As I write this, Thanksgiving is a week away, but the holiday lights at my neighborhood grocery store and shopping complex were shining for the first time tonight. I must confess that I felt a shiver of excitement when I saw them illuminated! In a week and a half it will be here.....

ADVENT!

Of course, nothing in our culture is heralding

the arrival of Advent. It's all already about Christmas. All of this fanfare is more about helping us part with our money than it is with waiting for a Savior. But even the cynical part of me feels

a thrill at the first lights of the season.

Last year, during the first two weeks of Advent, Bruce and I realized my life long dream of returning to Germany, where I lived as a very small child and where he went to high school. While I had anticipated many things, I was nonetheless surprised by the wonderful way the Germans kept Advent. Advent in Germany is more than a season for the Church, it is a time kept by the culture. Posters in the town squares invited us to Advent concerts and Advent celebrations and Advent exhibits. Hotels, department stores, train stations, and airport lobbies were adorned with Advent wreaths and on Sundays, the candles were lit with care. If for no other reason, I came to love this home of my ancestors for its keeping of Advent - its willingness to wait and acknowledge the waiting.

This year, it is my hope to create a place where waiting is welcomed, both in our home AND in our church home. I am hopeful that you will find space there to consider what it is for which you wait. Do you await news?

> Recovery? A relationship? The perfect job? In many ways, waiting is hard. In our culture we can instant message and watch our favorite shows on demand. We don't have much practice waiting.

In this season, then, when we wait for the Christ child, our waiting turns to longing for Jesus. The commercials, Facebook ads, and emails from Groupon want us to fill our waiting with purchasing. Instead, let's fill our waiting with reflection, silence, prayer....with candles, song, and sighs too deep for words.

Soon, the manger will hold a child, Mary will ponder what it all means and the magi will journey toward the light of a star. And in time, our waiting will be over. Even so, Lord Jesus, quickly come.



Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church.

1: In this Advent season, we anticipate and acknowledge the presence of the light that no darkness can overcome, Jesus Christ.

2: Grounded in prayer, we hope that the current truce following the recent war between Israel and Hamas in Gaza will hold so that God's peace and justice will prevail.

3: We give thanks for the ELCA Church Council which has approved the implementation of this church's Disability Ministries and Youth and Young Adult programs into *Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA*.

4: More than 2 billion people – a third of the world's population – do not have access to improved sanitation and remain at risk for cholera. We give thanks for ELCA members and partners working to improve sanitation facilities around the world.

5: We give thanks for ELCA members and others who have contributed \$13 million to the ELCA Malaria Campaign in their effort to raise \$15 million by 2015. Through the campaign, ELCA members have joined with companion Lutheran churches and partners in 13 African countries to prevent and treat malaria, educate communities about the disease and more.

6: Grant ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton and other ELCA leaders joy and a spirit of bold trust, that their work may stir us to a life of fruitful service.

7: In daily life cultural, ethnic and racial differences matter, but they can be seen and celebrated as what God intends them to be — blessings rather than means of oppression and discrimination.

8: Ever living God, strengthen and sustain the membership of this church, that with patience and understanding we may continue to love and care for your people.

9: We give thanks for the "appreciative inquiry" process led by our presiding bishop, a process that recognizes the ministries that this church does well and areas in which there's room to grow. By thinking together, we can imagine what God is calling this church to be.

10: We give thanks for the generosity of the more than 3.8 million ELCA members, as we strive to be faithful in our efforts to strengthen the life-impacting ministries of this church.

11: We give thanks for Lutheran Disaster Response, which enables ELCA members to partner alongside people and communities impacted by a disaster, as together we navigate our way through recovery.

12: Lord God, you have called this church to respond to the needs of the unaccompanied children arriving in the United States. Guide us as we continue to look for ways to respond, including advocacy and strengthening relationships with Lutheran churches overseas.

17: We give thanks for ELCA members and others who have contributed more than \$2.5 million to support humanitarian assistance for survivors of Typhoon Haiyan, which struck the Philippines one year ago.

18: We give thanks for the congregations of this church and lift up their commitments restoring and reconciling communities in a fragmented world.

19: Through the ELCA Book of Faith Initiative encourage all members, from children to adults, to dig deeper into our book of faith, the Bible.

20: We praise you for your servant Katharina von Bora Luther, renewer of the church, whom we commemorate on this day. Like Katharina, raise up in our own day teachers and prophets with voices that give strength to this church.

21: As we light the four candles for Advent, open our eyes to see Christ's presence among us.

22: As congregations are invited to study *The Use of the Means of Grace*, guide our worshiping community's conversation.

23: We give thanks for Lutheran World Relief, an ELCA partner, dedicated to ending poverty, injustice and human suffering around the world.

24: Gloria in excelsis Deo! Glory to God in the highest! We join the angels tonight, singing God's highest praise for what God has done. Glory to God in the highest and peace to you on this Christmas Eve!

