I came across this quote recently and it has stayed in my mind and spirit ever since. Sister Helen Prejean's work with inmates on death row is the subject of the book (and later the movie) "Dead Man Walking." But what draws me into this quote is the way that she moved from belief to putting feet to her faith. She said "I changed from being a nun who only prayed for the suffering world to a nun with my sleeves rolled up, living my prayer." Sister Helen moved from her comfortable life as a teacher of middle class children to the violence ridden, poverty stricken housing projects of New Orleans, where she served as she understood the call of Christ.

Specifically, I wondered to myself: *When* people watch what I do, or when I watch what I do, do we see Jesus?

And then I asked the question of us as a congregation: When people watch what we do, or when we watch what we do, do we see Jesus?

What would it mean to live our prayer? Every Sunday we pray for a variety of people and situations. We pray for the sick and lonely and the homeless. We pray for places where violence seems to reign. What would it mean if, like Sister Helen, we rolled up our sleeves and began to live our prayer?

I don't have every answer to these questions, but I have some ideas and I'll bet you do too.


In these days as we imagine and envision what God is calling us to do in response to the Gospel and in view of our mission statement, I would welcome and value the chance to sit together around a table with a beverage or a snack and just talk. Talk about how you see this congregation rolling up its sleeves. Talk about what makes your heart sing. Talk about what makes you nervous. (The last two may or may not be mutually exclusive!)

To that end, I invite you to join me for Table Talk...a term applied to Martin Luther's famous gatherings of seminarians who lived with Martin and Katarina in Wittenberg, Germany. Luther wanted to know what they were thinking about how the Church was changing...and boy was it changing! He wanted them to wrestle together and depart arm in arm, beloved friends in Christ.

And because our focus will be outward, it's my hope that we'll have occasion to meet outside of the church building, at least on from time to time. To be the Church out in the neighborhood, meeting our neighbors, maybe even asking them to join us.

Table Talk....once a month or so. Let's start on Wednesday evening, May 14th, at 7pm. To kick things off, we'll meet at the church – on the patio if it's a nice evening or in the narthex if it's chilly or rainy or both. No specific agenda – all questions and topics welcome. Table Talk.

While preparing to write this column, I came across this quote:

"When you realize the extent to which you have been gifted, you suddenly discover the reason behind it all: giving."

There are multiple ways this is true and many opportunities to embrace this in our own lives and in our life together as a community of faith.

Here's what I invite you to do, right now.

- Grab a piece of paper (anything will do) and something to write with. Identify 3 things with which you have been gifted. They might be talents or skills or material possessions. Got them? What have you named?
- Now give thanks for them, for they are indeed gifts to you from the One who created you. Know that I give thanks for these gifts in your life, too.
- Next, begin to envision how you might give of yourself through those very gifts. If you are a carpenter, could you help build or refurbish a home for someone in need? If you are a singer could you sing at the nursing home or in the choir? If you are able to read and do second grade math, could you tutor a struggling student at school? (Broadview-Thomsen welcomes volunteers).

Now, let's think in this way about Luther Memorial and our ministry and mission. Can you name three things this community of faith has been gifted with? How might we give back out of the abundance of what God has given to us? Dream! Anything is possible.

Finally, my invitation to you is to share those thoughts, especially as they pertain to the congregation, with one another and with your leadership (Council members) and with me, your pastor. Send them to me/us in an email...we'll share them as we envision how and where God is calling us.

A Reflection from Steve Olson, LMLC Council President -

Steve shared the reflection below with the congregation at the Spring Forum on April 13, 2014.

About 50 years ago, right where I park my car on Sunday mornings there was a house. Before we built this education wing, before this very room was erected, there was a house. I'm not talking about the Parish House. I'm talking about the parsonage that stood right out there. It was the home of Pastor



McCullough, and Becky, Michael, and Shannon. It was there until the mission of this church, responding to the needs of its community changed. The house as I recall was "recycled ", a term not much in vogue in those days. But it was picked up whole and moved to another location in this neighborhood. Then, out of our abundance, and responding to God's call to serve this community we built this space.

Here we are, 50 years later and we are still growing and still very much responding to needs in our community and we ask ourselves; how do we utilize the abundance we have for the mission of God's Church? Imagine retilling that ground out there and putting up a place for people to live in. Imagine that and then marvel with me at the crazy, irrational at times, but always exciting ways that God meets us and then engages us in His plan for Creation.

