Recently, a friend of mine participated in a mock disaster drill at Sea-Tac Airport. The exercise simulated an airport related disaster. The actors were given roles to play, including how they were wounded and what their emotional and physical responses were to be. They were dressed with very realistic looking wounds via make up and costume special effects. At the end of the drill, there was a place for them to return those "wounds"; here's the picture my friend posted to her Facebook Page.



If only it were this simple. If only we could take all that has wounded us and simply place them in a box, laying those particular burdens down.

It has been difficult for me this week not to consider the woundedness of the world. As wildfires devour everything in their paths, just over the mountains....as floods rage in the Midwest.....as storms churn off the coast...I consider the woundedness of Creation. Scripture says creation groans, and this is true. And we have played a part in this, that try as we might, we cannot shrink from. The week also brings word of escalating wars and violence, in Israel and Palestine, in Syria, in Ukraine. Wars that claim the lives of many innocents, including 293 souls on a passenger plane. Wars that have their foundation, as most wars do, in our inability to see one another as beloved Children of God. Violence rooted deeply in hatred of the "other."

Local news brings stories of lives lost in accidents and violence...of crime that rises like the summer temperatures.

Returning our collective woundedness seems to me to be a more difficult task than returning our personal wounds. Perhaps I am wrong about this. Maybe I am so overwhelmed by the shared societal wounds that I can't see my way to the RETURN box.

Of course, this box sits at the feet of Jesus. Or maybe he's holding it in his arms, patiently hoping that we remember his invitation to bring our heavy burdens to him...to come to him with our wounds and broken places and offer them to him.

I have recently started to "pray the news"....some days it is the only way I can bear to watch or read it. With every disaster, with every report of increased violence, with every accident or fire or drowning or attack, I offer prayers for those involved. I know this might sound overly pious or like it has the potential to be very longwinded, and I don't want you to think that I am chanting formal prayers with every news report. Mostly I sit and pray "Lord, have mercy" over and over again.

This is also a good plan for our personal wounds, too. I recently heard it said that until

we acknowledge the broken places in our lives...until we recognize that the wounded pieces of our hearts and spirit are pieces that God loves too, we will never fully return to wholeness. I'm still working on that, day by day.

Being part of this community of faith brings light and life to us all, whatever our wounds. Hearing the stories that shape us does the same thing. Singing the songs of our faith lifts us up. Sharing the peace of Christ binds us together. And prayer invites us to trust that the very One who created us and all that is stands ready and able to bear our shame, our brokenness, and carry our wounds.

Jesus said "Come to me, all of you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest."

May we trust that this invitation is true.


Greening Congregation



Evangelical Lutheran Church in America God's work. Our hands. These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the church.

Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church.

1 Pray for the safety of all the people threatened by the violence in the conflict between Israel and Hamas in the Gaza Strip, including the members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. Pray for an end to the violence and that negotiations for a lasting peace will be pursued.

2 Pray for the state of our world, a world in which unaccompanied children flee across borders in search of better life. Pray for the ELCA members who are working through Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service and Lutheran social service ministries to help find foster care for these children.

3 Seventh Sunday after Pentecost

Ever-loving God, quiet our souls before you, speak to us from your word and refresh us with the living bread of life that is Christ, through Jesus, our Savior and Lord.

4 As stewards of God's creation, we pray with the leaders of the ELCA and The Episcopal Church that limits on carbon emissions be approved in an effort to limit climate change, which particularly threatens lowincome communities that lack the resources and technology to adapt to rapid environmental changes.

5 As they begin their six-year terms in service to this church, pray for the six new ELCA synod bishops who were elected at their 2014 synod assemblies: John Macholz – Upstate New York Synod; Gerald Mansholt – East-Central Synod of Wisconsin; Patricia Lull – Saint Paul Area Synod; Abraham Allende – Northeastern Ohio Synod; Terry Brandt – Eastern North Dakota Synod; Michael Rhyne – Allegheny Synod; and the nine bishops who were re-elected.

6 Pray for the ministries of the ELCA that work with people who have served time in prison and now are trying to start a new life, such as Living Gospel Ministries in Philadelphia.

7 Remember in your prayers ELCA missionaries the Rev. Lancelot Themba and Kwena Mkhabela, regional

representatives for West Africa.

8 Lift up the participants in the ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program as they conclude this month their year of accompaniment with Lutheran companion churches overseas.. Pray for God's guidance as they finish this journey and prepare for the next chapter in their lives.