25: Whatever we feel today, isolated or at one with those around us, we give thanks that God is with us! Christ has come to dwell with us!

26: Almighty God, give us such an awareness of your mercies that with thankful hearts we praise you.

27: We give thanks for John, apostle and evangelist, whom we celebrate on this day, and pray that the brightness of God's light shine on this church, and that all may walk in the light of truth.

28: On this day we remember the Holy Innocents, martyrs, and the slaughter of innocent children in Bethlehem by order of King Herod. Guide all those who lead to do so in justice and love.



Advent's Invitation by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



Advent is upon us again and with it comes the scurry of activities that lead up to the celebration of the Christ child's birth.

It stirs within me memories about how we celebrated Advent with our children as they were growing up. The two family traditions we participated in were the daily opening of the Advent calendar and the lighting of the Advent candles. They both created their own challenges. We

spent too many years fighting over whose turn it would be perform the rituals. Kim eventually assigned each child a day.

We had one daughter who simply could not resist opening up the little doors of the calendar ahead of their assigned day. She is the same child who knew what all of her presents were before she opened them. This came from the constant examination of them as they sat beneath the Christmas tree. She also could not keep a secret of what she purchased for her sisters and often insisted they open their presents before Christmas Day. She still struggles with waiting.

When it came to the lighting of the Advent candles and the accompanying reading we were hopeless. We just could not lend to it the seriousness that it deserved. The kids and their father too often used funny voices or tried to cut out sections of the readings so we could get on with dinner. At least one child insisted on playing with the candle wax. And there was the battle over who got to blow out the candles. Mother was not happy with us and on more than one occasion threatened to end the whole celebration. We protested her threat, even though we made fun of the rituals, because we were not prepared to go without.

Somehow we knew that there was something holy in what we were doing. Somehow we knew the marking of each day with these rituals was a way to add value to the expectation of the mystery. The mystery that there is a God. The mystery that this God takes up residency in our world. The mystery that our God becomes human clothed in baby flesh. The mystery of God's constant coming into the world.

This is what ritual does. It calls us back to the truth. It invites us again and again to consider how something so much greater than what we can comprehend can come to be. It invites us to set aside all of the distractions of our lives to entertain for just a few moments what it means that there is a God who cares so deeply for our lives and the whole creation. A God who has the capacity to delight in God's children. Even those who lack proper reverence. Now this is a great God.

May this Advent season be a time that invites you into the mystery of the incarnation. May it provide you with a few moments of holy laughter in the midst of your preparation and anticipation of the word made flesh. Christ has died! Christ is risen! Christ will come again!

ELCA Good Gifts

With the season of Advent and gift-giving upon us, ELCA Good Gifts are a creative, meaningful way

to support the ministries of the ELCA that mean the most to you and your loved ones. The items in their catalog lift up examples of work being done in different projects and programs supported by funds from the ELCA: the ELCA Fund for Leaders, ELCA Global Church Sponsorship, the ELCA Malaria

Campaign, ELCA New Congregations, ELCA Vision for Mission, ELCA World Hunger and Lutheran Disaster Response. Each of these programs is a long-term, partnership-based ministry that focuses on the needs identified by local congregations and global companion churches and their communities.

How does this work?

When you give an ELCA Good Gift you are supporting work within a specific category of ministry. For example, when you give a gift to "stock a health clinic," your donation goes on to support the

health care ministries of ELCA World Hunger where needed most. This allows our global companions to determine how these funds can make the biggest impact in their local contexts, and ensure that our work is sustainable. While exact administrative

costs vary from program to program, the fundraising and administrative costs of our work are kept to a minimum. More than 90 percent of your gifts directly support programmatic work; less than 10 percent is used for administration and fundraising. Because of our longstanding, local partnerships around the world, our administrative costs are significantly lower than other organizations.

What is the difference between ELCA Good Gifts and similar organizations?

Many other organizations are doing wonderful work around the world, and some do work in similar ways. A main difference between the ELCA and other programs is that this church receives almost all of the money to fund its work directly through

its congregations and members, and almost all of the money that we distribute goes to support the work being carried out by our congregations, global companion churches and ecumenical partners. This is unique because the church is our delivery system. It is successful because the church is present in far corners of the world and already connected and trusted in communities. And finally, it is sustainable. Our churches and partners are the ones who identify local needs and solutions; we just help make those dreams a reality.

What about animals? How can I talk about the importance of animals with others?

The animals of God's Global Barnyard are among some of the most popular gifts in the catalog.

Your gifts to God's Global Barnyard support the sustainable development ministries of ELCA World Hunger, which include training, education, resources (and more) to help the community care for animals and create new market opportunities like starting a small business selling eggs, meat or dairy products.

Your gifts support this comprehensive approach to animal husbandry. In an effort to help educate others – like your Sunday school

class – about the relationship between animals and hunger, check out the Animals and Hunger Toolkit. The toolkit provides lessons, activities and more to explore how animals help families and communities in need.
