been on my mind as I remember thinking that coming to Luther Memorial as your pastor felt very much like coming home. April 1st marks five years since we began this journey together. We've seen many changes. People have come and gone from this community of faith. Sisters and brothers we have loved have left this life for the next. New babies have been born. New friends have joined us. From Sunday to Sunday I look around and marvel at the changes. Wasn't Kelsey S. just the age that Payton J. is now? How can Ryan and Audrey be about to graduate? And doesn't it seem that Marge was always here with her quick wit and her ready been hearing the stories of families struggling to smile? 
> And what that news offers us is the freedom to act as God's agents of change in the world....to find ways, large and small, that we can reach out to support others. To welcome

# Stewardship Living

#### **Stewardship Living**

There is a song from the sixties that admonishes us to "teach your children well." And isn't this every parent's intent?

Here are some additional ideas for teaching our children about Stewardship. They aren't bad for tall kids (adults) either!



Teach your kids and remind yourself that we are stewards of our time. Each day we are given a certain number of hours and what we do with those is a response to the gift of them. It's helpful to avoid language of "wasting time", after all, what adults consider time 'wasted', might actually be time contemplating the life of an insect found, or playing outside. It can be a good exercise to chart the use of time with our

kids, to find balance between homework and play time and video games or other screen time and sleep.

Speaking of sleep, teaching our kids (and reminding ourselves) that sleep is a restorative time for our bodies, minds, and spirits can go a long way toward the battle of bedtime.

- Encourage children to see opportunities to use what they have (time, talents, and treasure) to make their own neighborhoods a little better. Is there someone on your block who would benefit from having their leaves raked in the autumn? Take that project on as a family! Do the neighbors with a new baby need a pick me up? How about some cookies you bake with your children?



Finally, remember that your children, small and tall, will take their cues from the adults in their lives. What their parents and other mentors model will mean far more than their words. Generosity is a learned response to God's gracious and plentiful generosity shown to us.

#### Midweek Lenten Series: Making Change

Change is a constant in our lives. Some changes mark gradual transitions, as when daytime shifts toward twilight or winter turns to spring. We choose to undergo some changes after carefully considering our options, while in other changes we have little or no choice.

In the weeks, days, and hours before Jesus' crucifixion, the disciples also experienced change: a change of venue as the gates of Jerusalem approached; a change of plans as their long-awaited Messiah was arrested and tried; a change of circumstance as the crowds shouted "Crucify!" Change is hard. We long for the unexpected and familiar, but often find ourselves in the midst of uncertainty and the unknown. Yet, only through change do we find, growth and new life. 

#### SPU Presented Options to Prevent Sewage Overflows at March 18 BCC Meeting

On Tuesday evening at the March 18 Broadview Community Council (BCC) meeting a full house crowd heard Seattle Public Utilities (SPU) describe the three options identified to help resolve sewage overflows in West Broadview (12th Ave. NW basin). After a presentation of the options there was a period of questions and comments from the audience. SPU requested comments on preferences for the options, and there was a range of views expressed by members of the audience.





SPU will next develop options for

surface water drainage in West Broadview, and present them at a public meeting in late spring or early summer. By the end of the year SPU will make a decision on options to implement in West Broadview, and develop options for the East Broadview (Dayton Avenue) area.

Thanks to the many members of the public who joined the BCC or renewed their membership at the meeting. The modest membership dues go to support this BCC website, and meeting expenses.

#### **Help Seattle Protect our Community from Hazards**

As we've seen in our region and nationally, disasters can and do happen to us. Now is the time to let City officials know your thoughts!

Are you more concerned about a major earthquake or a winter storm? A tsunami or local flooding? A nuclear reactor meltdown or a traffic accident where hazardous materials are released? All of the above? In the Pacific Northwest, we face 18 different hazards both natural and man-made. The City is responsible for developing a plan to reduce risks, but needs help to develop a process that allows us to work together to reduce the impact and keep ourselves and our property safe. We need your help to create a plan that takes into account all of our needs and resources.

