Recently I opened a bottle of lemonade to find this phrase under the bottle top:
"Consuming this product may cause joy!" While the lemonade was delicious, what caused my joy was the very subtle reminder of all

of the reasons that I had reason to be filled with joy...and they weren't necessarily related to the lemonade.

Of course, it was a vocational certainty that I would draw a correlation between the message in that bottle top and the Eucharist. When we come to the table, we bring ALL of who we are to the holy meal. Our joys, our sorrows, our struggles, and our accomplishments. The gift of Jesus, present in, with, and under that bread and wine, sustains us. It doesn't take away our struggles. It doesn't solve our problems. It is not some sort of magic bullet. Rather, in that bread and wine, we receive again the gift of

grace that is ours... each one of us....in Jesus Christ.

I once read somewhere that the very act of opening our hands to receive the bread creates an act of offering up. (Go ahead, cup yours together now.) Imagine that as we receive that bread we are also offering to

God the stuff of our lives.
All of it.
Even those things we don't speak of, but that remain with us nonetheless.
And in that act, we



create space, not just for the bread, but for Jesus.

As we prepare again to recognize and honor our high school seniors, my hope for them, and for all of us, is that when we feel overwhelmed or empty or full and hopeful....that we will bring that to the table of the Lord, to the Eucharistic feast.

And remember...consuming this 'product' may cause joy!

In a report by Foresight, a British think tank, "giving to neighbors and communities" was cited as one of the five critical elements of well-being and mental illness prevention. Interestingly, the word community comes from the Latin *communis*, which means "bound



together". That word, has as part of its root the word munus, meaning "gift."

The Foresight report is certainly onto something. Giving in ways that benefit our neighbors and communities is a healthy practice. What we do as Christians, though, goes beyond that. It does not exclude it.

We give in response to God's gifts to us. We give because God has called us to care for one another.

Your gifts of money to this congregation mean that the hungry are fed, community groups have a place to meet, teenagers who have wandered for the first time have a safe place to meet a judge, quilts are made, we study the Bible, and two congregations have a place to worship. This is no small thing!



In this, the middle of the year, when there is no pledging to be done and no stewardship drive to be considered....on behalf of every person who stands in this building and asks for help....on behalf of the mother who grasps the hand of her teenage son as trembling they both sit in our narthex and await their turn with the judge....on behalf of those who come to support one another as part of a support group....on behalf of those who prepare our neighborhood for a disaster response...on behalf of the children who come to know God

here....thank you. Thank you for giving in ways that bind us together. Thank you for being giver and gift.


Pastor Julie Elected to Synod Council

Summer Sermon Series: The Stories That Shape Us





Imagine for a moment what we hear and see in that concrete space known as the parking lot. We see on a daily basis cars, cars and trucks.

Cars and trucks coming in the morning, going in the afternoon and sitting parked in between. Each evening we see more cars or an almost empty lot, except for the guy who lives in his van, parked at the back fence. Pastor has given us his name, Verry. Verry watches over our parking lot and lets Pastor know if there has been anything happening.

Back to the parking lot. Cars sit unattended getting rained on most days,

or soaking up the sun on some days. Cars staying hot until the windows are rolled down.

Now imagine again what we would see and hear with mixed low income housing, with social service help occupying that concrete space. What will we see and hear? We'll see and hear, laughter, children playing, families sharing. We'll hear and see different languages, young, old, single, veteran, all sharing a living community with useful services.

Think about what useful services that could provide to the whole community, a coffee shop, ESL classroom, a much needed food bank, a thrift shop. I'd volunteer my time. Maybe an affordable daycare center can be housed into this space. It's time to dream and explore. What are being called to do?

What would we, LMLC, gain? A new ministry, no longer a concrete space for cars and trucks. Again what are we being called to do? Love, share, serve, bring God's love into community, bring the Good News, yes, the Good News.

Our hands, Gods work!

Thanks to everyone who came to hear the presentation by Bellwether Housing on May 13th. The information we heard was informative and helpful as we consider the potential ministry uses of our property. Watch for opportunities for similar presentations by other agencies in the weeks to come and plan to be in attendance to hear more about the exciting possibilities! Information packets about Bellwether Housing are available on the table outside the office.



It is the intent of your Congregational Council that, as we consider the possibilities such development offers, the conversation is a completely transparent and open one. There will continue to be numerous places for good conversation and feedback and we hope you'll be a part of that.

It is our fervent desire to serve God's church out of the abundance with which we have been gifted.

A few questions have surfaced multiple times, so here is some basic information in response to those:

How could we afford to build a building?

