Last month I attended the Byberg Preaching Conference in Cannon Beach, OR. This annual conference for ELCA pastors in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Washington, and Oregon is always a treat – bringing in fine preaching instructors, thoughtful Bible Study leaders, and creative,

faithful worship planners and leaders. It is funded largely from a grant from the estate of Jonas Byberg, who bemoaned the state of preaching in his Lutheran church and set up an endowment for this purpose. We stay at a simple Christian retreat center, and bask in the beauty of Creation found on the Oregon coast.

This year I followed the Byberg conference with a few days of personal spiritual retreat at Mt. Angel Abbey near Salem,

OR. Mt. Angel Abbey is a Benedictine center and seminary, preparing Roman Catholic men for service as priests and monks and offering fine instruction to lay people as well. While I was there I prayed and read and slept and worshipped. Bells called us to worship several times throughout the day, which I found to be a lovely reminder to pray, even if the first bells of Matins rang out at 5am!

I am grateful for the provisions in my call to Luther Memorial that allow for each of these kinds of opportunities. Pastors are provided time for Continuing Education (2 weeks including Sundays) in addition to their vacation time. The work we do is blessed and holy, but no more so than what you do in your vocation. We are all called to work in the Kingdom. I

> think one of the differences is that the expectations pastors have of themselves and the expectations of the people we work for and with may be different than many other professions. It is easy to become weary and overwhelmed. It is easy to lose sight of the call to Word and Sacrament and focus on budgets and meetings and property challenges and personnel issues and meetings (yes I know I said that twice!) It is difficult to leave the work behind when we go home.

It is a 24/7 job.

So, when I take care of myself, it also greatly benefits the congregation. Our ministries and mission are served far better by a pastor who is rested, spiritually grounded, and centered.

Elsewhere in this newsletter you will find information about a grant being written for a sabbatical leave. Having been your pastor for almost six years, it is good to consider how such a leave would be beneficial to us all. And it is helpful to remember that this leave is

being considered because it is my intention to remain your pastor. A time of sabbatical leave would help us renew our sense of call to each other AND to this place.

While I was away in January I was able to walk on the beach in Cannon Beach and marvel at the creatures in the tide pools. At the Abbey, in addition to reading and prayer and worship, I also napped at the drop of a hat. One day I even napped right after breakfast. What I learned was that I was renewed. I was being re-newed. And I thought of the words of Scripture: The mercies of the LORD are new every morning.

I returned from that Continuing Education trip in January refreshed and restored by the time away. I promised myself that I would find time for small diversions each day, even if they were only to pause



for a moment, perhaps at the hours when the bells would ring at the Abbey, and give thanks. Know that in that thanksgiving, I remember each of you and this place, where the Holy Spirit is moving in powerful and surprising ways each day.

From the Church Council

Last year Luther Memorial and Pastor Julie applied to the Lilly Foundation for a grant to financially support a sabbatical for her. While we did not receive the grant, it is our intention to apply for it again. You will hear more about it in the days ahead, but here are answers to some questions you have raised:

- How long would she be away and who would serve as Pastor while she was gone? The sabbatical grant would be for 3-4 months. A supply pastor would be brought in to cover pastoral duties. That person would be agreed upon by the synod and the congregational council. Lilly Endowment **Clergy** Renewal Programs

-What expenses would be involved? While on sabbatical, pastors continue to receive their compensation package. In some congregations, expenses for the sabbatical activities of the pastor and related congregational expenses (supply pastor) are covered by the congregation. In our case, the budget would not support these costs. This is why we are applying for a grant to cover the costs associated with the sabbatical.

-- Will she come back? Yes. The purpose of the sabbatical is for her refreshment and renewal as she commits to continue her service as our pastor. The terms of the grant stipulate that pastors cannot make a change in call for a year after their return.

The Season of Lent

In the Church, Lent is the 40 days before Easter (not including Sundays) and is considered a time for repentance, fasting, and prayer. For some, the discipline of fasting gave way to "giving something up" during Lent. Some folks give up a food, or soda, or sweets. Others deepen their time of study and prayer, giving up the other activities they might be involved with otherwise.

