# PJ's Page

In July Bruce and I will head to the Deep South for two weeks of visiting with family and friends. I go with some misgivings this year, mostly around the knowledge that we will fly into a culture that continues to make space for racism. When I lived there, I didn't see it as much. My eyes were clouded to it. It happens in ways that are so familiar that it seems normal. And therein lies the tragedy.

Oh, there are the obvious atrocities.....confederate flags flying over state buildings; the Alabama motto is "The Heart of Dixie" and we know that "Dixie" stood for slavery and oppression. Racist slogans are splashed on t-shirts and bumper stickers while people defend themselves by saying "I have friends who are black." It boggles the mind.

But there are more subtle, persistent signs that sneak into the ordinary parts of each ordinary day. The way that women hold their purses a little tighter when a black man walks toward them. The way that white men move through doors first, before black men, without even thinking about it. Almost every time. The language used to speak to and about one another is often different dependent on race, and people still talk of the "girls" and "boys" who work in their homes or yards, even when those girls and boys are full fledged adults. And I confess that when I lived there I did not see it.

One of my favorite things about visiting the deep South in the summer is the chance to see fireflies, or, as I call them, lightning bugs. As the summer skies darken in the evening, the first twinkles of light appear. They can be hard to see at first. The best way to see them

is to stand with another person and have them help you find them. Look! Over there! There's one!

There are many ways we can fight systemic racism in our country. One of the simplest ways is to point it out, as we might point out a light blinking in the summer dusk. That joke/phrase/story that is offensive? Point it out. That assumption/suggestion that is made entirely based on race? Call it out. And lest we imagine that we are off the hook in the tolerant, progressive Pacific Northwest, I say to you with firmness that we are not. I have witnessed racism within the walls of our own congregation. It is a systemic problem that comes from generations of white privilege. It is not Godly and it is not acceptable. And until it is eradicated, it is, in fact, our concern.

Another way we fight racism is in relationship. We must reach out and know one another. We must see one another with the eyes of love and recognize that each of us are made in the image of God. We are sisters and brothers.

If you are traveling this summer, may the mercies of God go with you. May your hearts and lives be enlivened by relationships old and new. And may you see your neighbors and friends with new eyes, shining with the light of Christ's love.

# Stewardship Living

#### **Stewardship Living**

Last month this column addressed worship attendance as a part of our Stewardship. This month we wish to address worship attendance and financial support, supported by specific statistics related to this congregation.



Even as our membership numbers have reached their highest point in almost a decade, in 2014 only 23.9% of our membership attended worship. Less than a quarter of the people who comprise our membership found worship to be a critical piece of their spiritual lives. This percentage is lower than it has been many years. This figure is based on average worship attendance as tracked by the ushers at LMLC and reported to the ELCA.

In 2014 regular giving per confirmed member was at its lowest point in eight years. This statistic is slightly skewed as it does not adequately reflect the generosity of many among us. It is derived by taking the total receipts and dividing them into the number of members.

To understand this as a stewardship matter, what we do with what we have been given, the conclusion is drawn that what we are NOT doing with our time is coming together for worship and what we are NOT doing with our financial resources is using them to support the ministry in this place.

It has been correctly noted that there is a loving and generous spirit present in this place and that the Holy Spirit moves among us in powerful ways. Yet, statistics around worship attendance and giving remind us of the realities of carrying out a ministry.

In the days and months ahead, may our support of the ministry and mission in this place be Spirit led and faithful to our call as disciples.


#### **Summer Activities with Luther Memorial!**

### **Support the Phinney Ridge Lutheran Food Bank**

Did you know that our sisters and brothers at Phinney Ridge Lutheran Church have a food bank on site? It is run entirely by members of their congregation and they do



much good in the Greenwood/Phinney neighborhoods. In anticipation of the sale of the VOA Food Bank building, your Council has determined that our donations of food items will go to the Phinney Ridge Lutheran food bank. As usual, your donations can be placed in the grocery cart in the narthex, next to the Welcome Center.

