Finally! There is hard, scientific evidence that attending worship in a faith community is actually good for your health! Researcher and author Dan Buettner is reporting that attending worship services in your church community four times a month can add up to 14 additional years in your life. If this is true, I



will live forever.

I am the daughter of deeply faithful Christian Lutheran parents. There was never any question about whether we'd be in worship on Sunday mornings. We went to Sunday School, then to worship. We prayed a blessing when we gathered at meals (and still do). It is perhaps the greatest gift my parents have ever offered to me, this being a part of a faith community, a congregation. Because of this, I came to <u>know</u> God before I knew <u>about</u> God.

The point of Buettner's research and of this newsletter article from your pastor, is that

there are real and concrete ways that being part of a faith community matters in your life, whether you are a child or an adult or undecided. Being a part of a community of any kind means that you have others in your life who care deeply about your well being. You are part of a tribe, if you will. Being a part of a *faith based community* means that there are others in your life who care deeply about your well being in response to Jesus' command that we love one another. That is a real game changer.

Because this is what I know to be true: if I join a community that has formed around a skill or interest area, but I'm unable to hold up my end of the bargain (let's say I join the tennis club but I can't play tennis or the Latin club when I have no interest in learning to speak Latin) then the community is not likely to continue to invest in me. At some point, I will be either literally or figuratively cast out.

But when we are part of a community of Jesus -followers, when we stumble or fall or just can't seem to hold it together any longer, the community actually bears our burdens for us until we can. Because it's what Jesus said to do.

When we imagine that it's more important for our child to take part in a Sunday morning sporting event than it is for them to be in worship, this helps us find our sure footing

again. Because not many of our children will grow up to be professional baseball/football/ soccer players or opera singers or piano virtuosos (although so far I know of no Sunday morning piano recitals), but all of them will come to a time in their lives when they need a community to support and sustain them. And in turn, they will learn to do the same.



So, Mom and Dad, thanks for every time you took me to church! How was I to know that you were literally thrusting me into the love of God and the Body of Christ?


As always, it will be a time of sharing in faithful ways what the Holy Spirit is up to in our midst.

Memorial Funds: A Primer

It's recently been observed that there are many details and aspects of congregational life that are not known by every person in the congregation. So, to borrow an old fashioned phrase, from time to time we will offer a "primer" (as in first instruction book) on why and how we do the things we do. Memorial funds are monetary gifts given to Luther Memorial in memory of someone who has died. Usually, but not always, those funds are offered at or shortly following the death or funeral/ memorial service.

The family of someone who has died may indicate their wish for memorial gifts to be given to Luther Memorial Church and/or any other charitable organization. Often this is done in lieu of flowers. This wish is made known to the funeral home director, in the obituary, and to the pastor.

Unless otherwise designated, Memorial funds go into a general Memorial Fund and are used for special off budget projects in the life and ministry of the church. Recent examples at Luther Memorial include the use of memorial funds to purchase new acolyte robes and provide organ instruction to our musician.

Families who wish to designate their memorial funds may do so to a ministry area of their choice. Recent examples of this option include memorial funds designated to Helping Hands, the Intern Fund, and the Altar fund. Designations must be noted at the time of the death/church service, so those funds may be properly moved out of the general memorial fund and into the designated funds designated by the family or the deceased prior to their death.

Memorial Funds are a unique and thoughtful gift that enables our ministry to thrive and grow.


Office Closed

Greetings from the Choir Room -

I have been asked to do a monthly column and am very pleased to do that. Our recent journey through Lent and the widely varying emotions that are part of Holy Week call for music of a particular style and substance and I am grateful to our wonderful choir and to Lennon and Jerry Z (as well as trumpeter Ron Barrows and Katy Sarff's sister and her friend Katie) for their contributions.

As many of you may know, I have been directing church choirs almost continuously since I graduated from college



over 45 years ago, and before that sang in my adult church choir while in high school and in the Choir of the West at PLU. I have directed choirs in Washington, Oregon, Wyoming and Florida, and usually sang in civic choirs in those locations too. All these experiences have been gifts to me and I sincerely enjoy continuing the adventure.

I thought you might be interested in knowing a little bit about the anthem we sang on April 26 (Easter IV). The psalm for that day was Psalm 23, for which a very large number of choir anthems and solos have been written. Probably the best known solo is by Albert Hay Malotte, who also wrote a setting of The Lord's Prayer that is almost always sung at weddings, or used to be. The choral setting we did here is my favorite and is titled "Brother James' Air". I sang this anthem in another arrangement in a junior choir I sang in at Trinity Lutheran Church in Tacoma, across the street from PLU, back when I was 7 or 8 they had the "old church". That is a LOT of years ago!

The Brother James in the title was James Leith Macbeth Bain (1860-1925), a Scottish hymn writer, minister, and religious author. Bain composed both the words (a second version of Psalm 23 by Bain is sometimes sung also, "My Shepherd is the living God") and the wonderful tune. An older musical friend of his describes him as "a nature-lover, a wanderer among woods and hills, a shade eccentric perhaps, author of a number of books, mainly religious, and added Macbeth as another middle name for these publications."

Interestingly, Bain did not have a formal musical background and is not known to have played any musical instruments, but when his friend queried a neighbor of his about his musical activities, this older Scottish woman said that "he was aye hummin' (always humming)." It does make it remarkable that he would compose this melody, but is perhaps a reason for its wonderful simplicity.

The choral arrangement, which passes the melody from soprano to the men to the altos, is from 1935 by the notable 20th century British composer Gordon Jacob.