Our time together during Lent will include a focus on forgiveness at our Mid Week worship. Join us for Soup Supper at 5:30pm each Wednesday night during Lent, beginning February 25th, followed by our worship together, "The Gift of Forgiveness."

Please plan to join us as you are able during this Holy season.




Buck Denver and his friends will help your children learn all about the Bible, who wrote it, AND the Kingdom of God and what it means to be a Christian.

Evangelical Lutheran Church in America God's work. Our hands. These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the church.

Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church.

1 Give thanks, especially during Black History Month, for our sisters and brothers of African descent participating in God's work of restoring, reconciling communities in the name of Jesus Christ throughout the world.

2 Remember the Za'atari Refugee Camp in Jordan, a ministry of The Lutheran World Federation that was hit hard by unusually severe winter storms this past month.

3 We are a church together. Remember in your prayers the congregations, ministries and leaders of the Sierra Pacific, Arkansas-Oklahoma and Caribbean Synod of the ELCA.

4 We pray for the warmth and safety of people and communities facing severe cold, snow and flooding during the winter months.

5 As outdoor ministry leaders seek staff across the country for their summer programs, pray for young adults to carefully consider their invitations and opportunities to serve.

6 The need for safe, warm shelter for people who are homeless is particularly critical in the winter months. Send us forth to be your people in the world, inspiring and sharing resources so that all may have dependable shelter.

7 We pray that God's Spirit of justice, peace and reconciliation will turn the hearts and minds of nations, leaders and factions to peaceful means of resolving conflicts and wars, and rebuilding communities and nations.

8 We pray for healing among people suffering in the current flu epidemic, and we give thanks for the skills and commitment of the health care professionals who care for us.

9 Gracious God, we ask that wisdom, compassion and justice will guide the leaders of the United States and Cuba, as they work toward new diplomatic relationships, reconciliation, healing and the reunification of families.

10 For men, women and young adults considering preparation for full-time ministry in this church, we pray for their discernment and that they might use their unique skills and life experiences to I share the gospel wherever they serve.

11 Remember the work of Lutheran Disaster Response, including our response to floods in Malaysia, continued response to flood recovery in Serbia and Bosnia, and support to returning child migrants in Honduras.

12 We pray that the 2015 ELCA Definitely Abled Youth Leadership Event in Detroit will bless and empower young people with physical, cognitive and emotional differences, so that they might grow as faithful, wise and courageous leaders in our church.

15 *Transfiguration of Our Lord* By the miraculous and simple actions of God in the world, we are moved to offer thanks and glory for the light that the Son of God, Jesus Christ, shines in the world.

16 We pray for God's Spirit to enrich the lives and faith of the youth, parents and adult leaders preparing for the 2015 ELCA Youth Gathering in Detroit.

17 Shrove Tuesday Many of us know the comfort of abundance and feasting. Let us not fear selfcontemplation and sacrifice that grounds us in the spirit of Jesus Christ and his compassion for all humankind.

18 Ash Wednesday As we mark ourselves with ashes and the sign of the cross, we admit our wrongdoings and our human weaknesses. Remember the forgiveness and new life we have in Jesus Christ.

19 During this season of Lent, ask for the Spirit's guidance to follow Jesus' example of humility, sacrifice, service and strength in the face of life's challenges.

20 We pray for the eight young adult volunteer missionaries serving communities, churches and social ministries in Mexico this year through the ELCA Young Adult Global Mission program.

21 We are a church together. Let us pray for the congregations, ministries and leaders of the Southwestern Washington, Northern Great Lakes and Delaware-Maryland Synod of the ELCA.

22 First Sunday in Lent The water and word in baptism mark a turning point in life – the beginning of a new life in a community of faith in the world. Remember and give thanks for your baptism and for where God has led you in the days and years that followed.

23 Water is a gift, a necessity for life for humanity and creation. We pray for relief and creative solutions during the drought being experienced in the western part of the United States, and in areas of Central America and Africa. 24 We pray to be willing, trusting and eager-to-learn followers of Jesus through trials and temptations to the cross and new life.

25 We pray that our Lenten traditions and practices serve to strengthen our faith, ground our lives in Jesus' life and sacrifice, and draw us closer to God.

26 We pray for the African Descent Lutheran Association, people of God rooted in the gospel and redeemed by Jesus Christ, committed to living out their faith by expressing their love for one another and affirming themselves and their cultural heritage as gifts to the church.