About the Phinney Ridge Food Bank: (from http://prlc.org/we-serve/food-bank/)

The Phinney Ridge Food Bank serves approximately 75 families in our community per week. Our food bank is run entirely by volunteers. The volunteers work hard at keeping the shelves stocked, taking phone appointments, picking up food from the many agencies that donate to us, and keeping the food bank organized to allow for easy delivery on the days we are open.

We allow people to make appointments to pick up their food. The appointments allows us to customize a healthy box of food to fit the needs of their family. While we prefer appointments, we are always ready to serve walk-ups.

The food bank stocks a variety of food and personal care products for many different needs: low-sodium offerings, baby food, ethnic foods, pet food and a variety of foods designed people who are homeless.

#### From Council President, Steve Olson:

What is humanity that you should be mindful of us?

The heron waded intentionally a few feet off the rocky beach. She alternately craned her long neck to full length before crouching low to the water, then back up again. Her eyes watched and waited for a flash that would reveal the fingerling swimming between her tree twig legs but she seemed to be in no hurry. Then, breaking out of her zen-like hunt, she would stab her slender beak into the depths, a silver flash caught and then deftly swallowed, before she resumed her meditation at the edge of land and sea. Creation.

I walk the beaches of Puget Sound as often as I can. I find my own meditation is sparked by the smells, sounds, and sights of the sea. My love for the sea might come from my dad, who walked barefoot on the sandy stretches of Ocean Shores, collecting interesting driftwood to decorate his garden. It might also come from spending my entire life no more than 15 minutes from a Puget Sound beach. I have vivid childhood memories of the lonesome wail of an invisible foghorn and the salt smell that could even wisp to our house on Palatine. I go to the beach as often as I can and always feel the tug of the sea when it comes time to leave. I could spend days on end in the intertidal areas of the Sound and never feel satisfied.

As I walk south from the heron, the bluff above the beach casts a shadow. The sun hasn't touched this part of the beach and moving away from the man-made it is almost possible to believe I am wandering back in time. Despite the presence of Frank Lloyd Wright inspired wood and glass houses above, I can almost see the beach as it might have been 300 years ago; before George Vancouver plied the waters off shore and began naming the geography for his friends and colleagues back in England. I imagine instead of boxes above, the homes of the Coast Salish people who lived here. I can see the men in canoes on the water and the women and children gathering shellfish and kelp from the rocks and tide pools. Broken clam shells, a severed crab leg and even the crumbling stones, pounded by the surf, are part of a never ending cycle that carries back 300 years and beyond. I squint my eyes and forget my place on the historical timeline and imagine how God intended it to be. A time when boxes and property lines did not exist and when Creation simply belonged to whoever was standing there at the time.

It is God's after all, not mine, not yours, not even the heron's, though God clearly intended it for us. Despite our desire to mark off spots on the ground and say "mine." I confess that I do this. Far

too often I become irritated when my solitary meditation is interrupted by a dog happily splashing in the water, chasing a ball or stick thrown by another human being. I credit myself for being aware and try mightily to be more Franciscan in my attitude. The beach is not mine. It is not mine any more than the fast lane on I-5 is mine, or the Express Checker at QFC is mine, or the parking lot at  $132^{nd}$  and Greenwood is mine. We are given All this, as the Psalm reminds, us to be responsible for it. In my reading of Salish practice, there was an awareness of the organic nature of all of Creation. That everything was gift from a Divine Source and that care and responsibility was part of the bargain. As we continue to discern what God is calling us to do in Creation, it is well to remind ourselves that nothing belongs to us, but it All belongs to God, including ourselves.

"You have made us barely less than God and crowned us with glory and honor....

You have made us responsible for the work of your hands putting all things at our feet....

The birds of the air, the fish of the sea and whatever swims the path of the sea."

### **Operation Brown Bag-What goes in a lunch?**

Ever wonder what is in the sack lunches we hand out Monday-Friday, 9-2? Our volunteers try very hard to have a well-rounded sack lunch for the hungry that come by for this program. The lunches are made out of these options, depending on the donations we receive from you! 1 of each from the following goes in a typical sack lunch.

