PJ's Page

Many of you know that the Seattle Public Schools started late this year because the teachers were on strike. As they walked the picket lines in front of Broadview Thomsen, Luther Memorial served as a respite center for the striking educators. They were able to use our restrooms, refill water bottles, and we even brewed up some coffee for them.

Our hospitality was not meant as approval or disapproval of the strike. Rather, it was meant as acknowledgement that our neighbors needed to find a place to tend to these basic needs and we had the capacity to respond to their need.

One day, though, I noticed an interesting thing happening. The teachers started to sit in our narthex and rest. They also began to wander into the sanctuary. Late one afternoon I overheard their conversation. They were talking about how our worship space reminded them of their childhoods. Everything from the numbers on the hymn board to the pews to the stained glass. They thought it was wonderful. I would agree.

There are those in the Church world who strongly suggest that church buildings are becoming obsolete. That the Church needs to figure out how to be a church without walls. And like any idea, I don't think there are absolutes. In some contexts, perhaps being the church without walls is just what is needed. It worked for years for the early church, who often met in houses. Many churches still do. But in our context, we are stewards of a beautiful worship space and a meeting/education wing that works fairly well for our needs.

We have a new Caretaker to help us take care of our facilities. His name is Steven. (Jindak, our

previous Caretaker, needed to resign to take a full time job.) There is still much to do in our building, however. We have a Facilities Team to help us stay on top of the work, but there is a great deal of extra work that needs to be done. Please look for the list in the narthex and if you can help, tend to one of the tasks on your own timetable. Recently the carpets throughout the building were cleaned as well.

It would be easy to allow the maintenance of our buildings to become a major focus. But we need to remember that the buildings are there to enable our worship, fellowship, service, and community building.

The teachers from Broadview Thomsen are now back at work, teaching the children and doing all of those other tasks that teachers tend to in the course of a day. (They deserve our prayers!) But before they went back to work in the classroom, they worked in the yard at the church all day on Friday. They weeded and moved mulch and pruned. And then they brought us LOTS of toilet paper and hand soap to thank us for the use of the restroom. Finally, they donated food to our Lunch Bag program.

I give thanks for this beautiful space in which we gather. And I give thanks that we are able to share this gift with our neighbors. Remember, in the words of the old Sunday School tune: The church is not a building, the church is not a steeple, the church is not a parking lot....the church is people!

Welcome Vicar Michael Trice!

Luther Memorial has been asked to serve as an internship site for a person who is an "extraordinary" candidate for ordination in the ELCA. Dr. Michael Trice is the Assistant Dean of Ecumenical & Interreligious Dialogue and the Assistant Professor of Theological Ethics and Constructive Theology at the School of Theology and Ministry and Seattle University. He has also served on the ELCA Churchwide Staff and in a variety of other distinguished positions. He is widely published and considered a leading theologian in our tradition and a champion of ecumenism.



Recently, he has discerned a call to ordained ministry. A theological panel and the NWWA Synod Candidacy Committee determined that an internship in a congregation is a necessary step along this path. He has been asked to do six months worth of internship hours over the course of a twelve month period. So, unlike other interns, he will continue to teach and serve at Seattle U. STM and serve as our intern at the same time.

We anticipate his time with us will begin in Advent, at the beginning of the church year and that he will be with us for a year. Pastor Julie will supervise him, except while she is on sabbatical, when he will be supervised by the Rev. Paul Hoffman who will also serve as our interim pastor while PJ is away. Funds for this internship were provided through a generous off-budget gift, for which we give thanks.

In an effort to tend well to our budget, the church office will now close at NOON on FRIDAY ONLY, at least until the end of the budget year.

In a couple of months we will begin our Stewardship of Resources drive which will fund our 2016 budget. It is important to note that even if we vote to sell a portion of our parking lot to Compass Housing

November, let's pray together for faithful giving and ongoing love for Jesus, for one another, and for our neighbor.

REFORMATIO -Sunday-


While Reformation Day is technically October 31st, we will observe and celebrate the Reformation of the

"Sesame Street" Update

Your Church Council has been referring to the affordable housing possibility as "Sesame Street" (no copyright and we apologize to PBS). They chose this temporary reference because it helped remind us that all children deserve a safe neighborhood in which to live.

It is the intent of the Council to keep the congregation updated every step of the way. Always remember, if you have questions...just ask!