9 Remember in your prayers the ELCA military chaplains and the people they serve – people who are too often facing difficult days in which ending their lives may seem to them the only option. As we give thanks for their service, pray that God's unconditional love will become a light in their darkness.

10 Ninth Sunday after Pentecost

We thank you, O God, for teachers throughout the world. Give them strength, patience and guidance as many prepare to begin a new school year; in the name of Jesus we pray.

11 Give thanks that the ELCA Malaria Campaign has raised more than \$12 million toward its goal of \$15 million and that through the generosity of ELCA members, the campaign is making a difference in 13 African countries.

12 Give thanks for the new worshiping communities of the ELCA, such as Faith in Action in Detroit, and the impact their ministries have on the daily lives of many.

13 Remember in your prayers the six members of the ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program who will begin a year of service in Rwanda this month – the first group to serve in that country.

14 Lift up the ELCA's Ethnic Specific and Multicultural Ministries, which help us work toward realizing a truly multicultural church that works together to understand and address life's issues, complexities and questions.

15 Remember in your prayers ELCA missionary



Mr. Fix-It by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



am a "wanna be" fix-it guy. Over the years I have prided myself in being able to figure out why something is not working and come up with a solution. I have also had my fair share of disasters like the time I blew up our oven trying to fix its clock and timer. (Safety tip: It is always a good thing to kill the power to any appliance that you are working on.)

This summer my challenge

has been to get the trailer lights working on our boat trailer. Salt water is not a friend of electrical parts. The problem started the first with the truck itself. Kim said to me one day, "Have you noticed one of the lights is staying on even with the keys removed?"

Sure enough we have a series of LED lights just under the tail gate and one of them was on even through all of the lights were turned off. It took the help of my diesel mechanic to realize it was a problem with the flashing module. The bugger off the shelf costs a \$100.00. Fortunately my friend found one for half the price.

Knowing the lights were now working on the truck, I hooked up the trailer only to discover that the left turn indicator trailer light was not working. My mechanic friend explained to me how to try and test the light by taking power off of a known working light. The idea was a good one until I pushed the probe into the socket only to have all of the lights go out including the lights on the truck.

I was now having a few words with Jesus about this dilemma, knowing full well I probably blew up the \$50.00 flasher module. I did not sleep well that night.

The job would have to wait for my mechanic. The next day he arrived and immediately located the 15 cent fuse under the hood that I had blown and quickly determined that a wire had come loose in the main harness. Both were an easy fix.

Once again Mr. Fix-It was put in his rightful place. But the good news was two-fold. The lights on the trailer are working splendidly and the price of a fuse is nothing in comparison to a flasher module.

Friends, the lesson for me in this story is that I become obsessed with trying to make things work in my life when they don't go just the way I want them to. I allow my problems to become much greater than they truly are.

It's called keeping perspective. It's called not getting worked up. It's called being clear about what really matters in life.

Jesus put it this way in Matthew 6:25-27: "For this reason I say to you, do not be worried about your life, as to what you will eat or what you will drink; nor for your body, as to what you will put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? "Look at the birds of the air, that they do not sow, nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not worth much more than they? "And who of you by being worried can add a single hour to his life?"

Maritime Ministry & the Mission to Seafarers

Mission to Seafarers Luncheon

Saturday, August 23 at 11am Aboard the Star Princess at Pier 91, Smith Cove Cruise Terminal, Seattle

The NW WA Synod Maritime Ministry, in support of our work with The Mission to Seafarers and its Board of Directors, cordially invites YOU to the Annual Benefit Luncheon Hosted by the Princess Cruises Community Foundation. All proceeds will benefit The Mission to Seafarers.

This luncheon represents the Mission's major fundraiser each year. Over the past eleven years they have raised tens of thousands of dollars to help provide communications opportunities for merchant seafarers who are unable to leave the ship as well

as transportation for those merchant seafarers and cruise ship employees who can go ashore to shop, get medical help, or just visit a friendly place. During the Holiday Season, they provide 'Ditty Bags' - shoe bag-sized gift bags filled with toiletries, stocking

caps, candy, and often a New Testament. Last year volunteers packed and distributed more than 1,300 of these Ditty Bags.