Now my math is off slightly, not surprising to be sure, I was a History major for a reason. It has probably been 50 plus years since the addition was completed. But it is right around 50, because I'm well over 50 and I remember that house. 50. We don't have to think too hard to appreciate the significance of the number 50 for God's people. It is the year of Jubilee, a time to reboot and reset the world to realign with God's easy plan. It is a time of significant change and liberation. Things that we cling to and that cling to us are discarded or recycled and we look with new eyes and refreshed spirit at God's world.

Together as a community we have spent the season of Lent, looking at change. We become aware that we may be asked to change. We have learned that we should face the challenge of change with an open heart. We have been assured that God, who calls us to change, will both lead and journey with us through change.

Your leadership has been praying, discussing, and discerning how God might be leading us to continue to share the Good News. We believe strongly that our gaze is turned outward, but that much of our response lies right here under our feet. We have begun to look at the abundance of that paved over piece of land and we believe that God is asking us to consider how we might use that in service to our community. That is one thing that hasn't changed, that we are charged to do mission in our community. So we look out there and we ask, how is God calling us to serve? How is God awakening us to Jubilee in our midst? And I can't help but recall a Joni Mitchell song. Only instead of paving paradise and putting up a parking lot, we unpave and utilize the parking lot for the Kingdom. Perhaps a home will rise there again or perhaps several homes for people desperate for a place to call home. And isn't that what paradise is? Home?

Pray for the ELCA synods and their voting members who have synod assemblies this month that their work will be guided by the Holy Spirit and that their decisions will reflect the glory of God.

2 Lift up in your prayers ELCA congregations that have made a special effort to open unused, or under-used, space in their buildings for the benefit of their neighbors — such as the La Casita ministry of Trinity Lutheran in Brooklyn, NY, which has turned an unused parsonage into a multi-use community space.

3 Pray for the efforts within this church, such as the Companeros de Camino ministry of the South Dakota Synod, to help the children of immigrants who have grown up in the United States and desire to attend college.

4 Third Sunday of Easter

Dear God, just as you reveled yourself to the disciples in Emmaus, open our hearts and our minds so that we may recognize you; so that we may proclaim to the world that we too have seen the risen Lord.

5 Lift up in your prayers the Rev. Elisabeth Johnson, an ELCA missionary in Cameroon, and her work in theological education.

6 Pray that as individuals and as a church we will listen to God in our prayer conversations and that we will heed that divine voice as we listen to and interact with others.

7 Give thanks for the digital technologies available today that allow our congregations and members to connect efficiently and pursue God's work in wondrous new ways.

8 Julian of Norwich, renewer of the church

Give thanks for the people behind the scenes in your daily life and in the life of this church. Give thanks for those who make your life easier and better and for those who make it possible for this church to go about God's work. **9** Pray for the pastors of the ELCA that, as they minster to the spiritual needs of others, they will care for and nurture their own spiritual health and growth.

10 Lift up in your prayers the six young people spending a year in Jerusalem and the West Bank as part of the ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program and pray for God's guidance as they walk in accompaniment with those who deal daily with the effects of political divisions.

14 Include in your prayers the presidents of the ELCA's eight seminaries, leaders who share the difficult job of ensuring that their schools excel at preparing pastors for a changing world.

15 Give thanks for Lutheran Disaster Response's efforts to make clean water available in the parts of the world where it is desperately needed, such as in the refugee camps in Uganda and Kenya.

16 Pray for the seven members of the ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program serving in

Madagascar as they walk in accompaniment with their new neighbors and families and live a life of "God's work. Our hands."

17 Give thanks for the 1,912,445 people who have been reached through malaria awareness programs and the 22,056 mosquito nets that have been distributed since the ELCA Malaria Campaign began.

18 Fifth Sunday of Easter

19 Pray for the Christian Unity Gathering, which continues today and tomorrow in Washington, D.C., as the ELCA and other members of the National Council of Churches celebrate ecumenism and address pressing social issues.

20 Give thanks for the many local programs run by ELCA members — such as the Daily Work ministry created by ELCA pastors in St. Paul, Minn. — that help immigrants adjust to their new life in the United States and gain the skills needed to find a job.

