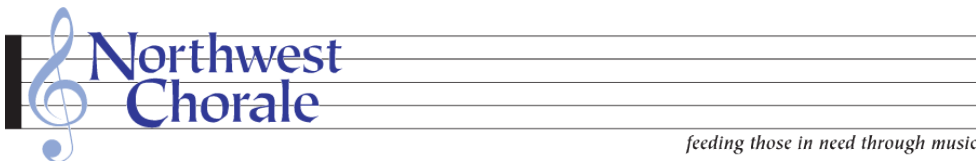
PLU Christmas Concert on December 3 - *A Child is Born*

Vicar's View

Before I moved out to Seattle, I had heard that this region was called a “none-zone,” because seventy percent of people claimed “none” in the box for religious affiliation on the census. I certainly have noticed something missing here from the landscape: the sound of bells. It seems like the air is emptier without ringing bells at noon, the hymns playing overhead at six in the evening, and the tolling shortly before worship on Sunday morning. A Catholic friend of mine explained that the bells in medieval Europe were a call to pause throughout the day and say the Lord's Prayer. Bells remind us to stop for one moment and remember that God is God, and God is good.

The tolling bells are one of our most powerful symbols on All Saints' Sunday, the first Sunday in November this year. I didn't grow up in a congregation who rang bells on All Saints' Sunday, so my first exposure to this ritual was in Germany when I was an exchange student. When they rang a bell for each member of the congregation who had died in the past year, it spoke more than any sermon could have. The bells said, we remember, we grieve, and we hope. It was a comfort to feel that full presence of the dead;



to know that in Baptism, we are united with Christ, in life and in death, eternally.

Although Seattle appears to be a “none-zone,” this area really is blessed with a tremendous diversity of religious heritage, as I have learned attending the planning meetings for the Interfaith Thanksgiving Service. If we heard the worship of all these communities, Seattle would be full of the sound not only of bells, but the Muslim call to prayer, Tibetan Buddhist chant, the Jewish blowing of the shofar, and much more. We will hear all of this on Wednesday, November 23 at 7:00 p.m. at Phinney Ridge Lutheran Church, and I hope you will be able to make it, to celebrate this national holiday with our neighbors of all faith traditions. This year's theme is “Community of Light,” and will include a candle lighting ceremony to represent our unity as children of the Creator.

Vicar's View

I will close with the thanksgiving for light from our Christian tradition, found in the evening vespers service in the new hymnal. May we remember and give thanks for the light of Christ as the darkness increases on these November days!

We give you thanks, O God, for in the beginning, you called light into being, and you set lights in the sky to govern night and day. In a pillar of cloud by day, and a pillar of fire by night, you called your people into freedom. Enlighten our darkness by the light of your Christ; may your Word be a lamp to our feet, and a light to our path; for you are merciful, and you love your whole creation, and with all your creatures we give you glory, through your Son Jesus Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen.

Tuition Support For Our Candidates

At our last Synod Assembly we passed a resolution that sets the goal of providing full tuition support for the candidates for rostered leadership from this synod.

This is an ambitious goal. It is also an important

statement about this synod's recognition of the need for future leaders in this church.

Every October the meeting of the Conference of Bishops takes place at the same time the eight Seminary Presidents meet in Chicago. We always spend some time together talking about the shape of Theological Education in this church and the future needs of the church. It is clear that we will need an increasing number of pastors and rostered lay leaders as the "baby boom" generation retires. It is also clear that the shape of leadership will change in the coming years.

The cost of seminary education, on top of four years in college is becoming a significant factor in identifying leaders for the future.

The amount of debt our graduates are bringing into their vocation is a concern. The ability of first call candidates to be good leaders in their stewardship is undermined by their debt loads. The need for bi-vocation pastors in smaller settings is also a factor that affects the candidacy process.

We have set an ambitious goal. It is an important goal. Many of us came

from predecessor churches that were able to significantly subsidize or fully pay for our tuition. Those days are long gone.

Churchwide and Synod support of seminaries is flat or declining.

Tuition makes up an increasingly significant role in the way seminaries balance their budgets. This is part of the re-examination of theological education that is taking place in virtually every denomination in this country.

The Lutheran movement began in the academic world. Luther was a professor. The early leaders of our church came from the academy. The expectation of a theologically trained pastor has been part of our DNA from the beginning. That model is now in transition.

Where we will be in the near future is still unclear. We are looking at how we will raise up the future leaders of this church. This is an important discussion and one that requires action from every expression of this church.

I encourage your congregation and key individuals to take up the goal of providing full tuition scholarships for the future leaders this synod will raise up.

Here 'n There

Kent Lutheran is working with H.O.M.E., a year-round overnight shelter for single adult men in South King County.
- At the end of September, **Luther Memorial Lutheran Church in Seattle** hosted Mary's Place. Mary's Place offers programs and services in a welcoming and accepting environment where homeless women and their children can build community, enrich their days and find resources to restore their lives.
- The Senior High Youth Group at **Salem Lutheran Church** in Mount Vernon will "serve God by serving others." On October 21 they will be serving dinner at the Union Gospel Mission in Seattle.
- *Munchy Monday* is a program of outreach and giving at **Oak Harbor Lutheran Church in Oak Harbor**. When the students from Oak Harbor High School have nowhere to go between early release from class and the beginning of after-school sports and other activities, the church has opened its doors and gives them a snack and safe place to play a game, study or just hang out.
- **St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in Renton** also offers an after school program for the students at McKnight Middle School. The congregation also provides a pancake breakfast each Friday when there is a late start.
- **Christ Lutheran Church in Ferndale** has a new website: www.clcferndale.org. And, **Burlington Lutheran Church in Burlington** also has a new website: www.burlingtonlutheran.org.
- **Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church in Seattle** is offering a Compline Service on the first Sunday of the month at 8 p.m., with refreshments following. Compline is an ancient service that marks the close of the day with the purpose of bringing spiritual peace.
- **The Rev. Ronald F. Marshall, pastor of First Lutheran Church of West Seattle**, published his article, "Luther's Alleged Anti-Semitism," in *Logia: A Journal of Lutheran Theology*, Reformation 2012.
