2017, Harbor Church will begin worshiping in the sanctuary at 9am. The Luther Memorial congregation will worship at 10:30am.

Vicar's Voice

Recently, I was asked why the Lutheran church was celebrating and commemorating someone who was overtly anti-Semitic. There is no easy response to this question as that is the reality of who Martin Luther was. So, why do we celebrate Martin Luther? Sure, Martin Luther had many unbecoming qualities, anti-Semitism, sexist for most of his life, and a potty mouth. It is important to name and claim these realities of Luther so that we are aware of who started the movement for the Lutheran church to exist. Always keeping in mind the unbecoming qualities, we must also acknowledge the qualities Luther had to get us to this 500 year celebration. Luther noticed the systemic issues at play within the Catholic church and refused to sit by idly as the Catholic church took advantage of others. It was never Luther's intention to form his own church or create a massive divide between the Catholics and future Protestants rather he was attempting to reform his church from the inside out. Is it commendable that Luther noticed those who were beaten down by the church and refused to stay silent on their behalf. He translated the Bible and Mass into the common language, spoke out against indulgences, and challenged the church's structure. Overall, Luther was attempting to make the church more accessible so that all may have faith and be able to articulate it in their own language.

So, as we launch into this 500th year since the reformation may we always remember that we were formed out of protest. Luther noticed, listened, and acted which we can learn a major lesson from him today. May we always follow Luther's footsteps in the ways of speaking out on the behalf of those who are downtrodden by systems and never fear standing up to unjust systems. This 500th anniversary gives me the energy and faith to believe that our church still has a lot of life left. Our church has come a long way since Luther first nailed the 95 theses on the Wittenberg doors and we can keep reforming just as Luther. Yes, Luther had unbecoming qualities that we must acknowledge but let us not forget the impact he had on creating a church where all could participate. It is my hope that this 500th anniversary inspires you to find the capacity to reform just as Luther did. Let us celebrate the work of Luther and follow in his footsteps to strive for a church where all can participate. We shall not stop at this 500th anniversary but allow it to kick start us into the next 500 years of reformation.

ELCA Prayer Ventures



Evangelical Lutheran Church in America God's work. Our hands.

1 All Saints Day Today we remember and honor saints, martyrs and loved ones who have gone before us and made country, we pray the Spirit of God will guide our church an impact on our lives, the church and history. Pray for people who mourn the loss of someone they love or value that they find healing through the support given by friends, family and faith communities, and comfort from faith in Jesus' victory over death and the promise of eternal life.

2 National American Indian Heritage Month We give thanks for the gifts and witness of American Indian and Alaska Native members of the ELCA, 30 native congregations, new ministries and the work of the American Indian and Alaska Native Lutheran Association, all grounded in reconciliation and the mutual building up of the saints – people of all backgrounds, tribes, regions, communities, congregations and unique needs.

3 Pray for relief and recovery from the widespread destruction caused by recent hurricanes and storms across the Gulf Coast and Southeastern states, Puerto Rico, Haiti, the Dominican Republic, the U.S. Virgin Islands and other locations in the Caribbean. Pray our concern translates into actions, gifts, support and empathy for people and communities engaged in the long, hard and sometimes discouraging work of rebuilding and recovery.

4 Remember in prayer the young adults serving in the Young Adults in Global Mission program in Australia and their coordinators, the Rev. Kim Crawford and the Rev. Henry Martinez, that God will bless and further their witness and service alongside leaders of the Lutheran Church of Australia.

5 Ask God for clarity in discerning which leaders, teachers and prophets to trust and listen to, for the wisdom to know whom to follow and emulate as humble, disciples of Christ and to know that we have one teacher who is unfailing and trustworthy in leading us in God's ways and truth – the Messiah, Jesus Christ.

6 Give thanks that our church believes that cultural, ethnic and racial differences should be seen and celebrated as what God intends them to be - blessings rather than means of oppression and discrimination – and pray for courage and self-reflection to face and change the uncomfortable things within ourselves, culture and society that selectively 1997, and ask God to deepen our partnership and bless our cause suffering and harm of others.

These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the church.