- **Proteins** Small can of Vienna sausage or tuna or a tuna or chicken salad lunch/ cracker kit. Must be able to be opened without a can opener.
- Fruit Fruit cup, applesauce, raisins, or fruit leather.
- **Drink** Juice box, or pouch. Additional bottle of water , when available.
- **Dessert** Pudding cup or small pack of cookies.
- **Grains** Small bag of chips or package of crackers, and/or a granola bar.
- Care Items In the summer we hand out sunscreen.

We are so appreciative that our congregation has continually donated to this important out-reach ministry to our neighborhood! Some days we have as many as 10-15 hungry people that come to our window, needing a meal.



#### **July 2015**

- 1 More than 3,500 summer staff members are currently serving at 132 Lutheran outdoor ministry sites. We pray God's Spirit will guide and sustain them in their work to nurture the faith of children, youth and adults.
- 2 We remember communities around the United States that have experienced damage, suffering and loss from severe weather, especially in Texas and Oklahoma, and pray for recovery, healing and resilience.
- 3 *Thomas, the Apostle* We remember Thomas in our prayers today, that we may follow and proclaim Christ as he did, as human beings living boldly with both faith and uncertainty.
- 4 Seventy-nine young adults have accepted the call to serve in the ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program. We remember these young adults in our prayers as they prepare for a year of service and witness around the world.
- 5 As we are sent into the world to do God's work, we pray that we serve with confidence in God's work through us and with humility as people who need each other to spread the gospel and accomplish change in the world.
- 6 We pray that God will place caring, faith-filled adults in the lives of child soldiers that they will experience healing through God's love and forgiveness and life anew without coercion and violence.
- 7 We give thanks for the generosity of God's people enabling ELCA World Hunger to offer domestic hunger grants in support of ministries that serve people on a daily basis.
- 8 Abundant summer crops and harvests are a wonder and blessing. We give thanks to God for the food that sustains us and the people who plant, grow, harvest, prepare and share it for the well-being of all people.

- 9 We ask God to equip the church, our governments and agents of change to create causes for hope and bring resources for peace and reconciliation into places of turmoil in the world.
- 10 We give thanks for the 352 ELCA ministries under development a sign of a healthy church and God's presence in the world.
- 11 We pray that youth and adults traveling to the ELCA Youth Gathering will have safe journeys and that they will be prepared for their experience of being the church gathered for worship, learning, witness and service.
- 12 Through us, God speaks words of peace, love, justice and faithfulness that challenge violence, hatred and self-interest in the world. We pray that we find courage and strength in the risen Christ to be faithful witnesses in the face of all challenges and risks.
- 13 We remember in our prayers young people of color gathered in Detroit for the Multicultural Youth Leadership Event to claim their story as a part of God's story, to move toward healing and wholeness as leaders in the church and the world.
- 14 We remember in our prayers the young people gathered at the Definitely-abled Youth Leadership Event in Detroit and pray that all youth living with disabilities might grow as faithful, wise and courageous witnesses and leaders.
- 15 This week we pray for the thousands of young people participating in the ELCA Youth Gathering, for God's Spirit to stir their faith and help them discover their call to serve locally and globally.
- 16 We remember Detroit and all cities recovering from economic crises and pray for their healing and an upwelling of creativity and vibrancy in their neighborhoods.

- 17 Fifty-six percent of all ELCA new-start ministries are among ethnic-multicultural communities, and 27 percent are in communities where people are living in poverty. We pray that these ministries and members will flourish as the body of Christ.
- 18 Lutherans and Roman Catholics in the United States have been in dialogue for the past 50 years. We ask God to sustain our commitment to ecumenism as members of the body of Christ and to deepen our mutual understanding for the sake of God's mission in the world.
- 19 Youth groups are returning home from the ELCA Youth Gathering today. We ask God to return them home safely, eager to live and serve with the entire church as followers of Jesus.
- 20 We pray for worship leaders and church musicians attending the Worship Jubilee in Atlanta that they may strengthen their gifts and be renewed in their calling to be God's living voice today.
- 21 For families who vacation during the summer, we pray they will experience renewal of body, spirit and relationship through sabbath rest.
- 22 *Mary Magdalene* We pray that we may follow Mary's example and rush to give witness to the real and risen Christ who gives new life, hope and healing to the world.
- 23 During the ongoing earthquake recovery in Nepal, we pray for the rebuilding of communities, adequate resources and safe shelter, restoration of hope and generous support for the work ahead.
- 24 In all that we do as individuals and as the church together, we pray that the word of Christ will dwell in us richly and guide our every word and deed.