It is through our Hazard Mitigation Plan that we outline how we will reduce our vulnerability to the impacts of these disasters. This could include things like:

- Stabilizing slopes to prevent landslides.
- Evaluating buildings and strengthening them to allow them to withstand earthquakes.
- Identifying areas in the city that flood during heavy rains and improve drainage.
- Teaching families and neighborhoods how to protect their homes and families from the impacts of disaster.



Are you Serious? ... You must be joking ....

But we know already when we say, "Are you *serious*?" what the answer is. What we are really saying is that you are telling me about something that is very *serious* and I don't want to believe it. The term for this is denial.



Our bodies have a limited tolerance for *serious*. We expel the unwanted information and then take it in at a pace we can manage. It is like there is an internal trampoline that the information hits and bounces out at light speed. Then there is a filtration system with a very fine sieve. And so the absorption is slow. The truth sets in and we slowly feel the feelings as the numbness wears off.

It is a gift of grace that we have such a regulatory mechanism. How overwhelmed we would get without it. The denial is *serious* also. It is determined to protect us. It slows everything down and then goes looking for emotional resources that will allow us to cope with the news.

God is *serious* about preserving these creations called humans. God is *serious* about protecting us from the consequences of sin and brokenness. Not completely, of course. We can't keep it at arm's length indefinitely. We must absorb the reality of the impact of the griefs and losses that are an inevitable part of life. But they are not ultimate. God's Word of Grace is that these losses are not the last word about our experience of life.

The Final word is God's comfort, love and protection. Seriously!



# The Journey That Leads to Easter

The call came from the Patient's Advocacy Office at the Medical Center. A family I had never met before was requesting a visit from a Lutheran pastor to a young mother who, during a routine hysterectomy developed complications which placed her in a coma.

The Patient Advocate explained to me that it was a very sad situation surrounded with great uncertainty. I walked out the door feeling helpless. I prayed as I drove to the hospital that I

might be able to be a person of grace for this family. Kathy was the mother of two young children. Her mother and husband introduced themselves to me when I entered the room. It was obvious they were frightened, their faces wearing the stains of their tears. Kathy lay in the bed surrounded by all the paraphernalia of an ICU room. My heart broke for them as they shared what little they knew. They asked if I would pray for Kathy which I did.

Over the next weeks I visited on a regular basis talking to Kathy as if she were able to hear and comprehend my words. I met her beautiful children and tried to support her husband and parents. It was an endurance contest for them and their hope was fading as alternative arrangements were being spoken about. One evening I dropped by the hospital. There was no family in the room when I entered.

I barely made my way in when Kathy said to me through her impaired speech, "Hi Pastor Kirby, I am so glad you are here." I was stunned. How did she know it was me? How did she know my name? Remember, we had never met before. I don't even remember what we spoke about. What I do remember is driving home in almost trance like state. Kim was taking a sewing class at the local fabric store. I had to tell her. I walked into the classroom and just blurted out, "Kathy woke up!" The class must have thought I was going off the deep end.

Kathy struggled mightily in the weeks and years to come to regain some sense of her life as her brain tried to rewire itself. She had to learn how to do everything new again. The people of St. Matthew's will never forget the day she walked on her own, haltingly to the communion rail. Her marriage would end but her two children would see their way through confirmation. Her mother and other extended family became part of the faith community. We all were amazed at Kathy's resolve in spite of the never ending challenges she faced.

Fast forward 25 years and Kathy's kids have grown up and she has remarried. Life continues to provide her with many challenges all which she seems to take in stride. Kathy's story for me is a reminder of why Lent invites us to practice the discipline of appearing before God daily, confessing our helplessness never too sure if God is aware of our presence or not. In fact "not knowing" is for me a major part of my Christian journey. Yet I continue to seek trusting that my Easter Days will come when God will speak my name, "Hi Kirby, I am so glad you are here."

Put together "Homeless Helper Kits" (sealable plastic bag with trail mix, jerky, dried fruit, toiletry supplies, gift certificate for a meal, etc.)