27 For some people and families, every day is like a journey in the wilderness. Pray that they may find direction, sustenance, hope and the accompaniment of caring faith communities.

28 Lent leads us – invites us – to have conversations about faith, our humanness, what it means to be Lutheran Christians, and the good news of Jesus Christ. 

Blame Game

"Why do you see the speck in your brother's eye, but fail to see the beam of wood in your own?" (Matthew 7:3)

One of the great challenges of living in my own skin is avoiding the blame game. Being right is so easy. Owning my own brokenness and cutting a little slack for my neighbor is so much harder. I remember talking to a

parole officer about his work. I asked him how

good he thought he was at predicting who would make it on the outside and who would end up going back to the big house. His response came quickly. "It is really quite easy to predict. If a guy is still blaming the institution or somebody else for his woes, I can be sure he is headed back. It is the guy who takes responsibility for what has happened in his life who has a future."

I have become more keenly aware of how rare it is, in conflicted situations, for individuals to own their part of the conflict. I have made it a practice to ask the question, "Do you feel like you contributed to the conflict in any way?" It usually takes the person by surprise. Typically it is a perspective they haven't given much attention to. When asked, they often rush right back into a litany of the other person's wrongs.

I know this to be true in my own life. I can be so focused on how wrong the other person is that I am blind to the part I play.

One of the consultants I worked with when I was in the congregation offered me another way of understanding how important it is to see the bigger picture when in a conflicted situation. His wisdom was not to avoid the resistance which is my natural pattern. He taught me to engage the resistance. Engage the resistance because within it you can discover some very helpful truths about the organization.

Often there is so much noise in the resistance, we fail to hear the truth. It takes disciplined listening to get past the noise. This is not easy to do when I am anxious, defensive, and my heart is pounding inside my chest.

Think of what this means for us as a country as we are wrestling with police shootings and increasing racial tensions. Depending upon your perspective it is very easy to assess blame. What is far more challenging is to discover the truths that all sides need to discover.

I know I am receiving good counsel when I vent my frustrations about how I feel someone has offended me when my counselor says to me, "What is it that you need to hear in this person's criticism of you?" I hate the question even though I know the advice is very sound.

We as Lutherans know by our very confession that we begin each day with a large beam in our own eye. We know that we have to daily flood our eyes with the waters of baptism in order to see at all.

If we want to avoid the big house, we must listen to what the parole officer has learned. It is the truth that sets us free.

New Ministry Starts - Encouraging One Another

I have been asked to establish a Mission Partners program in the Northwest Washington Synod.

Mission Partners are congregations committed to mutually supportive relationships. They encourage and support one another so that both are stronger and motivated to participate Marlys: missionpartners425@gmail.com. in God's mission where they are. Typically, connections are made between existing congregations and the new mission starts.

That word support can rankle: "They just want money." Well, yes, money is needed. New missions, initially starting out with no pastor, no members, no building, no office, and no supplies and equipment, require funds. It takes time to develop a community large enough and with strong enough stewardship habits to not only be self-supporting but to also care for their neighbors. And, in this area of the country where a significant number of residents indicate their church affiliation as "none," it takes even longer.

But, support is much broader than just sending a check. Partners pray for each other, lifting up the joys and concerns of the other, on a regular basis. Partners share their presence, providing volunteers and accompanying each other on their faith journeys. Partners offer presents, tangible new and used items as well as dollars that can help their partners be missional. Mission Partners share what they have: Prayer, Presence, and Presents.

Ideally, these relationships are mutually supportive. New missions soon learn that they, too, have gifts that can benefit others. Both congregations are givers; both are receivers.

While our primary concern is that the 20 new mission starts in this synod have the support they need to thrive, existing congregations that participate usually find that they gain more than they give. That's how generosity works!

Existing congregations may also wish to explore ways in which they might share their gifts with and accompany each other. (These relationships need not only involve new mission starts.)

Do you have a strong program involving teens and a neighboring congregation has thriving senior activities? How might you work together to build each other up?

Perhaps you have a member with expertise in stewardship; perhaps a neighboring congregation has someone with expertise in evangelism. How might sharing human resources strengthen both congregations?


