#### **Annual Meeting**



#### **HOUSING UPDATES**

The purchase and sale agreement voted on and approved by the congregation in 2016 closed on December 14<sup>th</sup>. Construction began almost immediately, although a formal groundbreaking won't happen until after the first of the year.

The pace of the work is brisk, even for this holiday season, and changes almost daily. As of this writing, the property is fenced off, making the parking lot inaccessible. There is plenty of street parking, or empty lots to buildings not currently in use may also be utilized.



The main access to the building is now on the Greenwood Ave. side. The keypad located there utilizes the same code that worked previously. For emergency use or ramp access, there is a small walkway accessible from the Foss Parking lot to the south. Please do not park there! We have negotiated use of the spaces immediately south of the sanctuary **on Sunday only for the use of our folks with mobility challenges.** 

Asbestos abatement work has begun in the kitchen and fellowship hall area. It is tented off and barricaded. Please do not go beyond the barricades. It is a construction area and at this point, a hazardous materials area.

# Social Justice

The separation of church and state is fundamentally embedded in the founding documents of our nation. Most clergy and lay leaders respect this secular truth. For the most part no pastor would ever tell her congregation how to vote though they may have strong personal opinions about a candidate or issue. The pulpit endows a sacred trust which simultaneously creates a delicate tension. Together as a church, we are called to be in the world and yet, to not be of it. What does this mean exactly? To many it is simpler to avoid politics altogether. That is the safe route. The risky route is the way of the prophet. The prophets going back to Old Testament times made their living in the delicate tension between church and state. The prophet looks at the human made social structures through the lens of God's Creative vision. The prophet points out the distance between human made vision and God's vision and calls society back; repent!

We live in divisive times, which should be an indicator that we are distant from God's Kingdom. It is not a time to despair though. It is a time for God's people to step into the tension and to ask ourselves how we are in but not of the world. These are also times of a widening gap between rich and poor. How do we as a church respond?

What is Social Justice? For most Christian congregations Social Justice is practiced in programmatic ways, a few line items in the Annual Budget and a basket in the Narthex for contributions to the local Food Bank. To be sure, these are worthwhile endeavors and Luther Memorial has a strong history of caring for our neighbors. Helping Hands and the Lunch Program are just a couple of ways we respond to need. During the AIDS crisis many congregations provided soup or blankets to the dying. Prison ministry is particularly strong in Evangelical circles. To reiterate, these are ministries that remain necessary. One does not have to travel very far in Seattle to see the signs of a growing homelessness crisis. Luther Memorial has courageously taken a first step toward relief of this crisis. Nevertheless, the need continues to grow, and it begs the question, why? Why are so many people forced out of their homes and into their cars, or worse, onto the street? What is our duty not only as citizens but as people baptized into the Kingdom? I cannot help but hear these words ringing in our 21<sup>st</sup> century ears;" None calleth for justice, nor any pleadeth for truth: they trust in vanity, and speak lies; they conceive mischief, and bring forth iniquity." (Isaiah 59:4.) What does this mean to a disciple of Christ?

I write this during Advent, our traditional time of preparation for the Coming of Christ the King. I am reminded of Gabriel's visit to Mary and her prayer of Thanksgiving. In the Magnificat we hear God's answer through Mary. Isn't that God's way though? To answer the cries of the people through us? These are my questions, and I don't presume to think I know the answer. Yet I believe these are questions we need to be asking ourselves as a congregation.

Hold onto your seat, The Gospel is a revolutionary manifesto and the implications of that

for the people of God are deeply earthshaking. We are called to be more than "band-aids". We are called to advocacy on behalf of the hungry poor and to challenge the powerful. We are a congregation that is not afraid of risky endeavors. The evidence of that will soon be rising on our former parking lot. 59 families will be housed soon. But we've just begun to understand that perhaps the Gospel is impelling us to examine our response to the thousands who suffer from institutional inequities that will remain on the streets or in their cars. It's too easy to say they deserve their fate. Our foundation in faith calls us beyond that. It calls us into the delicate tension.

