There are lots of mysteries in life, but the one I'm currently pondering is this: "Who ARE the LOVE NINJA's?" On my first Sunday back since returning from my grandmother's funeral in Illinois, I found heart shaped notes of love in the pulpit and on the missal stand on the altar! "God is Always With You" one reminded me! "You are Never Alone" said the other. Both were signed "The Love Ninja's" I was then told that similar notes were sticking out of hymnals and tucked into the pew racks. So, during the Children's Time, we talked about how a word of love and encouragement is a sign from God.

A reminder of God's constant presence with us. We also told the "tall kids" in the pews that there might be notes in their hymnals. RIGHT then and there, folks began to leaf through their hymnals! And each time someone found a note from the Love Ninjas

their faces LIT UP and they beamed with delight. Love does spread, just like light.

As people shook my hand leaving worship, more than a few told me how meaningful it was to them to find those notes. Some were taking them home to put on their refrigerators or mirrors. One person was going to keep it in her car to look at on her drive to work each day. Another was taking his with him to hide as a surprise for someone else.

The next day I got a text message from one of our precious older members. (Yes, folks of ALL ages should learn to text; in case of emergencies it's much more reliable than a phone signal might be.) Her text said: "This is the love ninja wishing you a wondrous day." What a gift that was! I smiled all afternoon!

A part of our call as disciples and followers of Christ is to share the light and love of Christ with a world in pain. The pain in the world is sometimes very evident: racial tensions,

> violence, intolerance, war -There are other painful situations, too, of course: unexpected diagnoses, the loss of a job, a broken relationship of any kind. And then there are those pains that sit under the surface. We think we have them under control, but

really we've just pushed them down for a time. Like a granddaughter who was extraordinarily blessed to have her grandmother for 54 years and yet still grieves her loss. Even those justbeneath-the-surface losses need a word of love.

they remind us on the news each day of the world's pain.

Stewardship Living

A study by Harvard University shows that 80% of youth say that their parents are more concerned with their achievements than whether they care for others. To flesh this out a little bit, that would suggest that 80% of parents care more about whether their son or daughter makes good grades, makes the team, or is chosen for the club than they care about if their son or daughter is kind to their classmates or cares about their sick neighbor.



Of course, what this study says is that 80% of youth SAY that their parents feel this way. It does not say that 80% of parents ACTUALLY feel this way.

What we know is that it is easier to measure achievements than it is to measure compassion and it is easier, perhaps, to affirm achievements as well. In these days, though, our stewardship of our parenting efforts and our influence in our children's lives calls for us to purposefully affirm kindness and compassion in our youth.

How can we do this? Here are some suggestions for stewardship living:

As a family, talk about where there are needs in your neighborhood or in your family. Do you know someone who just had surgery? Take them a meal that you prepare and deliver as a family. Include a note or a drawing. Does an elderly or infirm neighbor need a lawn mowed or snow shoveled?



Do your children have classmates who need extra encouragement? Consider with your daughter or son how they might offer that encouragement.

When old enough, explore with your son or daughter places where they might offer their volunteer services. Talk about vocation as that place where their gifts meet the worlds needs.

Harvard suggests that families develop a daily ritual at bedtime or dinner or while driving that expressed thanks for those who contribute positively in our lives. The church might call that family prayer!

Rally Sunday! - God's Work. Our Hands.

September 7th is RALLY SUNDAY, that Sunday when we all "rally" back together after summer activities and our Sunday morning schedule returns to Sunday Church School at 9am for ages 3 through 8th grade. On the First Sunday of each month, we have First Sunday Faith Forum for adults in the Fireside Room – watch for the schedule of topics. School Supplies for Broadview Thomsen: Colored pencils (12 pack), pencil pouches/boxes, #2 pencils with erasers in packages of 6-12, colored markers in packages of 12-24, poster paints, box of 16 crayons, folders with two pockets – red & green, pointed scissors, glue sticks – pkg. of 3 or 6, three ring binder, ruler –inches and centimeters, 1 package (ream) of copy paper.

