Reflections on Affordable Housing

From Council President: Steve Olson

We didn't ask what her name was, nor did we ask the name of her brother or mom. But when a group of folks from Luther Memorial gathered outside her living room at Compass on Dexter, she managed to entertain us with her bright smile and enthusiastic play. Living room might be a stretch, it is actually a common area for the residents who live in affordable housing on land once owned by Denny Park Lutheran in South Lake Union. I don't know her name, it could have been Grace, but it is most certainly child of God.

We were led on our tour by Beth Borum and Cindy Jackson. It is tempting to talk about "bricks and mortar". There was plenty of that; the facility is well designed with just enough aesthetic flair. It is clear that a certain amount of thoughtfulness went into the project. Due to a temporary vacancy we were able to view a residential unit. It was spare but certainly more comfortable than a cot in a shelter, a tent tucked between freeway on-ramps, or a car parked in SODO. We saw the laundry area, offices for Compass, another common area and even a play area built on a large patio on the second floor. It was not difficult to imagine children playing on the modern jungle gym, to hear their squeals of laughter chasing each other around.

I believe I speak for the group when I say

we were all astonished to learn that there are 90 children now living at Compass on Dexter. We also learned that for the 74 units available there were 600 applicants. It is important to keep in mind that applicants represent family units as well as individuals. I try to extrapolate some numbers from the 600 the 90 and the 74. Even conservatively and with my admittedly weak math skills I come up with an amount that is heartbreaking. These are numbers that spur us to action.

In a sense we already know "Grace" and her family. We've hosted women and children of Mary's Place. We've provided meals and a warm place to sleep at night. We've picked them up and driven them back to Mary's Place, carrying all their worldly possessions in garbage bags It is not a long journey to imagine what Grace's circumstances were before Compass.

Watching "Grace" charm us was a reminder that even with all the "bricks and mortar" God's concern is more basic.

I work in an industry that provides printing services for architects and construction firms. You wouldn't believe what it takes to just get a hole in the ground; the tons of paper to get something built almost rivals the tons of brick and mortar. Add in environmental impact statements, DPD reviews, change orders, financing, etc etc.. It is a complex and time

consuming venture. Grace's unabashed play managed to cut through the complexity.

The issue of homelessness is also complex and difficult. More often than not civil discussions about the subject unravel in the face of the "blame game." Of course Jesus had His own answer to that; in one case he placed a child in the midst of those who thought they knew all the answers and said "be like this child." In the midst of our own complex reasons for taking the tour we were gently reminded of Jesus' priorities.

As I struggled to write a conclusion, to sum up immense complexities that play in my own mind and heart as we at Luther Memorial work toward actions that are meaningful for our mission field, I turned as I often do when faced with "writer's block" to social media. Maybe the antics of Angry Cat would jar inspiration loose. The thing is, the Holy Spirit is on to my game now and she likes to drop what I'm calling leaves of grace in my path. She's like that nun my Catholic friends used to tell me about, but instead of a ruler she focuses my attention back with a wry sense of humor. So turning in frustration to Facebook instead of the task at hand, the very first item on my news feed was this article. I share the link here and urge you to read it. It too cuts right through the complexity and gets to the Gospel heart of the matter.

Reflections on Affordable Housing

From former Council Member, Lollie Ellingson:

On a beautiful sunny Saturday morning, a group of 14 from Luther gathered and carpooled to the newest Compass housing project. The building sits in a busy, thriving neighborhood next to Denny Park Lutheran and across the street from historic Denny Park.



What we saw was impressive! A modern building, it was fresh and fit well into the surroundings. A group of pretty

flowers planted outside invited us in, these were a gift from Denny park members. Inside we were greeted by Compass Representatives for our tour. The lobby area was spacious with seating area at the windows, a recycle center and a bulletin wall for resources, notices and communication. Also this area had a large community living room, with computers, TV, and comfortable seating. A great gathering area, good space to visit, or have access to technology that residents may not have access to on there own. The first floor also had Compass offices, as well as a wonderful playroom for social workers to have interactions with the children to help asses their needs.

The building has 72 one to three bedroom units and 2 units for a manager and a facility/ maintenance person. They are on call 24/7 which means the residents can find assistance easily for any matter and the building is well looked after. We were able to visit a unit on the 2nd floor, (the only unoccupied unit). This was a 2 bedroom, 1 bath unit, spacious, fully furnished with comfortable furniture and kitchen included dishes and cook wear. The unit was bright and comfortable, I could easily picture a family living happily in the space. Each floor has a community room with a kitchen which can be used for larger gatherings like community dinners, or birthday parties. Outside this community room there is a play structure which I'm sure the kids love.