7 On this day when elections are taking place across our and members in defending human dignity, standing with poor and powerless people, advocating justice, working for peace and caring for the earth in the processes and structures of society.

8 When we experience criticism or oppression for our faith and living from the gospel, pray for renewed faith and trust in God's light and truth that lifts our spirit and encourages us forward as bold disciples serving our neighbor and sharing the good news of Jesus Christ.

9 We remember in our prayers leaders gathered for the ELCA Church Council, that they are inspired and led by the Spirit in all they do and in helping our church pursue and keep before us God's work in the world.

10 Though our celebration of the Reformation may seem marked in time and history, we ask God to help our church to be always open to change, growth and reform centered in Scripture and the gospel for the sake of doing God's work in the world.

11 Veterans Day While war and conflict between nations and people are unfortunate aspects of our human nature and weakness, we pray God will continue to reveal and shine a light on God's paths and ways of peace, justice, reconciliation and mutual concern. Give thanks and recognition for the sacrifice of men, women and young adults who choose to serve - and have served in the past our country in pursuit of global peace, justice and the wellbeing of all God's people.

12 Pray that every aspect of our life in the present is influenced and guided by our faith and God's word, making us determined and equipped to serve our neighbor and share the gospel now.

13 Pray for the people and communities recovering from the strong earthquakes in Mexico, and ask God to guide the work and partnerships of Lutheran Disaster Response and our ecumenical partners accompanying people during this time of loss and rebuilding.

14 Remember and give thanks for the United Church of Christ, a full communion partner with the ELCA since work together sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor.

15 In our striving for wisdom, we ask God to instill in us a lifelong desire and openness to studying God's word and learning and to help us become wise yet humble teachers, leaders and examples in our congregation and community.

16 Pray for the members, congregations and leaders of the Caribbean and Florida-Bahamas synods facing the long-term process of rebuilding and caring for storm-ravaged communities and people who have experienced great loss and ongoing challenges. Ask God to strengthen and sustain them for supporting one another, reaching out to and caring for neighbors, sharing hope and witnessing to God's enduring love and presence.

17 Pray the Spirit will stir in us a love of telling our children, grandchildren, family, friends, coworkers, strangers and the world stories of the wondrous things God has done.

18 We remember in our prayers people who are homeless or on the verge of becoming homeless, praying they find safe shelter and that our congregations are caring communities assisting people with housing, food, employment and services necessary for daily life while respecting their dignity and desire to be self-sufficient.

19 Pray we are not consumed with maintaining the status quo, defending institutions to preserve comfort or familiarity, or hiding the resources God has entrusted to us but that we freely use our blessings and assets and take risks for the sake of mission, service, witness and purposeful change.

20 Give thanks for the faithful work and witness of ELCA missionaries Lucas Peters (Thailand), the Rev. Eric and the Rev. Wendolyn Trozzo (Malaysia), the Rev. Jeffrey Truscott (Singapore) and the Rev. Suk Yeon Lee (South Korea).

23 *Thanksgiving Day* God is good, loving and generous, providing abundantly for humankind and all living things. Give thanks for the blessings that sustain us, and pray we are generous in sharing our resources, shelter, food, care and hospitality with our neighbor.

24 Lift up in prayer people who serve a role in planting, tending, growing, harvesting, transporting and preparing the food that sustains us and gives us joy, and pray for renewed commitment to doing everything possible to eliminate hunger in the world.

25 Our lives are fleeting and fragile. Give thanks to God for the life we have and the days we are blessed with, and pray we live each day mindful of and driven by our baptismal journey of faith, service, witness and compassion for our neighbor.

26 We pray we treat one another, especially people living in the margins of society or in contexts removed from our daily experience of life, with the same love, concern and mercy God has shown us.

27 Give thanks and praise to God for always being our strength and refuge, our hope and joy.

28 Pray for God to deepen our faith and reveal to us daily the power, glory and love we have come to know in the risen Christ, Lord of the church, creation and universe.

29 We remember in our prayers the Network of ELCA Colleges and Universities, a collaboration of the ELCA churchwide organization and our 26 colleges and universities dedicated to the freedom of inquiry and the development of the whole person in body, mind and spirit.