In February we will be introduced to Advocacy 101 presented by our siblings at Faith Action Network. Vicar Laura will be sharing more on this ecumenical organization committed to not only asking why but taking the next step of what. What can we do? It is our intention to expand the discussion beyond bricks and mortar. Now that we've done something significant are we able to retreat into our comfort zone? Or are we being asked to step out further. I think the Gospel answers that for us already. I encourage all to be a part of this discussion during the February 4th First Sunday Faith Forum.

## Vicar's Voice

I am often asked, "Why do you want to be a pastor?" It is a key question that we, as seminarians, are expected to expertly articulate and sometimes that some amazing progress in recent years but there is still can be a struggle! That is a big question which often holds many years of discernment and stories. While there are many answers to this question, there is one answer that finds its way into my response consistently. While I was growing up there was no church leadership that looked or identified like me. As the church is changing and morphing into something new I feel called to be a part of that change in the leadership of the church by adding more diversity to the pulpits so that no other child grows up wondering if they have a place in the church.

In seminary, call stories are shared repeatedly, and it comes to the point that you could almost tell your classmates story by heart. A central theme appeared in many call stories, becoming a leader in ministry because they, like me, grew up seeing no one who looked like them in church leadership. The folks who shared this as a part of their call story, myself included, are those who the church had kept on the fringes and sometimes still does.

The discussion of the poor, oppressed, forgotten, and neglected happened often in seminary as a result of these call stories and the central theme of Jesus' ministry. Many of us are called to ministry because we were on the fringes and Jesus came to minister to those on the fringes. There are many reasons why I feel called to notice the poor, oppressed, forgotten, and neglected as Jesus calls us to do but the main reason is that I have personally felt the sting of oppression. As an openly queer person, I have lived in states where I could be fired for being Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex, or Asexual (LGBTQIA+), arrested in bathrooms, and denied services at a restaurant. It was not until recently that the LGBTQIA+ community was granted the privilege to legally marry in all 50 states. Moving from the secular world, the LGBTQIA+ community has only been fully welcomed to ordained ministry in the ELCA since 2009. Even though ordination is now possible the statistics

prove that LGBTQIA+ folks wait longer for first calls than their straight colleagues. Yes, we have made oppression lingering in our society and church.

While my experience of oppression is small in the grand scheme of the universe, it set my soul on fire to ensure that others do not experience the sting that comes with oppression and marginalization. Jesus calls all Christians to have their soul set on fire to ensure that no one experiences the sting of oppression and marginalization. I see the Gospels call to care for all people as a large part of my call to ministry and my faith. The LGBTQIA+ community needed folks to follow the Gospels call to action and there are many other populations longing for that Gospel response. It is not always easy to know how, where, or when to assist, speak out, or care for underserved populations while keeping our faith at the forefront of it all. But wait! There is an organization that can help!

Faith Action Network (FAN) is one of many faithbased organizations in Seattle doing amazing social justice work. "Faith Action Network's mission is to be a faith-inspired statewide partnership striving for a just, compassionate, and sustainable world through community building, education, and courageous public action." FAN does a wide variety of work from economic justice to creation care and you can learn more about their work by visiting, <u>http://fanwa.org/</u>.

FAN does not act alone in this work and relies on local congregations to support and join their work. When I first arrived in Seattle, I attended a FAN meeting and was inspired by the work they are striving to complete. Chasity Jones, community organizer at FAN, and I will be leading the First Sunday Faith Forum in February. I hope that you will come and learn about social justice as well as share your wisdom. Luther Memorial is a congregation with a passion to serve their neighbor and care for the poor. Let us not grow weary in the work but fight with perseverance so that all might experience justice and equity and finally see someone like them within the church walls. Let's live out our faith together!

**1** Name of Jesus Baptized into Christ, we bear the name of Jesus and are prepared for serving our neighbor and spreading the good news of what God has done. Give thanks for the gift of new life we have in Jesus Christ, and pray that we are bold, eager witnesses in the world – never shrinking from the work to which God calls us.

2 A new year often brings new hopes, resolutions, goals and beginnings. Ask God for strength and perseverance to meet the challenges of new and unfamiliar endeavors, and shout praise for God's forgiveness and love that renews us and frees us to get up, learn and begin again when we stumble or fail.