21 Remember in your prayers the Rev. Justin and Kari Eller, ELCA missionaries in Argentina where Justin is the regional representative.

22 Pray for those students at the ELCA's eight seminaries who face substantial tuition debt upon graduation. Pray that they will be able to balance their financial reality with their call to do God's work where needed.

23 Pray for the goals of *Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA*, one of which is to accompany and equip 1,000 congregations in their renewal efforts through ELCA synods.

24 Pray for peace and justice for all who live in the Holy Land and lift up the efforts of the ELCA's Peace Not Walls campaign, which works toward that goal through accompaniment, advocacy and awareness-raising.

25 Sixth Sunday of Easter

O Lord our God, we remember the families and friends of all deployed soldiers. Let your blessings fill their homes and your strength fill their lives; in the name of Jesus, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

26 Memorial Day

Give thanks today for the service of our armed forces veterans and those currently in uniform. Pray that those veterans suffering from nightmares, both mental and physical, as a result of their service will find the peace and strength they desire.

27 Pray for the health of the many small ELCA congregations that, despite harsh economic realities, continue to do God's work and be an important pillar in the faith life of their members.

28 Pray that, with the help of God, we will live out the mission of our church: Marked with the cross of Christ forever, we are claimed, gathered and sent for the sake of the world.

29 Remember in your prayers the Rev. Rosanne Swanson, an ELCA missionary in Indonesia, as she goes about God's work as a teacher of pastoral theology and pastoral care at the STT-HKBP seminary in Pematang Siantar, North Sumatra.

30 Lift up in your prayers the ELCA Good Gifts program, a ministry that through the generosity of ELCA members and others fights hunger and transforms lives around the world.

31 Give thanks for the more than 800 rostered people of the ELCA who are serving in specialized pastoral care. Pray that God's guidance and strength will accompany them as they serve those in desperate need in such areas as health care and hospice, corrections and substance abuse.

A Lifelong Learner by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes by the preaching of Christ. -Romans 10:17

It was a joy for me to be able to share in midweek worship with the gracious people of Gethsemane and The Garden in Seattle. Dinner consisted of a hearty bowl of chili and bread that was enjoyed by those of us seated at round tables.

Pr. Joanne Engquist was our guide as she helped us explore the depth of God's love for the world.

She helped us move beyond the understanding that the creation is simply a back drop for our daily lives or something to be exploited for our own use. We explored together God's desire to redeem not just human lives but the whole creation.

Pr. Enguist masterfully introduced us to a variety of scriptural passages which helped us to see how reconciliation is not something that happens just between human beings. She graciously pointed out the tendency to reduce salvation as an act directed only at individuals and opened for us the expansive desire of God to reconcile all people unto God's self. Then she took us yet one step further as she taught us that the word for world in "God so loved the world" is cosmos. We were now exploring the cosmic dimensions of God's love.

Ceil Fjellman was seated at our table. Ceil was married to the late Bishop Gib Fjellman. Gib was my bishop when I first came into ministry. The Fjellmans have contributed immensely in shaping a deep love of the church for Kim and me. We hold them both as dear friends.

Ceil is very likely to see 100 years of age. This is due in no small part to the way she continues to seek out opportunities for worship and learning.

I was so inspired to see Ceil participating fully in the conversation. She resonated with the

notion that God loves the whole world. Ceil was articulate in her delight that God's love reaches far beyond the Christian community. I marveled at her openness and her willingness to expand her understanding of God and the whole creation.

The journey through God's love of the cosmos was coming to an end as we were about to move into the chapel for Holden Vespers. Ceil was

still ruminating on the evening's word when she shared with us how her understanding of the creation had deepened through the conversation. "I have always thought of the creation as something beautiful that I have enjoyed but now I see that it is even more than that."

Sitting in my chair I could not help but think how amazing it was to watch a person who has lived so many years still enamored with God's word and willing to take in new understanding about the length and depth of God's love. Oh, that we might all be so open and willing to learn.

Synod Assembly - Joining God's Parade - FAQ

Q: When & where is the assembly this year?

A: The assembly begins Friday May 16 and concludes on Saturday May 17. The entire assembly will take place at the Edward D. Hansen Conference Center at the Comcast Arena in downtown Everett, Washington.