A partner in this effort, the Princess Cruises Community Foundation, has generously provided for auction a seven-night cruise for two, to either the Caribbean or the Mexican Riviera. The cruise will be auctioned during the luncheon and you will have additional opportunities to show your support for the Mission and the Christmas-at-Sea Ditty Bag

program. There will be other auction items available as well.

Please consider bringing a group of friends to the luncheon. In addition to the excellent cuisine and service provided by the Golden Princess' crew, this is a chance to let your friends know about

our ministry to seafarers: a group of hard-working people who are often marginalized and taken for granted, and whose occupation is one of the most dangerous in the world. Dear Bishop Younan,

On behalf of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, I am writing to express profound concern for you, our sisters and brothers in Christ. Our hearts are heavy as we read about and see images of the violence being inflicted on both Israelis and Palestinians. This suffering and loss of life are inexcusable before God. As followers with you of the Prince of Peace, and as children of God, the Creator and Sustainer of all life, we long for peace and a just resolution to the escalating conflict between the State of Israel and the Palestinian people. I want to respond directly to your <u>call</u> to us earlier this week to participate in interventions and actions "to create hope in a hopeless situation".

The steadfastness of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL) is a reminder of this hope we have in Christ Jesus. The church's strong witness for coexistence grounded in peace with justice permeates every level of congregational, educational, and diaconal service. Our faith is strengthened by knowing how, even in the midst of great difficulties, the Body of Christ is working in Palestine and Jordan for the good of all communities.

Along with the witness of your pastors and lay leaders, your witness, Bishop Younan, has strengthened our confidence that peace can indeed be achieved among the two peoples and three religions that share the Holy Land. Your statements, speeches, and sermons have been a model for promoting both political and interreligious coexistence, along with your strong support of the Council of Religious Institutions of the Holy Land, which you helped found.

We are grateful for your continued uplifting of the voices of moderation and against extremism and support to you in these efforts. We appreciate the long-standing work of the ELCJHL schools in demonstrating the importance of education though a curriculum based on peace, nonviolence, peaceful co-existence and the strengthening of civil society for the benefit of all communities. We understand that this present crisis has further hurt the financial wellbeing of the ELCJHL schools, as many parents are now unable to pay tuition. We encourage ELCA members and congregations to assist the ELCJHL by making contributions through the ELCA.

At this time of great uncertainty, we join you in your call for a cessation of all hostilities between Israel and Hamas and a return to direct peace talks to achieve a comprehensive and sustainable peace based upon a two-state solution and adherence to international human rights and humanitarian law. We wish to convey our solidarity with you and the members of ELCJHL congregations, joining with you in prayers for peace. I encourage all ELCA congregations to participate in a minute of silence as we together pray for peace in the Holy Land.

While I lament that my plan to be present with you and with the leaders and members of the ELCJHL later this month has been postponed, I look forward to our time together in Jordan and the Holy Land. We deeply regret that the most recent round of negotiations have not reached a successful outcome that will lead to peace and security for Palestinians and Israelis alike. We reaffirm our pledge to work diligently with you and all people of good will to urge political leaders in the United States and around the world contribute to ending this conflict by addressing its root causes so a sustainable peace is possible.

May God be with you, your church and all the people of the Holy Land.



That Serious Condition

Remember last month when we addressed *serious* and critical conditions? Well, it turns out that these terms don't really exist in the medical world. These are terms that the hospital administration uses to give the public and the family some idea about the patient's condition. *Serious* is something like; the patient <u>is considering</u> dying but the doctors can probably prevent it. Critical is; the patient <u>intends</u> to die, but the doctors are doing everything they can to stop it.



We wish things were more precise so we know what we can count on. We get uncomfortable with ambiguity and we want to know how things will turn out. Then we act as if the script had already been written and we are upset that someone won't show it to us.

But maybe our situations really <u>are</u> undecided as they unfold. As uncomfortable as we are with ambiguity, maybe it is precisely ambiguity which leaves room for God to act. Maybe God's gracious influence and presence needs opportunity to work. Maybe God even needs our openness to divine intervention to make room for it, at least on occasion.

Could it be that our perception of whether a situation is *serious* or critical might sometimes influence the outcome? *Serious* offers more hope. Could we enter the ambiguity with the hope that the situation is only *serious* and invite God to join us in the struggle? Could we do this regardless of what *serious* "really" means?

Maybe living in the ambiguity of *serious* situations is our pathway to finding God's grace where it otherwise might be hidden.