**3** Give thanks for the bishops of the ELCA, and pray they find mutual support, grow in wisdom and skill for their ministry, and that their faith is strengthened through time together at the Bishops' Academy.

4 Seasonal workers in our communities often go unnoticed during the busyness of the holidays. Pray that workers now searching for new jobs find steady, fair employment to sustain their families and that our faith communities embrace them with support, concern and welcome.

**5** During Human Trafficking Prevention Month, we lift up prayers for victims and survivors of human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation around the world and ask God to stir our resolve and actions to care for survivors, end these crimes and address the causes of trafficking, such as poverty, hunger and sexism.

6 Epiphany of Our Lord God's purpose and redemptive work are revealed in the light of Jesus Christ to all humankind. Pray our hearts and minds are receptive to better understanding – through faith in Christ – the mystery of God's boundless grace, wisdom and power.

7 *Baptism of our Lord* We remember our baptism and pray for the Spirit to remind us daily that we are children of God, forgiven and called to lives of service and witness in the world.

**8** Ask God to help us recognize, confess, confront and correct sexist attitudes, behaviors and systems in ourselves, our workplaces, the church and society, knowing that the injustice and pain inflicted on women and girls hurts everyone. Pray that our Christian witness in word in children and youth and that we help young people

the world is marked by respect for all people and the courage to learn and change as the spirit of God works in us.

9 We remember in our prayers those who continue to recover and rebuild after the devastation left in the wake of storms and fires, that individuals, families and communities will find new ways forward with the support and encouragement of the church, relief agencies and one another.

10 Sometimes God's word and voice can be loud and majestic and shake all of creation. Pray we recognize God's voice in daily life and give thanks for how it strengthens us and gives us peace.

11 We remember in our prayers companion-synod relationships with global-church partners, and ask God to bless and nourish these partnerships for mutual learning and encouragement, sharing our gifts and resources, building up the church and serving our neighbor.

12 Give thanks and praise to God for the comfort, order and hope God brings to our lives, especially in times of uncertainty, conflict, discouragement and what may seem like chaos.

13 Pray for those who have responded to God's call to serve as ELCA Missionaries and in the Young Adults in Global Mission program that their faith and service are a bright and lively witness to the good news of Jesus Christ and to God's presence and work in the world.

14 We pray that when Jesus invites us to "Come and see," we are moved by faith to follow and invite our neighbors – friends and strangers alike – to hear the good news of Jesus Christ, believe and also follow.

15 Martin Luther King Jr. Day We remember in our prayers saints who have gone before us, like Martin Luther King Jr., and courageous people in our midst today who endure criticism and suffering for the sake of standing with, advocating for and serving God's children who suffer injustice, neglect or oppression.

16 Recalling how God spoke through the boy Samuel, we pray we are attentive to the presence of God's spirit and

grow as faithful followers, leaders and servants in the body 25 Conversion of Paul Praise God for the miraculous of Christ.

17 Give thanks to God for people who mentor us in our faith, daily life and work and have helped us grow and mature through the sharing of their gifts, wisdom, life experiences and faith.

18 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity We are one in the body of Christ. Pray for our ecumenical partners, global church partners and our brothers and sisters in Christ everywhere, that God will bless and further our work together for the purpose of building up Christ's church in the world.

19 The spirit of God is always at work in the church. We pray God will renew the church and our faith communities, especially when we grow weary, have questions about serving in changing communities, find ourselves in conflict or need to refresh our sense of mission.

20 We remember in prayer people of all ages and stages of life who are discovering and preparing for new vocations or studying for new professions and pray they and their families find the faith, strength and encouragement needed to move through times of anticipation, uncertainty and personal change.

21 The ELCA and The Episcopal Church are committed to prayer, fasting and advocacy addressing cuts to public programs that are vital to hungry people living in poverty. Pray for these concerns, our leaders and people in need on the 21st of each month through December 2018.

22 We ask God to bless the ongoing work of reconciliation and healing among Christians and other faiths and to stay focused in our striving for unity for the sake of the world.

23 With humility and awe, we praise God for knowing our innermost thoughts and ways and for always seeking us out and embracing us like a loving parent.