30 Andrew, Apostle Andrew dropped his fishing net and familiar livelihood to follow Jesus. Ask God to help us discern what we can drop or reprioritize for the sake of following Jesus as a disciple, servant and witness to the gospel that others may believe and follow too.

For years I have been a regular reader of the Seattle Times Obituary pages. One Sunday in October, I recognized the name of a woman who was in elementary school when I was a member at Prince of Peace in Shoreline. I didn't know her well, but I did know her parents and siblings. My heart hurt for them. My heart was also filled with gratitude as I

remembered how important her father, Dr. Andy Haug, had been in encouraging me as I was being formed for pastoral ministry. Dr. Haug was one of many at Prince of Peace that welcomed me as a young person and encouraged me to pursue God's call. When the time came for me to head off to Seminary, I did so knowing not only that Prince of Peace committed to paying a portion of my tuition, they were cheering me on. Seminary was not an easy journey for me and there were times when I seriously questioned whether I was fit for the calling. It made a huge difference for me to know that, in spite of my challenges, I had a company of people who continued to believe in me. I could always count on Dr. Haug's full-oflife smile and hearty handshake when I returned home during my breaks. I needed this encouragement to continue.

Who are the people who have cheered you on in your journey of faith? Who are the people that continued to believe in you and affirm you - even in times of uncertainty? Who are those faithful folks who saw to it that there was a church, a place for you to grow more deeply in your relationship with God? People whose own generosity of time and talent undergirded a congregation in which you learned about the power of God's grace, the joy of loving your neighbor, and the teaching of scripture that gifted you with a way to make sense of this complicated world?

These are the people - the Dr. Haugs of the world - that we want to express our gratitude to as we enter into our Capital Campaign titled, BECAUSE OF YOU! Because of you, Dr. Haug, I have had a rich and blessed ministry of serving the church you taught me to love. Because of you, Kim and I will be offering up a financial gift to be sure that the legacy of grace and love for neighbor continues. It is about giving because we have received far more from the church than we will ever be able to return.

Kim's own story is shaped by the many faithful people at University Lutheran who encouraged her to become a leader. They were there for her when as a young person she began to do youth ministry. They made it possible for her to attend the Lutheran World Federation meeting in Dar es Salaam They modeled for her what it meant to welcome refugee families from Southeast Asia, which later in life would inspire us to adopt a child.

BECAUSE OF YOU! is a wonderful way for those of us who love this church to offer a gift of gratitude in appreciation of those who have passed the faith on to us. It is a way for us to invest in the future.

We hope to raise 3 million dollars which we, as a Synod, will leverage to continue to help support the cost of seminary education, just as Prince of Peace helped me. We will also use the monies for strengthening renewing congregations. Finally, we will support our new ministry starts who are focused on reaching people who otherwise would not know what it means to experience life through the lenses of our Lutheran faith.

In today's world we call this, "Pay it Forward." Because of you, we will.

Operation Brown Bag

Lunches are handed out Monday-Friday, 10 am—Noon to anyone who is hungry. Our volunteers try very hard to have a well-rounded sack lunch for this program.

The following items are typical of what goes into the sack lunches:

- **Proteins** Small can of Vienna sausage or tuna or a tuna or chicken salad lunch/ cracker kit. Must be able to be opened without a can opener.
- Fruit Fruit cup, applesauce, raisins, or fruit leather.
- Drink Juice box, or pouch. Additional bottle of water , when available.
- Dessert Pudding cup or small pack of cookies.
- Grains Small bag of chips or package of crackers, and/or a granola bar.
- **Care Items** Currently (winter/cold weather season) we hand out handwarmers, gloves, and hats, if we have them available.

What is the AmazonSmile Foundation?

The AmazonSmile Foundation is a 501(c)(3) private foundation created by Amazon to administer the AmazonSmile program. All donation amounts generated by the AmazonSmile program are remitted to the AmazonSmile Foundation. In turn, the AmazonSmile Foundation donates those amounts to the charitable organizations selected by our customers.
