PJ's Page

As I look at the LMLC calendar for May, I am drawn to two particular events. On the surface they seem unrelated, but the more I consider them, the more convinced I am of how one is a reminder to us of another.

On May 19, the Feast of Pentecost, we will baptize Mackenzie Culmer into the priesthood of believers, the family of God. This precious child will be water washed and sealed with the Spirit, as a reminder that she is Christ's own forever.



Each one of us has also had that water poured onto our foreheads. Or maybe you were

actually immersed in a larger body of water! But whatever the method and whenever the time in our lives, we were baptized in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Named and claimed by the One who created us and loved us.

Having been given so great a gift...new life....how might we respond?

Matthew 25 gives us a good idea:

Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave your food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just

as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.'

On May 28th members of Christ's family will come into our midst in search of refuge and shelter. They have nothing – nothing to drink or eat or wear. At least not as much as we enjoy. Life for them has become suddenly and unimaginably difficult. Perhaps they are homeless because they lost a job or fled – who knows. And Jesus doesn't care. Jesus says to us, 'just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.'

Beloved community, the family of Jesus Christ and the family of God, precious sisters and brothers, are coming to dwell in our midst for a mere week. I believe that it is in response to our baptismal callings that we reach out to them. <u>This</u> is how these two events connect – we have been given the greatest gift of all and our response is to reach out to others as though we were reaching out to Christ.

Maybe it is helpful to re-frame the question:

If Jesus were coming to Luther Memorial for a week, how would we respond?

Anja lives with her husband in Kirkland, so she will continue to live at home while serving as our intern for the 2013-2014 year.




We will learn more about Anja in the weeks and months ahead, even

I love turning my office calendar to May. Generally, I can expect to see a picture of a gorgeous blooming flower, or a meadow clothed in fresh spring green. May is the month of new things springing up all around us; in the church, we are usually still in the glorious Easter season, singing our alleluias and rejoicing in Christ's victory over death. The Gift of Unconditional Love - from ReconcilingWorks' Spring Concord **Emily Eastwood - ReconcilingWorks Executive Director**

n January, I spoke at the annual conference in church and society, from our work for of the Gay Christian Network, a mostly online group of 20,000 individuals worldwide. GCN's annual conferences take on the excitement of family reunions as people who know each other by their online chat names meet in person for the first time. Many then come year after year to renew friendships, delighting in each other's presence in a place where they are safe and welcomed in the fullness of who they are.

I spoke on the conference theme, "Oasis,"

After the formal workshop time, the real work began as numerous individuals and two couples stayed behind to continue more personal conversations with me. Eventually, there was only one older man remaining. We sat together as he poured out the story of his life. Unlike most in the room, he had been

raised by his parents without rejection in a Christian household, but as

environment. I knew that, for many, this event was itself an oasis of sorts, a place and time of respite and living water where thirst might be quenched, questions answered, and loneliness replaced at least for a while by a community gathered in Christ's name.

After my speech, I led a workshop that was loosely labeled "Q&A." Some attendees were having a great deal of trouble accepting themselves, believing they would not "inherit who had traveled from a distant continent struggled aloud. We worked through the Bible bullets, the passages used against us, as well as through texts of promise. We heard story after story of rejection by families and churches in the name of God. I told stories of hope from our RIC community, from the faithful witness

the family moved around they changed churches, and sometimes denominations, as they went. In an era when gays were not allowed in the military, he had served with the support of his outfit. He had been excommunicated by a conservative denomination while he was in the military. However, he took that action as a gift, because it brought him to realize his previous anxieties over that church had been well-founded. He the kingdom" unless they were celibate. A man would simply look for another. He had found a partner, and they had lived happily together for many years. He was healthy and now retired. He had had a wonderful life.

Tears came as he asked me why God had spared him the horrible things that so many in that workshop had endured. I listened in amazement. He was sincere and genuinely that members of ReconcilingWorks have given troubled. Why was it that God had treated him

differently and better than so many? Why did he deserve a good life? He needed to know.

I can honestly say that no LGBT person had ever asked me that question. It took me a little by surprise, but the answer was clear from his own story. The gift that he was given was not that he was somehow spared, but that he was taught acceptance and resilience. He had had various rejections in his life, but they had not affected him in the same way that they would have affected others. He had been loved unconditionally from birth in a household that exposed him to a breadth of experience. He knew what it was to be wholly loved by God though the example of his parents. He saw the glass as half full, even as others might have seen it half or nearly empty. His life was an adventure because of his resilience.

I will never forget this man, not because of his question, but because of his story and the lessons within it. His parents and God had gifted him with life. His parents had loved him they are or whom they love. Amen. as God would have us love. He was given a capacity and an early education for resilience

that served him for a lifetime. Disappointments became opportunities. He was truly happy and troubled only by the misfortune of others in relief against his own life.

What lifetime-affecting differences do we make every day when we love as Jesus loved? What gifts do we give when we ourselves choose faithful resilience over despair, opportunity and adventure over submission to the will of unwelcoming societies, churches, pastors or bishops?

I pray that the RIC congregations are indeed teaching parents how to raise all children as the gifts of God that they are, and through our example, LGBT children, youth, and young adults will receive the gifts of Christ's unconditional love and human resilience. May the oasis of the RIC communities be extended throughout the church and beyond so that none may fear alienation, abuse or rejection for who



function as a congregation, synod or Churchwide Organization is under question today. Can we still do it that way? What will the church look like in the future?



The old constant in our lives and in the church's life is that we are being made new. Even in the face of death we are given new life. That is the reality of our world in Christ.

> Much of our anxiety is due to our fear of the unknown. In Christ the future is known in this promise that we will be a new creation. I don't know all of what that means. I do know that the future is in God's hands. That is the newness that gives life and hope to the world. That is the work of God through the church.