An attorney has been retained to represent the congregation in these negotiations for the sale of a portion of our parking lot, and to make sure that our best interests are well represented. Her name is Nancy Cahill.

A fifth architectural drawing is being finalized and it is our intention to present this to the congregation at the Compass Housing Alliance presentation on October 25th. If the drawing is available prior to that time, it may be possible to have it displayed at an earlier date. It includes at least 17 surface parking spots for the congregation as well as 10-13 below ground spots. (Remember, on weekends, we have access to the Broadview Thomsen parking lot and on weekdays we can also use the LDS Church lot.)

The Compass Housing Alliance Board will vote at their October meeting whether or not they wish to move forward with this project.

Barring anything unforeseen, and as things stand now, a congregational vote may happen in November. It is the desire of the Council that this vote take place prior to the end of the calendar year.

Plan now to attend the Reformation Celebration with the presentation by Compass Housing Alliance on Sunday, October 25th, following worship.

On October 18th, we have the opportunity to attend this event at Seattle University and hear

from a number of congregations who have undertaken projects with affordable housing. There is NO cost and lunch is provided. There are a number of us attending from Luther Memorial. If YOU would like to go, please let Pastor Julie or Katy in the office know ASAP. We will leave after worship and can carpool from the church.



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


New in the Children's Library



This book is especially helpful when children ask "What does God look like?" We are reminded that God is revealed to us and joy, wisdom, light, bread, and breath. We have seen God in Jesus Christ. A Geography of Faith: An Altar in the World by Barbara Brown Taylor. In this volume, Taylor reveals meaningful ways to discover the sacred in the small things we do and see, from simple practices such as walking, working, and prayer. As we incorporate these and other practices into our daily lives we begin to discover altars everywhere we go, in nearly everything we do. This book was a summer 2015 reading selection at Luther Memorial.





Another summer reading selection at LMLC was *Rejoicing in Lament: Wrestling with Incurable Cancer and Llfe in Christ* by J. Todd Billings. At the age of thirtynine, theologian Todd Billings was diagnosed with incurable caner. This book encompasses his reflection, wrestling, and ongoing life in faith. It is a profound witness to the Gospel and to life lived amidst difficulty and challenge.

10 Domestic violence remains a troubling and wounding problem in the United States and world. We pray for the protection and healing of victims, effective prevention and education efforts, safety for families and advocacy for gender equality and respect everywhere.

11 It is not by living good lives that we inherit eternal life, but only by God's love and mercy through Jesus Christ. We pray this good news fills us with joy and the desire to serve others with love and mercy.

12 We offer to God our prayerful songs, full of thanksgiving and stories of God's wondrous deeds.

13 We pray this day for ELCA missionaries who serve in partner church seminaries around the world and ask God to bless their work of helping prepare and inspire new leaders for the church.

14 We pray for the United Church of Christ, a full communion partner, and for the continuing growth of our relationship as together we share the gospel and serve in the world.

15 We ask God to guide and deepen the faith practices of individuals and congregations, especially the practices of invitation, prayer, study, worship, generosity, encouragement and service.

16 We remember in our prayers, with joy and hope, the first class of International Women Leaders pursuing higher education this fall with scholarships through *The Campaign for the ELCA*.

17 Our prayers are filled with thanksgiving for Jesus Christ, our Savior, who took upon himself the pain and punishment of death we deserved and gave us the gift of new life – eternal life.

18 Our understanding of power and authority is turned upside down by Jesus. We ask God to teach us humility and sacrifice, and open our hearts to lives of service in the world.

19 We remember in our prayers the leaders, students and faculty involved in ELCA campus ministry on college and university campuses and with partner congregations across the nation.

20 We pray that God's unwavering presence and hope be known wherever people and communities continue their long-term recovery from devastating natural disasters.

21 Just as Simon Peter learned the humility of being a disciple and the importance of service as he washed the feet of Jesus, we, too, ask God to teach us humility through serving our neighbor and giving all glory to God.

22 As brothers and sisters in Christ who know no borders or boundaries to our compassion, we pray that God will strengthen our resolve to care for immigrants and refugees seeking safety, self-sufficiency and places of hope.

23 We pray for new college students, that they may find the support and encouragement of a faith community, grow in their faith and discover new opportunities for service.

24 Like the blind beggar Bartimaeus, we ask for God's mercy and healing in our lives that we may have the faith and strength to follow and be agents of healing – in the name of Jesus Christ.