Luther Memorial would not build the building. We would sell a portion of our property to a developer of affordable housing.

Could we have input into the design and the services offered there?

Yes. We don't intend to be 'neighbors', we intend to be 'partners.'

Would we keep our building?

Yes. We intend to keep the Sanctuary, as it is sign and symbol of the risen Christ on this corner of Greenwood and 132nd. Whether our education/meeting/fellowship wing would remain or a new one would be built into the project is an aspect for further discussion.

We know that God is calling us....are we listening?

Operation Brown Bag-What goes in a lunch?

Ever wonder what is in the sack lunches we hand out Monday-Friday, 9-2? Our volunteers try very hard to have a well-rounded sack lunch for the hungry that come by for this program.



The lunches are made out of these options, depending on the donations we receive from you! 1 of each from the following goes in a typical sack lunch. We are currently in need of all items:

- Proteins Small can of Vienna sausage or tuna or a tuna or chicken salad lunch/cracker kit.
- **Fruit** Fruit cup, applesauce, raisins, or fruit leather.
- Drink Juice box, or pouch. Additional bottle of water handed out at the window, in the Spring and Summer.
- Dessert Pudding cup or small pack of cookies
- Grains Small bag of chips or package of crackers, and/or a granola bar.
- Care Items In the summer we hand out sunscreen (which we are well stocked on), and in the winter we hand out tissues, hand warmers, and hats and gloves, and chapstick.

We are so appreciative that our congregation has continually donated to this important outreach ministry to our neighborhood! Some days we have as many as 10-15 hungry people that come to our window, needing a meal.

Seattle Pride Parade

The 2014 Pride Parade is June 29th and this year the Celebrity Grand Marshall is George Takei. Pastor Julie will be out of town at her nephew's wedding that day, so we are looking for someone to head up the LMLC marchers. We march under the banner of the larger churches and it is a humbling and stunning and fun experience. Here's what PJ+ blogged after last year's march:



Yesterday members of our congregation marched in Seattle's PRIDE

Parade, along with twenty one other Lutheran congregations and agencies. We walked behind a big rainbow colored cross. We walked together, gay and straight, male and female and undecided. Because it didn't matter "what" we were. It mattered that we were God's beloved children, loved equally and loved so much that God sent Jesus because we are sinners. No one of us more than the other....just all of us beloved children and saints of God. Simul justus et peccator.

As we marched, the response of the crowd - thousands and thousands of people - was humbling. Loud applause...surprise...."Thank You" shouted time and time again....tearful faces, no doubt recalling pain they have experienced within the Church somehow. When we came to one grandstand the emcee was dressed in drag and was fabulous! Irreverent and hilarious with her commentary, she broke character for just a bit as this marching band of Lutheran Christians, who were walking amidst Methodists and Baptists, too, approached. "This is what Christianity is about!" The words echoed. The parade stopped. "Jesus loved everyone and wants us to love them too. He hung out with sinners and whores and tax collectors." The crowd grew still. It was the rapt attention every preacher knows. "These marchers are showing us the true face of Christianity!"



There are days when the Church gets it wrong. Terribly wrong. In the deepest and truest ways, we get it wrong. And we need the voice from the grandstand, dressed in sequins and falsies to remind us what is right. We need to join hands in 90 degree weather and shout messages of love to those who have so long only heard messages of hate. We need to listen to Jesus say that our task, our work, is not judgment, but love.

SPU Broadview Project Updates – June 18 Public Meeting Save the Date: Next Broadview Sewer and Drainage Improvement Public Meeting June 18

On Wednesday, June 18 from 6:30 – 8:30 p.m. at Bitter Lake Community Center we will have our next community meeting. At that time, we will present information and gather feedback from residents about leading 12th Avenue NW basin drainage alternatives, and Dayton Avenue N basin sewer alternatives. We will send out a postcard soon announcing this meeting. We hope you can join us.

Geotechnical Study and Groundwater Monitoring Work in Dayton Ave N Basin

As part of the project, we recently installed groundwater monitoring equipment in locations throughout southern and eastern Broadview. This geotechnical study will help SPU understand groundwater conditions as we plan for improvements to the sewer and drainage systems in the Dayton Ave N basin.

Next Steps

12th Ave NW Basin

Our goal is to identify preferred sewer and drainage improvements for the 12th Ave NW basin by the end of this year. As we move toward developing a preferred set of improvements for the 12th Ave NW basin, we will pair leading sewer and drainage alternatives. During this process, we will hold community meetings to provide updates and receive your input.