Lunch Supplies: Small packages of tuna fish/crackers, individual cans of meat, (must be self opening), crackers with peanut butter, small packages of cookies, individual fruit snack cups/applesauce, granola bars, pudding cups, hard candies, bottles of water.

What is the AmazonSmile Foundation?

The AmazonSmile Foundation is a 501(c)(3) private foundation created by Amazon to administer the AmazonSmile program. Friends of Piper's Orchard to Host Eighth Annual Festival of Fruit

The Friends of Piper's Orchard invite the community to join them in celebrating Carkeek Park's historic orchard on September 13. Events will include cider pressing and tasting, live music, activities for kids, guided tours of the historic orchard and more.

When: Saturday, September 13, 2013

What time: 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. (cider making presentation will run from 2:30 – 4) **Where:** Carkeek Park Environmental Learning Center, 950 N.W. Carkeek Park Rd., Seattle

Cost: The festival is free and open to the public.

Parking: Visitors are encouraged to park below the learning center. Volunteers will be directing guests.

All are welcome to join for:

- **Informational presentations:** Experts including the renowned Dr. Bob Norton, retired research scientist from WSU Extension in Mt. Vernon, and Shaun Shepherd from Portland's Home Orchard Society will give talks on apple varieties and identification.
- **Apple identification:** Bring apples from your home orchard for variety identification.
- Fresh pressed cider: Visitors are encouraged to try out making cider the old-fashioned way, with a hand cranked cider press.
- **Homemade pie:** Visitors are welcome to donate homemade pies. Fresh warm cider and slices of homemade pie will be available for a nominal cost, with proceeds to support ongoing maintenance of the orchard.
- **Orchard tours:** Expert volunteers who have painstakingly restored the orchard will lead tours, pointing out the heirloom varieties that are going strong as well as younger trees and newly planted grape vines.
- **Apple Tasting:** Visitors will have the chance to taste heirloom apple varieties that are grown in the orchard.
- **Kids' crafts:** Little ones will enjoy organized arts and crafts activities.
- Cider making presentation: Watch and learn how to make cider during a presentation starting at 2:30 p.m.

The Friends of Piper's Orchard is a group of dedicated volunteers who discovered and then rescued the historic North Seattle orchard from invasive plants. The annual Festival of Fruit raises awareness and funds to help the volunteers ensure that the orchard, originally planted in the 1890s, will survive at least another 100 years.

The Festival is sponsored by Friends of Piper's Orchard, Seattle Parks and Recreation, Carkeek Park Advisory Council, Seattle Tree Fruit Society and City Fruit.



The Liturgy of September by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



September is upon us again and I have yet to transition into this month without developing a knot in my stomach. This is where fear takes up residency in my life. I know the source of this fear. It dates all the way back to the first day of school. I never slept well the night before - worried about whether I would like my teacher, who would I be seated next to, did I know

my times tables, and did I have the right clothes to wear? This fear was also dosed with a certain level of excitement and anticipation of what the new year might hold.

When it came time to send our own kids off to school, I relived these same memories as I watched them gear up for the transition. One daughter slept in the new clothes she was going to wear on the first day and was up at O-Dark-Thirty ready to go. Another daughter was sorely disappointed when we woke her up for the second day of kindergarten. "You mean I have to go again?"

Two of my daughters are now public school teachers. I watch them go through their own version of fear and anticipation each year. Little do the students know that their teachers share some of their same feelings about starting a new year.

We live two blocks from the elementary school our daughters attended and where our one daughter now teaches. I watch the kids decked out in their new clothes and bright backpacks, chasing after one another as they participate in this annual trek back to school. I watch the school buses whiz by with kids staring out the windows knowing that some are as scared as I was.

We do not acknowledge the first day of school in our liturgical calendars. Perhaps it does not rise to the proper level of holiness. I wish we did because for me it captures a good deal of what it means to be human. It is about transition and being called to trust the future. It is about facing our fears so that we can stretch and grow. It is about letting go, being vulnerable and discovering new horizons. God never allows us to become a settled people. Summer vacation always comes to an end.

I must confess I enter into my second year serving the office of bishop with many of the same feelings that I had as child gearing up for another year of school. It comes with that same mixture of fear, excitement and anticipation. Friends, for me this is the pathway of faith. It is the constant discovery that future is in God and means us well.