Here are the words of the anthem, based on Psalm 23:

The Lord's my Shepherd; I'll not want. He makes me down to lie In pastures green; He leadeth me The quite waters by.

My soul He doth restore again, And me to walk doth make Within the paths of righteousness, E'en for his own name's sake.

Yea though I walk through death's dark vale, Yet will I fear no ill; For Thou art with me, and Thy rod And staff me comfort still.

My table Thou hast furnished In presence of my foes; My head Thou dost with oil anoint, And my cup overflows.

Goodness and mercy all my days Shall surely follow me; And in God's house Forevermore My dwelling place shall be.

I wish you all of God's blessings. If you can make it, I'll look forward to seeing you in church.

This will be the third year Camp Lutherwood and their VBS Program has joined us at LMLC.





Stewardship Living

By now you have likely heard of the story of Gravity Payments, a Seattle based company that works with credit card payments. Their CEO, Dan Price, announced recently that he was cutting his almost \$1 million salary so that all of the company's employees could earn at least \$70,000. He based his decision, essentially, on what he understood to be fair and right.



I don't know Dan Price, but I do know that he's a graduate of Seattle Pacific University, a Christian based university. I also happen to know someone who has worked for Gravity Payments for several years. And knowing those two things, I would venture to say that this move on Price's part is a wonderful example of stewardship. It's what he's chosen to do with what he's been given.

This is a choice we all have every single day. For some of us, we have been given much and the choices around what we do with it are many. Others struggle just to get by, but like the widow in the Biblical story, we can offer what we have in service to God's kingdom. Sometimes that results in a splashy, awesome, inspiring, ready for network news story. But most of the time it does not. Most of the time it means that we figure out who we are by what we do with what we have and that figuring out is our response to God. It's Stewardship Living.

So this year when we gather at the Lynnwood Convention Center under the theme "Can We Talk," I will do what I have done all my life: I will ask of God the Moses question, "Who am I that I should go?" I will take comfort in knowing that the Bible is full of reluctant leaders from Moses, to David, to Paul. Some might even argue Jesus.

And, I will stand before the Assembly trusting that the Spirit will provide all that I need for that which the Spirit has called me to do.

And I will pray that those who gather will be as gracious as those who gathered last year and together we will experience the joy of what it means to be the church together. I trust we will worship well, laugh often, enter into deeply respectful conversation and conduct the work of this Synod - to dish up God's grace for a hungry world.

You will delight in journeying with our very own theologian and Biblical Guide Cynthia Moe-Lobeda who will offer us a Lutheran lens on what it means to value the other. Presenter Mark Lau Branson will help us see how the use of Appreciative Inquiry can set the table to engage our neighbors in the pressing conversations of our times. This year breakout sessions and an Open Space setting will provide you with the opportunity to learn critical listening skills while exploring challenging conversations into which we are called. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda

Dr. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda has lectured or consulted in Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, and many parts of North America in theology; ethics; and matters of climate justice and environmental racism, globalization, moral agency, public church, and eco- feminist theology. She is author of *Healing a Broken*

World: Globalization and God (Fortress, 2002), Public Church: For the Life of the World (Fortress, 2004), Resisting Structural Evil: Love as Ecological-Economic Vocation (Fortress, 2013), and numerous articles

and chapters. She is co-author of Saint Francis and the Foolishness of God (Orbis, 1993) and Say to this Mountain: Mark's Story of Discipleship (Orbis, 1996). Dr. Moe-Lobeda was appointed theological

consultant to the Presiding Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and has served as a health worker/church worker in Honduras and as Director of the Washington, D.C. office of Augsburg College's Center for Global Education. She is on

the faculty of Seattle University in the Department of Theology and Religious Studies, Environmental Studies Program, and graduate School of Theology and Ministry. Moe-Lobeda holds a doctoral degree in Christian Ethics from Union Theological Seminary, affiliated with Columbia University.

A resident of Seattle, she loves hiking in the Cascade Mountains and relishing the beauty of Western Washington.

Mark Lau Branson

Rev. Mark Lau Branson, Ed.D., is the Homer L. Goddard Professor of the Ministry of the Laity at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, California, where he teaches courses in congregational leadership and community engagement.

Dr. Branson was ordained at San Francisco Christian Center, an African American Pentecostal church, and has served on the pastoral teams in United Methodist and Presbyterian churches, and has worked with several Christian agencies active in education, campus ministry, consulting, community development, and community organizing. He is a founder and vice-president of the Institute for Urban Initiatives, which works on homelessness, job training, and other faith-based initiatives.

He has graduate degrees from Claremont School of Theology and the University of San Francisco. His most recent books include *Starting Missional Churches: Life with God in the Neighborhood*

(co-edited with Nicholas Warnes; InterVarsity, 2014) and *Churches, Cultures and Leadership: A Practical Theology of Congregations and Ethnicities* (coauthored with Juan Martinez; InterVarsity, 2011). Previous publications include *Memories,* Hopes, and Conversations: Appreciative Inquiry and Congregational Change (Alban, 2004) and chapters in The Missional Church in Context (Craig Van Gelder, ed.), Leadership in Congregations (Richard Bass, ed.), and The Three Tasks of Leadership (Eric Jacobsen, ed.). Mark and his wife, Nina, have two adult sons, Noah and Nathan, and are part of the leadership team for a new Free Methodist church in Altadena, California.

Christina Jackson-Skelton

Christina Jackson-Skelton serves as the Executive Director of the Mission Advancement unit of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The Mission Advancement unit is responsible for coordinating communications, marketing, public relations, mission funding, major gifts, planned gifts, constituent data management and Always Being Made New: the Campaign for the ELCA.