24 We pray that everyone in need of warmth and shelter through the winter months has safe, dependable housing, especially elders and those who are homeless, and that we are unceasing in our work to care for and respect the dignity of people in need.

ways our faith and lives are changed as the Spirit works in us and among us.

**26** Just as the disciples put down their fishing nets in response to Jesus' invitation to follow, we pray we are alert and receptive to God's calling us to service and witness in the world and that we are willing to reorder our priorities, tasks and lives to follow Jesus.

27 We remember in our prayers pastors and seminary students serving in Federal Chaplaincy Ministries in unique settings of the U.S. military, Veterans Affairs hospitals and federal correctional institutions.

28 Ask God to open our eyes to the ways – intentional and unintentional – in which we isolate our neighbor, cause others to stumble in their faith or stir division and conflict; ask for forgiveness and for the Spirit to redirect and inform our thoughts, words and actions for the well-being of our neighbor and the church.

**29** Give thanks for the impact of the International Women Leaders initiative in partnership between ELCA Global Mission, global companion churches and the colleges and universities of the ELCA, launched as part of Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA.

**30** Pray God continues to influence our lives and guide us through the teaching and example of prophets, teachers, leaders and Scripture and that we have the wisdom to discern what is true and flows from the word of God.

**31** Give thanks for leaders who help us understand stewardship and how to use what God has entrusted to each of us and our communities – gifts from God to be used with generosity, compassion and responsibility in service to our neighbor and for the growth of the church.

### Joining God in 2018

The Synod's Living Local movement invites us to be alert to where we see God acting beyond the four walls of the church. It is about developing the eyes to see and the ears to hear. It helps to have a few clues of where to look and listen. Here are two that have been helpful to me recently.

#### Clue #1: Suffering

The scriptures encourage us to look for God wherever we see and hear people crying out because of oppression, suffering, and pain. We have all had experiences of being with people and groups who are hurting deeply. It is not always easy to be present in these situations. When we are, something power-filled often happens. We experience empathy, love, and compassion. We experience blessing. We experience God.

Recently, I was with a new friend from Peru who has spent a significant amount of time living amongst the poorest people of his country. While raised in a very wealthy family, as a teenager he felt a strong call to be with the poor. Much to the consternation of his father, he left home to spend a year with a peasant farmer's family. He fell deeply in love with this family and their neighbors. He said, "I was privileged to reach out and touch the wounds of Jesus." When he returned home, he completed his education and landed a very prestigious job in the banking industry. He excelled in this work and had all the resources to live the "good life." But he missed the people he had come to know and love.

It was a shock when he told his boss, who wanted to promote him, that instead he felt called to enter into the

priesthood and become a Benedictine monk. He wanted to devote his life to living in poverty and discovering God's love among the poor. It is the one place he knows he will see, hear, and experience the presence of God.

#### Clue #2: New Life

There is another place that I have learned to see and hear God. I find God whenever I see new life happening whether it is the first crocus erupting in the still-cold soil of winter, the first birdsong of an early spring morning, or being on stage in my role as Community College Trustee to shake the hand of a "first person in the family" to ever graduate from college. Each of these experiences speak of hope, promise and new life and bear the fingerprints of God.

For me, there is one experience of new life that tops all others. I know of no greater joy than to hold a baby in my arms, to stroke the child's soft hair, to hear the coos of wonder, and to smell the newness. I know I am holding a miracle: one so vulnerable, so innocent, so full of fragile life. To hold a baby is to experience the presence of God.

There is a category of people who revel in the opportunity to hold a child. They are called grandparents. Grandparents who are so touched by this encounter of new life that they are willing to pack up their belongings and move across the country just to be in the presence of their grandbaby. They take hundreds of photos, eager to show the latest, and relish being able to Facetime with their grandbaby. The child re-centers their lives and becomes the source of their greatest joy.

These two clues remind us that God is present all around us – all the time. In suffering and new life; in sorrow and in joy. Let us look and listen together for where we can join God in 2018.

# Financial Picture

Monthly financial reports are now found in The Messenger. Your Council, Treasurer, Stewardship Team, and Pastor hope that these will give you a good idea of how our finances are faring.