Q: Who can come to the assembly?

A: Register in one of the following categories: Voting Member - Voice & vote; Observer – Voice, no vote; Visitor – No the Guidebook APP. voice, no vote.

Not sure which category? Call the Synod Office.

Q: How do I register?

A: Online registration only: www.lutheransnw.org/synod- assembly-2014. Deadline is May 2.

Q: What about becoming more paperless?

A: During registration you may select to have a notebook of printed materials prepared for you OR bring your own computer/tablet with the materials downloaded. All of the materials will be available on the synod website as they are prepared. We are also utilizing a new APP through Guidebook to make it easier for those who wish to be paperless. Go to your App Store, search for Guidebook - get it - it's free! Click Redeem Code - then enter 'lutheransnw' - you

will then have all of the Assembly details at your fingertips instantly!

Q: What does it mean to be a voting member?

A: Voting Members are not delegates, they are selected by their congregation to serve on behalf of all the synod members, making decisions according to what they believe God is calling this church to do. They preview all materials, attend all sessions, listen attentively to and participate in discussions, learn about those nominated for election, seek the guidance of the Spirit, and report back to their congregation.

Q: When should I be there?

A: Registration opens at 8am on Friday. The Voting Member Orientation begins at 9:15am, followed by the opening of the assembly at 10am sharp. We will conclude at 5:30pm on Friday. We start bright and early at 8am

on Saturday, wrapping up our time together by 5pm that afternoon.

Q: What happens at an assembly?

A: It is the annual gathering of members from the congregations and new mission starts from around the NWWA Synod. We expect to have nearly 400 people participate in worship, join in fellowship, be inspired by guest speakers (Dr. Tony Jones is our Keynote Speaker & Pastor Linda Norman, ELCA Treasurer is our Churchwide Representative,) and conduct the business of the Synod. Our business this year will include the elections of a Synod Vice President, a Synod Secretary, and Synod Council Members. We will hear various reports, vote on a Synod Budget, and consider resolutions that come before us.

Friday afternoon we will offer a fellowship hour - with appetizers, live music and a no-host bar. And, don't forget to peruse our Ministry Partner & Book Parlor tables in the Display Area!

Q: How is an assembly conducted?

A: Bishop Kirby Unti will run the business meeting using the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order. David Swartling will lend assistance by serving as our parliamentarian.

Q: Where can I find all of the info?

A: All materials will be posted on the synod website as they are finalized: www.lutheransnw.org/synod-assembly-2014 OR through

Q: What's up with voting?

A: We will use electronic voting devices. These aid us in accuracy and speed. We will practice with them before officially using them. Proxy and absentee voting is not permitted.

Q: What about lunch?

A: Lunch each day is "on your own." You are encouraged to mingle with other attendees and check out the local restaurants (see the listing of local restaurants on the website). Be sure to let your server know that you need to be back by 1:30pm sharp for the afternoon sessions!

Q: Where should I stay overnight on Friday?

A: We have a special rate set up at the Inn at Port Gardner: www.innatportgardner.com or call 888-252- 6779. Just let them know you are part of the Lutheran Synod Assembly at the Edward D. Hansen Conference Center at the Comcast Arena.

Q: How do I best prepare for the assembly?

A: Pray. Read all of the materials on the website thoroughly. Attend a pre-assembly Cluster Gathering for conversation about the matters coming before the assembly.

Q: What if I have further questions?

A: Contact the Synod Office, we will put you in touch with the right person!



Sometimes the group just needs to be called to order. The class needs to start. It is time for the milling around and the socializing to stop. The business at hand needs addressing. Time to get *serious*!



There are some situations that take all of our concentration and focus.

We cannot afford to be distracted. Think about the pilots who fly the Blue Angels. One flies within feet of the other and upside-down! Not a good time to be making a grocery list in your head! There is nothing else in the entire world at that moment than flying that airplane.

Relationships demand this type of *serious* concentration also. We have to invest this level of *serious* attentiveness on a regular basis in our relationships. We can't sustain that level of attentiveness indefinitely, but we *must* give our relationships this *serious* attention at times. Is this not the same level of focus that we get from God without ceasing?

There is a discipline aspect to relationships that demands that we regularly practice *serious* intention other than in times of crisis. No distractions!