Lord God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

A resource available to our congregations

Recently I participated in an online webinar about social media for ministry. It is part of a free series of webinars produced by the Gulf Coast Synod

and the SW Texas Synod - and made available to anyone (yes, you, too!) LEAD (Living Everyday as Disciples) provides a series of 10-minute webinars, one per month, aimed at equipping congregation council leaders. Topics range from understanding congregational dynamics to creating a strategic agenda to developing a missional budget. I hope you will find them useful and promote them. Below I share my notes from the presentation made by Pastor David Hansen, regarding using social media for ministry. Perhaps this will be good fodder for your congregational conversations. I know it has sparked a desire in me to re-examine the way that the synod uses social media. Wanna talk more about it? Come by the synod office for coffee and a chat -

Three Foundational Principles of Social Media for Ministry:

Social Media is about relationships.

The church helps build relationships with God AND the church helps build relationships with one another. The use of social media helps connect us through shared passions, ongoing conversations and the creation of new connections.

Questions for your congregation to consider: How will this social media tool help us build relationships? How can it help connect people?

Social Media is about listening.

Too often we only consider social media tools to tell people about our congregation - as though it were an electronic bull horn - another way to get the word out about congregational news and upcoming

events. But social media is not the same as broadcast media. It is a two way street - it is, as the name implies, social or interactive. Therefore, social media must also be about listening.

Questions for your congregation to consider: What are the topics in your community? What are the topics your congregation members are talking about on social media? What are others saying about your church? Take note: even if others are not talking about you - that says something, too.

Social Media is about reaching into the community. The weekly Sunday bulletin reaches those who were in attendance. Your monthly church newsletter reaches those who are on your mailing list. Social media provides a way to connect with folks beyond your doors. Some social media tools are designed precisely to connect people who may not already know one another around shared interests. Chances are, there are other organizations from your community who are already online. Listen to them: What are they talking about? What are the news stories that matter? What are the events people are talking about? Listen - and then join the conversation. Become knowledgeable about information for and about your wider community.

Many congregations serve as the community center for their neighborhoods. You can do this in your online presence as well by becoming a

virtual community center - an online neighborhood center. Provide information that matters to the whole community, promote community businesses, share events, and lift up prayer concerns for the neighborhood. Provide an online space for the whole community - not just your members, but for the whole community. Our world has changed - we used to ask what we wanted people to do for us: attend worship, to know about our bible studies, have access to our calendars and announcements, and participate in youth group events. We still

want those things, of course. But now the shaping question in our social world has changed. Now we ask, "What can we do for our community? What can we do for our neighborhood?"



That Serious Condition If nothing is Serious, Nothing is Funny

"Want to hear a dirty joke?" said the second grader. "A pig fell into a mud puddle!" The child proceeds to roll on the floor laughing, watches you enjoy their reaction and then tells you the same joke again, hoping for the same reaction.



Of course what is *serious* is that we don't want our children telling dirty jokes. What is funny is that the child doesn't know what one is, but they know you don't want them telling one. So they bait you with the opening line and then laugh, for reasons they could not even begin to explain. If there were not a *serious* prohibition against dirty jokes, there would be no humor in this at all.

Dark humor is often the flip side of *serious*. When a tragedy strikes, sometimes a constant gaze at the pain is too much to maintain. We make jokes of it to keep it from overwhelming us. Death is a prime candidate for such treatment.

Sometimes we can even find humor when the joke is on us. We see a part of ourselves that we take very *seriously* and someone pokes fun at it. On occasion, we are able to momentarily step outside of our life and death perspective on whatever this is. We see that in the grand scheme of things, our having or not having this as a part of us will not be the end of the world.

A friend once received a card which read, "Laugh at your problems, everyone else does!" She saw the irony immediately, and found the card quite cheery.

Our problems can be humorous precisely because they are *serious*. Perhaps God is even laughing at your problems at this very minute. God can because God knows that *serious* is not the final word about our existence. Remember, that the *serious* side is only a side. It's not the whole enchilada. Hey, Laugh! That was a joke!