25 *Reformation Sunday* We give thanks for the faith and wisdom of Martin Luther and pray that we continue to learn and grow as the body of Christ – the church.

26 Fall is a time for environmental education in many schools and outdoor ministry centers. We pray that we will grow in our understanding of how to care for creation – our earthy home – as part of our lifelong baptismal journey.

27 We pray that God's Spirit will inspire and guide young adults who have returned from their year of service with Young Adults in Global Mission and that their gifts and experiences be used in ministry wherever they are.

28 The apostles Simon and Jude are examples of faithful and committed bearers of the gospel. We pray that in our daily lives we will have the same boldness to share the good news of Christ Jesus.

29 As we continue to struggle with violence in our communities, we ask for God's mercy and healing and for new wisdom and insight for finding lasting solutions and peace.



When All Hail Breaks Loose by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



Be merciful to me, O God, be merciful to me, for in you my soul takes refuge; in the shadow of your wings I will take refuge, until the destroying storms pass by. -Psalm 57:1

It was a first for me. I encountered a significant hail storm while plying the waters of Puget Sound. I was on board our boat, Gratitude, with my dear friend Joe Johns. The rains had returned for the first

time this summer. We awoke to a beautiful morning after a stormy night on the anchor. The water was mirror-like as the Northwest fog was clinging to the trees.

We set off slowly to go around Herron Island, eventually hoping to spend some time off Eagle Island to enjoy a seal colony of mothers and young pups. The winds began to gather and the sea took on a bit of chop - but nothing to be alarmed about. The steady rumble of the diesel motor was reassuring as we crossed over the north end of the island and headed back south.

Heading south we could see a storm forming as the clouds filled with blackness. Just as we were about to point the bow of the boat past Devil's Head, five bolts of lightning jagged down from the darkest cloud. I said to Joe, "It must be pretty far away I don't hear any thunder." Just as I got those words out of my mouth the lightening turned into a concussion that literally shook the boat. This meant a whole lot

of water beneath us was absorbing the shock. I could see on my radar that it was raining to the east of us. The dark cloud was moving much faster than my six knots and I figured it would pass by us before we caught up with it. Meanwhile I was hugging the shoreline because you don't really want to be on the water when lightening is striking.

We made it past Devil's Head and into the open water when all hail broke loose. Pea size pellets of ice bombarded the boat. Visually I could no longer see the land on my port side. Visibility was reduced to a few feet. The radar screen turned a total magenta color. All it was seeing was the hail. The pellets were relentless. The storm had still more to offer. Joe looked at me as if to say, "I hope you know what you are doing?" All I could think was, "Thank God for GPS, radar and my depth finder." A person gets completely disoriented on the water when you lose your ability to set your eye on a fixed object. Boaters have been known to head in the exact opposite direction of their intent.

Using the GPS, I relied upon my electronic charts to keep me as close to Devil's Head as I could while at the same time watching my depth finder so that I did not run aground. Off a point you can encounter shallow water for several hundred feet. It is also common to find large rocks in such places.

My other fear, of course, was running into another boat. Fortunately, I was able to fine tune the radar so that I could eliminate the hail detection while at the same time being able to get an image of the boats in the area.

I slowed down the boat to 4 knots and relying totally on my instruments made my away around Devil's Head into Filucy Bay where the storm bid us farewell and the calm

Later we made a pass by Eagle's Island and spotted the mother seals and their pups enjoying the after storm wallowing on the beach.

It is no wonder that the Bible makes multiple references to the power of the storms that rage about creation and in our lives. They represent a power that humbles the human bones. One knows how small one truly is. My rightful place in the world that day was but a cork bobbing in the waves.

Storms teach us why it is so important to have in our lives someone we can rely upon when we lose our orientation. When our best intentions can take us in the wrong direction.

I said to Joe on the way down. "I always keep my instruments on because I want to learn from them in good conditions so that I know I can rely on them when I have to."

For me this is who our God is.

Hearing God's word, honoring Sabbath, living the seasons of the church year may not mean much at the time. But I assure you when you need to place your total trust in them it is a huge relief to have already learned they can be trusted.

One of the great benefits of the hail storm I had not expected was that it power washed the boat so that it was sparkling clean of the salt that had crusted during the week. Gratitude was baptized in the storm. +KBU