Overall the atmosphere was warm, modern, bright and happy, but the most impressive and stunning fact was that there were 600 applicants for 72 units. WOW, 600 applications, now 72 families have a home. I could feel the joy floating in this space. I get very excited about families getting homes. I get overjoyed that these families are warm, safe and have a space to call there own.

I dream of the day we can be apart of such a project, providing about 50 family homes. We could look out on what use to be cement slot for our cars and know that moms and dads and their children are warm and safe and have a home to call there own, right in our own backyard. We could be a part of a solution to the growing need of the homeless. With Compass taking on the project we could be assured that the project would be well built, efficient, well managed, with services available to the residents to help them transition into a home. That would be a day that I would know we had done something really good, we would feel really blessed.

There is a greeting common to southern Germany and Austria which I first learned on a visit to Garmish, Germany in 2013. The saying is "Gruss Gott" and it means, "May God greet you." It is spoken most often as a greeting, although in former centuries was also a word spoken at parting.

As Bruce and I wandered in and around this lovely town in southern Germany, we were greeted over and over with it: Gruss Gott!

What I love about this greeting is that it also serves as a blessing in addition to serving as a greeting. In all that you do this day and in all that you experience....may God greet you.

Of course, sometimes being greeted by God can feel unexpected and disconcerting. I think



this must have been what it was like for Mary of Magdala when Jesus greeted her in the garden outside of the tomb, where just hour before he had lain. Mary had merely gone to the tomb to anoint the body of the teacher she so loved. It was both an act that was expected of her and an act that was born entirely of love and devotion. Finding his body missing, she was overcome by grief. Someone had taken his body. And so when she encountered him in the garden, she did not recognize him until he called her by name. Until he greeted her, personally.

At that very instant, what could have been one of the worst moments of her life became transformed by a greeting from Jesus, who is God-with-us, God-crucified-and-risen.

As we prepare to celebrate the Feast of the Resurrection and the entire 50 days of the Easter season, this greeting/blessing is also my wish for you, beloved community of faith at Luther Memorial. In every step along every journey, May God greet you.


What's New in the Children's Library?

Stewardship Living

The poet Mary Oliver has a poem by the same title as our newsletter, Messenger. In it she writes: "My work is loving the world."

What does the poet mean by her use of the word "work" in relationship to "loving." How can Christian stewards make prayerful use of this reflection as this season of Lent draws to a close?

The forty days of Lent have provided us with a marvelous opportunity to evaluate the nature of our life's "work." Being reminded to take a meaningful and substantive spiritual "pause" in our lives for forty days is a gift in itself.

Oliver probably realizes that if most of us are asked what our "work" is, we would reply with a description of how we earn our paycheck or take care of our family. In a sense, this is correct. We all have to support ourselves and provide for our families. Oliver would hardly reject that necessity. But her poem also suggests that, no matter how we spend our lives, there must be a deeper dimension to our life's purpose; a way of engaging the world with our loving presence.

For Christian stewards, bringing Christ's loving presence into our work is necessary in order to live in the world as disciples. It is key to living the Christian life in our world today.

The very word "work" connotes a certain dedication and commitment, indeed a certain obligation. This rings true in Oliver's simple line. As Christian stewards, we have a fundamental obligation to love and embrace the world as ambassadors of Christ. The season of Lent provides us with a singular opportunity to examine how well we're doing and to make an even greater commitment to exercising good stewardship of all that God has entrusted to us.



The Spirit

Not a Winter Guy by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



I am not a winter guy.
I hate being cold, which I often am. Day after day of damp, wet weather cuts at me. The darkness weighs upon me. I resent waking to the dark and before my work day ends, it is dark already. I am prone to depression in the winter and have to up my selfcare. No doubt I have at least a tinge of Seasonal Affective Disorder.

My fireplace is a wonderful friend. Life is good when I wake in the morning, put flame to the fire, grab the newspaper and savor two cups of freshly brewed coffee. I know the heat is just about right when the other family members exclaim, "Dad it is way too hot in here."

I am the guy who is aware of the shortest day of the year because following it I report to anyone who will listen: "We had a few more minutes of daylight, did you notice?" Winter is for me my time of endurance. It is my marathon.

One of the gifts of serving in this office is I find myself more frequently in Chicago. Chicago is God's way of reminding me how good I really have it. I might just die if I lived in Chicago year round.