Dayton Ave N Basin

For the Dayton Ave N basin, our goal is to identify preferred sewer and drainage improvements by mid-2015. Later this year, we will evaluate drainage alternatives for this portion of Broadview. We will then pair leading sewer and drainage alternatives for this basin. Throughout this project, we will engage the community and seek your input on key project elements.

Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church.

1 Seventh Sunday of Easter

O Lord our God, we cry out to you for all the children of this world who are in harm's way. In their time of danger and fear send your strong Spirit to comfort them. For the children who have been taken from those they love, make a way home for them in safety.

- 2 Pray for the individuals and communities affected by severe spring storms, tornadoes and flooding. Pray that those who have lost loved ones will find the strength and peace they need to go on with their lives and that the ongoing recovery efforts supported by the ELCA will help them toward that goal.
- **3** Pray for the ELCA synods and their voting members who have synod assemblies in June that their work will be guided by the Holy Spirit and that their decisions will reflect the glory of God.
- 4 Pray for the Rev. Tessa Moon Leiseth and Jon Leiseth, ELCA missionaries in South Africa who are the Young Adults in Global Mission coordinators for Southern Africa.
- **5** As the season of summer camps returns, pray that those who attend the many ELCA Outdoor Ministry facilities will be blessed with an experience that will enrich their faith lives long after they return home.
- **6** Give thanks for the support from ELCA members that allows this church to fight hunger through its \$1 million in annual hunger grants, which help support domestic hunger-fighting organizations.
- 7 Lift up the ELCA Malaria Campaign as it expands to Namibia, where 73 percent of the population is at risk for 15 Holy Trinity/First Sunday after Pentecost the deadly but preventable disease.

8 Day of Pentecost

Dear God, on this Day of Pentecost place the Holy Spirit in our hearts. Let your Spirit fill all who are empty,

empower all who are weary and bring together all who are divided.

- **9** Give thanks for the ELCA International Leaders program and its scholarships, which help people like Nathalie Lassang of Cameroon attend medical school so she can provide health care in her home country.
- 10 Remember in your prayers the ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program as it expands to Rwanda and the Rev. Kate Warn, a country coordinator, as she prepares for the arrival the first participants to serve in Rwanda.
- 11 Pray with the leaders of this church that a political solution will be found to end the warfare in Syria and that the loved ones of the 140,000 people killed in violence since 2011 will be supported by the comforting embrace of God.
- 12 Pray for the people of Namibia who are suffering from the worst drought in 25 years and for the efforts of Lutheran Disaster Response to help those affected survive until a crop can be harvested.
- 13 Include in your prayers the Rev. Kevin Jacobson, an ELCA missionary serving in Suriname, and his parish ministry and leadership development work.
- 14 Lift up in your prayers the efforts of the ELCA e-Advocacy Network, comprised of ELCA members who regularly press our federal and state governments to approve public policies that protect God's creation and those living in it.

Almighty and everlasting God, the one in three and three in one, we lift all those who care for children. We ask that you bless those who have "fathered" us in their roles as parents, mentors and guides.

ELCA Prayer Ventures

- 16 Pray for the six members of the ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program serving in Mexico as they walk in accompaniment with our neighbors to the south, many of whom are dealing with economic hardship.
- 17 Give thanks for the 2014 ELCA World Hunger domestic grants that are helping 384 organizations fight hunger in their communities.
- 18 Give thanks for this church's Mission Builders, ELCA members who use their skills to help congregations, schools, camps and social ministry organizations construct or improve their facilities.
- 19 Pray for the efforts of the many people and organizations, including the ELCA, working to reduce poverty in the United States. Pray that the day will come when all of God's children will see an honest day's work rewarded with a living wage.
- 20 On this World Refugee Day, give thanks for the work of Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service, which for 75 years has been helping people around the the United States and the Caribbean and pray that world who are seeking to escape violence, persecution and economic hardship.
- 21 Remember in your prayers the Rev. Andrew and Barbara Hinderlie, ELCA missionaries serving in Tanzania as area program directors for East Africa.

22 Second Sunday after Pentecost

Lord, as we enter this season of summer we ask that you bless all who are far from home. Be their guide and protector. Keep them from all danger and misfortune. Travel with them and grant them peace.

23 Pray that the ministry of our ELCA military chaplains will be a source of comfort and strength for the men and women who are serving in harm's way while separated from their loved ones back home.

24 John the Baptist

Lift up our mission to engage more young people in the life of this church through expanded ministries to

youth and young adults — one of the goals of Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA.

