I'm writing this beneath our Christmas tree on December 26th, technically the second day of Christmas (are you humming the song in your head yet?) Already newscasts are telling us how to recycle our

Christmas trees. It's DECEMBER 26th! We have ten days left in the Christmas season! Already the radio stations who were playing carols 24 hours a day have moved on to the regular programming. Thank goodness for Spotify and Pandora. It's still Christmas in our house.

And it will remain Christmas in the sanctuary until January 6th. We are reminded that the church keeps a different calendar.

During the first season of the church year, Advent, which preceded Christmas, we had new liturgical decorations in the sanctuary, including a stunning Advent wreath suspended from the center of the sanctuary. Thanks to the incredible talents of Darren Hochstedler, we had the chance to experience something different this past Advent. The interesting thing about this hanging wreath was that the lanterns proved to be a bit of a challenge as we walked up and down the center aisle. Even as I tried to be consistently aware of this, I hit my forehead once and the back of my head at least twice. But what I was reminded of is that the birth of the Christ child was inconvenient for the holy family, for the shepherds, for Herod, and for the magi. It interrupted everyone's lives.

What it meant for us is that we had to pay attention. We had to watch where we were going. Every now and then we had to remind one another that the lights were hanging there. It seemed a fitting reminder of how we are the Body of Christ together.

We also were blessed by those folks who carried the light into our midst each Sunday in Advent. They were asked to do this as a reminder to us that God came to earth as the least of these, a baby. And through their stories, they reminded us that Christ is found most profoundly in those society pushes to the margins: the youngest and our elders, the disabled and those without homes.

Elsewhere in this newsletter there are photos from throughout the season. It is always a gift to see old friends and new during the holiday season, especially in church. So, on this night, in what is still Christmas, I hold these memories in my heart and give thanks for the birth of the Prince of Peace.

### VERY IMPORTANT RECYCLING UPDATE

Beginning January 1st, the City of Seattle will be issuing fines for organizations who do not sort their trash/recycle/compost. The fine is \$50 every time they find an item in the wrong receptacle! THIS MEANS THAT WE MUST PUT EVERYTHING IN THE RIGHT CONTAINER!

Here's what is NOT allowed in the garbage: Food & compostable paper, including food soiled pizza boxes, paper plates, paper napkins

and paper towels. These items go in the COMPOST bin, also known as FOOD AND YARD WASTE.

Also, no paper, cardboard, cans, bottles, jars or plastic cups can go in the garbage. They go in RECYCLE.

If you have guestions about where your discarded items should land: please ask or consult the posted charts!

Remember, in addition to avoiding fines, we are working to be a COMPLETELY GREEN congregation, so please do not bring items for use into the building that are not recyclable, especially Styrofoam and plastic utensils. (They make recyclable utensils now.)

### **Financial Update**

The Stewardship Committee, Treasurer, and Office Administrator are all hard at work preparing End of Year Statements/Financials, and the 2015 Annual Budget. December and 2014 End of Year Financial Information will be available at the Annual Meeting on Sunday, January 25th, after worship, and printed in the February 2015 Messenger.

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### **Affordable Housing: Frequently Asked Questions**

There have been a number of opportunities to ask questions regarding the development of

affordable housing on a portion of our property. Thank you for being a part of those opportunities! Thank you for your questions!

Additional opportunities will continue to be made available as we imagine and vision what could take place with such a



development. We hope you will bring your questions, comments, and dreams with you!

Here is a summary of some of the questions we've encountered thus far, and the answers, as we know them:

# Who will live in the apartments? Will we be responsible for screening them and handling the rental?

- Currently we envision this project to house families at risk of homelessness or in need of affordable housing. Because of our proximity to a school and library and because of the shortage of such housing, this would meet a need in our neighborhood.
- We would NOT be responsible for any aspect of managing the building, including any rental responsibilities. Property Management, including all maintenance and rental, would be the responsibility of Compass Housing Alliance.

#### Is our property big enough?

Yes! The developers were very enthused over both the size and grade of the property. It is anticipated that given the size of the parcel, the zoning requirements, and the urban village overlay (which does not reach us, currently), we would have a building of 45-50 units, (studio, 1bdrm, 2bdrm, & 3 bdrm.)

#### What about PARKING?

This seems to be the most frequently asked question. While we would certainly not have the amount of parking we currently have, we would anticipate parking that meets our needs for weekly worship and other gatherings. Overflow parking is currently and would remain at Broadview-Thomsen School on the weekend and after hours.

#### How full can the parking lot be before it discourages visitors?

Church growth experts say that when a parking lot and a sanctuary reach 75% capacity, it begins to feel overly full. At such time when we consistently reach this capacity, we would encourage our regulars in worship to park across the street at Broadview-Thomsen.

#### Can we develop the front (yard?) for better use?

*Current restrictions regarding thru streets and arterials would likely prevent us from developing the front yard for parking.* 

#### Are there other area partnerships that should be considered?

- There will come a particular point in the process when the neighborhood will be invited for a time of conversation. We will have more of an idea of what the project might look like at that point and be able to answer their questions.
- We do anticipate partnering with local non-profits as a part of the social services in the building. We have already had conversation with Literacy Source, a non-profit devoted to ESL classes and citizenship classes as well as empowering immigrant parents to advocate for their children in school.

#### How do we want to use the funds?

There are a number of options for use of the funds, including (but not limited to) investing a portion of the funds to support current and future ministries and mission and repair of the building.

#### What costs will we incur?

We will incur some initial costs, including an appraisal, and retaining an attorney as we engage in the purchase and sale of the property.

31: We give thanks for the ELCA Malaria Campaign and our members and companions overseas who help reduce the number of deaths from this preventable, treatable disease.



# Synod News



### The Hope Light Brings!

**O**ne of the challenges that I face in my life is that I struggle with the experience of claustrophobia. It usually takes me by surprise when I find myself in a tight space in which I feel trapped. One of my worst episodes took place on board a Canadian ferry boat. We were down in the bowels of the ship parked between two semi-trucks when the huge ramps of the ferry were raised into place shutting out all the

natural light.

My chest constricts, my throat tightens, my heart beats rapidly, and I break into a sweat. The kind where you want to rip your clothes off. I couldn't get to the upper decks fast enough.

I also have known this experience in something as subtle as being seated at a large dinner table with people sitting on either side of me. It can also happen if I find myself in the middle of a long church pew. I have learned to request only aisle seats if I attend the theater and likewise when flying.

I have no idea why this phobia has settled into my life. I didn't know it as child and have no memory of ever being trapped. It is something I have just learned to live with. Fortunately for my worst episodes I have medication which greatly eases the panic. What brings me reassurance when I am feeling trapped is being able to see light and to know that there is a pathway. When I am in a tunnel my heart beat slows down as soon as I can see the light at the end of the tunnel. It is a great relief to me when they finally open the door of the airplane and the outside light rushes in.

Epiphany for me has taken on added meaning because I so deeply appreciate the star. The star that leads to the Savior. I appreciate in the dark of winter that we turn to the Light. The Light that no darkness can overcome.

A dear friend of mine who knows how I struggle to get through the darkness of winter frequently reminds of when the winter solstice has passed and each day adds a minute or two of day light. Facing this challenge in my life has given me insight into what it means for so many in our world who find themselves trapped by the injustices of this world. There are so many people who spend a lifetime in darkness waiting for the light to come.

Hope is when you see that first glimmer of light in the darkness. Hope is when you know there is a way forward.

It brings me great joy as your bishop to witness the many ways this church, in all of its expressions, is bringing light into the world.

May your Epiphany journey bring you hope and the reassurance that God provides us with a pathway forward.