Now that you know more about my love affair with winter you will understand why this past week my

soul was revived and my spirit excited. Last week right at daybreak I heard for the first time since early fall the birds singing in our back yard. I had to turn off the heater in the bathroom to confirm that in fact it was the birds singing that I was hearing.

It was faint but delightful. A holy sound. Once I locked on to the sound I stood silent in it for several minutes. I know the birds sing the spring in. Their song is their prayer that the leaves will return and blossoms of new life will sprout. It is a beautiful processional song right up there with Lift High the Cross. The cross is lifted and I know daylight and warmth are on their way.

Easter for me is more than a single Sunday. Easter for me is when I know that life is good again and that it means me well. Easter is when my soul is restored and spirits rise. Easter is when the birds in the back yard remind me after a time of my own darkness. He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!

For so many of you, whom I know and love, who are going through your own time of darkness, listen for the song of Easter. May you know the power of Easter to heal and make us whole again. Rise early and listen to the birds sing.

My beloved speaks and says to me:
"Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away; for
now the winter is past, the rain is over and gone.
The flowers appear on the earth; the time of
singing has come, and the voice of the
turtledove is heard in our land."

Synod Consultation Committee

This committee does not meet on a regular basis. These members may be called upon to advise the bishop in cases of conflict or alleged misconduct by rostered leaders or congregations. We will elect 2 clergy, 1 lay female, and 1 lay male (allowed to serve one 6-year term).

Synod Committee on Discipline

If charges are brought by the bishop against a rostered leader or congregation, 6 members of this committee (and 6 members of the Churchwide Discipline Committee) will meet to consider the charges. Again, this committee does not meet on a regular basis, only as needed. We will elect 2 clergy, 1 lay female, and 1 lay male (allowed to serve one 6-year term).

Churchwide Assembly Voting Members

Our synod will send ten voting members* to the 2016 ELCA Churchwide Assembly to be held August 8-13 in New Orleans. The ELCA Churchwide Assembly is the primary decision-making body of the church and gathers every three years. Voting members are chosen locally from across the ELCA, representing the diverse communities, congregations, synods, perspectives and geographic contexts of our church.

Together with other leaders of the ELCA, and guided by the Holy Spirit, they discuss the work of the church in the world and make decisions reflecting the challenges we face and the strengths we all bring to loving and serving our neighbors — locally and globally — in the name of Jesus Christ. Over the course of five days, voting members: hear reports and review the work of churchwide leaders; receive and consider proposals from synod assemblies; elect officers, board members and other leaders; establish ELCA churchwide policy; adopt a budget; and conduct other business.

The Assembly can be lively and challenging, yet it is respectful of the diverse nature of the church and the world we live in. It reflects how we participate in God's work in the world while embracing each other's questions, perspectives, complexities and strengths. It provides a time and place for growth and change while remaining rooted in Scripture, tradition, Lutheran confessions and the rich histories of our congregations and communities.

*The synod bishop and vice president are automatically part of this total. Additionally, we will elect 3 more clergy members, 1 more lay female, 2 more lay males, 2 youth or young adults. Of these elected, 2 will be persons of color or whose primary language is other than English.

Resolutions

One avenue for congregations, clusters, synod committees and voting members to address issues and propose a plan for action is "the resolution."

Resolutions help organize the work of the assembly by clarifying important issues or concerns. Resolutions are first reviewed by the Reference & Counsel Committee which will make recommendations to the assembly to facilitate its work, but the resolutions belong to the assembly and may be amended, rejected, or adopted after consideration by the voting members.

How to Write a Resolution

First, validate your idea. Do your research - has a similar resolution been passed at a previous assembly? Will it conflict with the synod or churchwide constitution? Discuss your proposed resolution(s) with other people. Does this resolution address a major issue in the life and ministry of the synod? Is the issue addressed in this resolution worthy of the Assembly's consideration?

Then, write the resolution. There is a guide to help you on our synod website (www.lutheransnw.org/2015- Synod-Assembly). Once you have completed the form, send it to the synod office, as directed.

Next, the Reference & Counsel Committee will review the resolutions before they are posted to the synod website. As part of this process, they may edit or rewrite proposed resolutions, main motions, or other matters, or submit substitute resolutions or main motions.

Resolution submission deadline is April 30, 2015.

Resolutions received up to the cutoff time (usually 12noon on the first day of the Synod Assembly) will also be reviewed by the Reference & Counsel Committee. However, they will only be considered by the assembly if time allows and the assembly votes to address the resolution. (Synod Constitution S7.34.01)

Finally, be prepared to speak to your resolution at the synod assembly May 15 & 16 at the Lynnwood Convention Center.