- 25 *James, the Apostle* James left his familiar life as a fisherman to follow Jesus. We pray for the same faith to follow and serve God, no matter the uncertainties, where it takes us or the risks involved.
- 26 In a world with hunger, we pray that we not forget that Jesus has not left us hungry and wanting and that we are called to be caring and attentive to all who live in poverty and hunger physically and spiritually.
- 27 Trusting in God for our daily needs, we pray for a spirit of generosity that moves us to share freely our resources and care for our neighbors in need.
- 28 For the musicians who proclaim the gospel through music and song, we give thanks and pray their creativity will inspire others to offer their gifts to the glory of God.
- 29 In song, proclamation and prayer, we rejoice in God's wonderful deeds of grace and mercy throughout history.
- 30 We pray that people drawn or forced into violence and war against their neighbors may come to know God's love and concern for all people and nations and be transformed by faith for acts of peace and compassion.
- 31 We give thanks to God for more than 500 new congregations that have been planted, organized and have joined the ELCA since its beginning, and we pray for our continued growth and witness to the gospel in the world.



# What Makes for Success? by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest. He sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." Mark 9:34-35 (NRSV)

It is the season for graduations. It begins so soon in today's world. Kim takes care of a little boy named Cooper who now is a proud graduate of Lord of

Life Lutheran Preschool. I asked him what graduation means and he said, "It's when you're done with one school, you get the summer off and then you go to kindergarten." So there you have it!

Graduation is stirring my memories of graduating from Inglemoor High School in 1970. I have fond memories of all the activities that topped off our Senior Year. I was elected to be the class speaker and spent hours working on my speech. The compelling line, "It is going to take a hell of lot more than tear gas and guns to hold this generation down." We were a generation that believed that we would change the world and there would be war no more. Sad to say, we went on to be the greatest consuming generation in all of history. Like in the movie the Big Chill, we

traded in our in our ideals for a place at the table of corporate America.

I was also elected by my peers as the "Boy Most Likely to Succeed." My counterpart was my classmate and dear friend Sara Forhan. Sara certainly lived into the recognition. She became a medical doctor specializing in gynecology and went on to work for the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta. She was a near 4.0 student so it came as no surprise.

On the other hand, I was the class clown and found my way into the principal's office on more than one occasion. I remember Mr. Siverson would simply shake his head and say, "Unti, I expect more out of you."

So, did I "succeed"? I have been deeply blessed by serving as a pastor. It is a humble honor to be able to serve the church and people of this community. I have no regrets, and yet I dare say in the eyes of many of my classmates I have not lived up to the title they gave me. I can already hear the question at the 50th Reunion: "What the hell is a bishop?" Every pastor knows how easy it is to stop the conversation when you announce what you do.

So I asked five year old Cooper, "What do you think a bishop is?" Cooper's response, "A bishop is in charge of all the pastors." (Hold onto your ideals, young Cooper!) But a call to bishop, a call to pastor, a call to be a follower of Jesus is not likely to be something that will impress my classmates.

Little does Cooper know, now that he is a big graduate, he gets to spend the rest of his life deciding what makes for success. The goal of 4 million dollars for Youth & Young Adults, gives us the opportunity to expand our ministries to cultivate young leaders, embrace a culture of diversity and inclusion, and build a robust network of support. **Core values will include:** 

Form faith in youth & young adults;

Develop and multiply youth and young adult leaders; Start new ministries or enhancing current efforts; Promote collaboration and creativity;

Engage youth and young adults of color; Accompany communities & persons living in poverty

Applications must be submitted on behalf of a partnership of two or more ELCA-related ministries, one of which must be a congregation or synod. Grants are one time, lump sum grant amounts. Amounts will range from \$5,000 to

\$40,000. Recipients are expected to establish measurable outcomes, provide two updates on their project. Recipients also agree to participate in at least one online gathering of grant recipients.

**Initial applications will be received until September 1, 2015.** Applicants will be notified and funds dispersed by the end of September 2015.