- 25 Remember in your prayers the Rev. John Lunn, an ELCA missionary based in Tanzania. John is the international coordinator of Lutheran Global Health Volunteers, which places short-term volunteers into health care ministries in several countries.
- **26** We pray for those who are facing the challenges of mental illness. Lift up the ELCA social message "The Body of Christ and Mental Illness" and pray that as a church we will offer the companionship and encouragement they need to treat their illness.
- 27 Pray for the ecumenical ministries of this church at home as congregations reach out to the other faiths in their communities and worldwide as the ELCA cooperates with other faiths to further God's work in the global church.
- **28** Give thanks for the welcome shown through the 340 ELCA new-start ministries under development in God's words of love and forgiveness will heard by those eager to hear.

29 Third Sunday after Pentecost

Dear Lord, We pray for the ELCA global ministries throughout the world. We especially lift up the Joint Christian Ministry in West Africa, a partnership of West African churches that supports outreach and service with the Fulani people across the region.

A Church of Many Blessings! by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



There are those moments in life when I feel like I have lived a

charmed life. The Biblical word would be blessed. Blessing for me is the experience of being in rich relationships that mean me well. Looking back over my life I realize that there is a pathway that has led to the blessings.

It is the pathway of discovering the wider expressions of the church.

Let me just share a few of the

many that have charmed my life.

In 1983 I was blessed to tag along with Kim who was a delegate to the World Council of Churches in Vancouver, Canada. It was the most colorful pageantry of people all wearing their native dress and speaking in their own languages. Worship was a Pentecost experience with global music filling the air.

We were privileged to meet a priest, Fr. John Shaute, who served as the Pope's personal aide and Bishop Desmond Tutu who shared a mail box with Kim. Our world was expanding beyond our imaginations and shrinking to where we were breaking bread and sharing in conversation with world leaders. The ten days we spent in Vancouver have forever shaped our lives and the memories continue to bring us blessing. In 2006 I went on what for me was a daring adventure. I left my family behind and traveled to Northern Ethiopia where, along with Pr. Dick Grinsrud, we visited many of our Northwest

Washington Synod sister congregations of the Mekane Yesus church. It was fascinating to visit villages where the only way in was to walk on dirt roads. We shared in meals of goat, lamb, and chicken covered in spicy sauces and scooped up with pieces of injera. We stayed in places where there was no electricity and where a steel plow share was considered high technology.

The images of the agrarian life in the Bible were being played out before our very eyes. My time in Ethiopia and the people I met have been a great blessing to me.

Three times I have been privileged to participate in a Churchwide Assembly. The first was tagging along again with Kim who was a voting member at the Constituting Convention in Ohio. It was an historic moment that was filled with anticipation. Later we would attend in Orlando and this last year in Pittsburgh. My eyes on each occasion filled with tears to witness the way this church cares for the world. I hope those of you who attended our recent Synod Assembly were equally inspired.

The opportunity to serve as your Bishop is another example of the privilege of seeing the width and depth of this church we love. Kim and I typically travel to a different congregation each Sunday where we are warmly welcomed and have the opportunity to share in stories of how Christ is present and moving amongst God's people here in the Northwest. It is a great honor to see and experience the abundance of life and joy lived out in our churches. You dear friends have been a great blessing in our lives

I want to encourage all of you to be open to the invitation, the opportunity to participate in the many expressions of this church which together we know as the Body of Christ.

I think their Relationship is Serious

Getting married doesn't take much commitment. <u>Being</u> married is quite something else. When we say someone is getting *serious*, do we mean that the couple is *serious* about getting married or do we mean really *serious* about being in a relationship?



Are these people really willing to accept the inevitable disappointments that come with seeing who their partner <u>really</u> is, grieve the ideal they held and settle down with another real human for 50 or 60 years? Or, worse, to settle in with themselves and who <u>they</u> really are for 50 or 60 years? That is *seriously* a question. Well, let's get *serious*; no one is really prepared for <u>that!</u>

More to the point, are they prepared to believe in a God who has enough grace to cover that much adjustment? Really investing in a relationship will stretch and test anyone's faith, sometimes to the limit. Ah, but the rewards!

So maybe we should really ask whether they are ready for a really *serious* relationship with God! The relationship with God will have to grow or the container of grace for the marriage won't be large enough. We will have to rely on resentments and irritability to keep our partner "in line." Soon, that relationship will sour!

It is not just our or our partner's imperfections that will test us. Entwining with another life leaves more room for difficult things happening to a spouse as well as yourself. Sickness, job loss, death, problems with children can all be part of life's unexpected turns. Relationships sometimes crack under such strain.

Navigating such challenges is a journey of faith. Fortunately, God is *very serious* about providing grace for the journey. *Seriously*!
