I'm writing this newsletter article on the evening after our Annual Meeting. If you do the math, you'll realize that I'm a bit tardy in getting this completed and submitted to Katy for publication (fun fact: the Messenger deadline is always the 15th of the month.)

A part of what's contributing to my tardiness is that Luther Memorial is engaged in a whole lot of exciting, innovative, important ministry. We are doing all of the work around preparing our neighbors and ourselves to be supportive community for fifty-nine households full of God's beautiful children who will finally have a safe place to call home. We have hatched a Wellness ministry (see elsewhere in this newsletter for more details.) We are crafting new styles of worship services, some on the months with Fifth Sundays and some being envisioned for other days and times. We are anticipating the welcome of our friends at Harbor Church as we share worship space. Your Facilities Team is diligently working on plans for some major necessary repairs in the sanctuary. We are doing all of this while we are tending to the regular business of the congregation.

But that doesn't quite explain my delay in writing this article.

The reality is that our neighbors continue to reach out to this congregation and this pastor for guidance in these confusing times. Since the November election I have, without doubt, engaged with more people who do not worship with us than ever before. Everyone is trying to make sense of perplexing and troubling circumstances.

The best I know to do in these times is to be available as a safe person and space. Because of

the complexity of the issues, people arrive at our door or through the website with a multitude of concerns. But what ties them all together is fear of what might be ahead.

I wish I could tell you and them that I know exactly what that might be. But I don't. These are unprecedented times; times of uncertainty and great change.

But be assured of this: Jesus Christ is the same...yesterday, today, and always. (Hebrews 13:8)

Jesus is the source and foundation of our hope. And we take great comfort in that. But it is not a blind comfort and it is not a comfortable resting place. It is a place that prepares us, that strengthens us, and that sends us out into the world to shine the light of Christ's love, grace, mercy, and justice.

In the days ahead, if you feel a loss of hope, or if you wonder what you can do, or you need a safe place to talk....know that I am here...as your pastor, but also as a fellow traveler on this journey. Let's meet...for coffee or tea or a march through the streets....I'll even put off writing my newsletter article for you!

Intern Update

Luther Memorial is currently in conversation with Trinity Lutheran Seminary in Columbus, Ohio around the possibility of hosting an intern for two years, beginning in summer of 2017. With seed money from a gift, we are well on our way to funding for this intern. In the weeks ahead, you will have the opportunity to give directly to some fund raising efforts.

The internship program is first and foremost a way we partner with the whole church in preparing leaders for ministry. The congregation and the pastor are partners with professors and staff at the seminary and serve as a key component in pastoral formation.

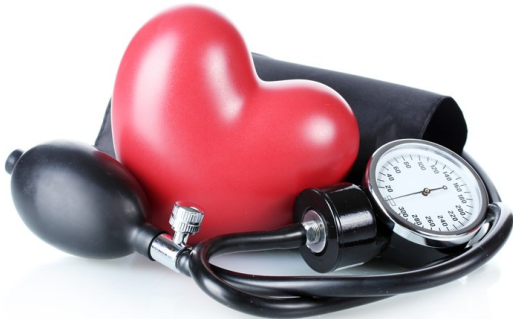
The intern learns about themselves as a person in ministry and has the unique opportunity to learn while doing, through an action/reflection/action model. Trinity Lutheran Seminary is the first ELCA seminary to standardize a two year internship, believing that the additional time in a congregational context benefits all parties.

These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the church.

February 2017

1 Give thanks for all people – and during Black History Month especially for those of African descent – who are participating in God's work of building a multicultural church and restoring and reconciling communities in the name of Jesus Christ throughout the world.

2 Finding affordable housing is a challenge for many people in both urban and rural areas. Thank God for the ways in which congregations and communities work together to help people find places to live and pray that we not lose our vision of a world where all people live in safe, affordable and decent housing.

3 Shout out words of praise and thanksgiving to God for the certain gift of salvation and true hope given to us in Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

4 This year as we observe the 500th anniversary of the Reformation give thanks to God for the work and voice of Martin Luther and other reformers—men and women alike—who were compelled to both challenge and encourage the church, that its traditions, doctrines and accepted practices be grounded in and true to God's word and the gospel of Jesus Christ.

5 Pray that our lives and the work of our church be bright, clear witnesses of faith that all may know the good news of Jesus Christ and give glory to God.

6 Remember in prayer the seven young adults and the country coordinators serving in the Young Adults in Global Mission program in Argentina and Uruguay. Pray for their well-being, that their service and witness touch many lives and their partnerships help strengthen God's mission in the world.

7 Pray the Holy Spirit will turn our trust to God's wisdom and truth when we are tempted to rely on human teachings, wisdom, opinions or ways of thinking.

8 We praise the Lord, our source of joy and happiness, and steady light of hope and reassurance where there is darkness.

9 Pray those who continue to wage war and commit human atrocities in Syria will lay down their weapons and self-interests and redirect their energy and resources to establishing peace, reconciliation, creating a just and compassionate government, and rebuilding safe, prosperous communities for millions of refugees and internally displaced Syrians to return home to.

10 The Presbyterian Church (USA) has been a full communion partner of the ELCA since 1997. Thank God for our deepening, maturing relationship and the work we do together in the world sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor.

11 Laughter and humor are gifts from God. Smile and give thanks to God for people who help us laugh and see joy in life and for those whose humor helps break through our uneasiness with difficult issues, opening us to self-reflection and different perspectives on life.

12 We ask God to remove any hesitations, stubbornness or pride we may have that prevent us from approaching people with whom we have conflict, differences or grudges, or who have wounded us and that we will take initiative to seek reconciliation, forgiveness and healing.

13 In a world of conflict and division, even among people of faith, we ask God to strengthen our commitment to ecumenical and inter-faith relationships and conversations that lead to reconciliation and unity for the sake of the world and in the name of Jesus Christ.

14 Reflecting on God's unconditional love and forgiveness for all people, pray for a deepening and always maturing understanding of love and what contributes to healthy, growing relationships.

15 We remember in our prayers people who are still grieving and recovering from loss of life, home or livelihood because of natural disasters and severe weather and pray they find comfort, strength and hope in God's presence and the support of relief workers and volunteers who continue to accompany them.

ELCA Prayer Ventures

16 Give thanks for the joy that comes from studying God's word, discerning God's will for us and walking in God's ways.

17 Throughout the coldness of winter, we pray all those who are cold, without adequate income to pay for heat or who are homeless find warm shelter, assistance and the welcoming comfort of caring neighbors.

18 *Death of Martin Luther (1546)* Give thanks for the life, bold faith, fervor for the gospel and teachings of Martin Luther, whose impact continues to influence and challenge the church and Christians today.

19 Pray to have the boldness and courage of faith and compassion taught by Jesus, that we may live and act far beyond the constraints and expectations for justice, love and mercy taught by society.

20 *Presidents Day* We give thanks for the peaceful transition of leadership our nation has known in its history, and pray our nation's leaders, and we as citizens and people of faith, work to ensure the voices of all people are heard and valued in the day-to-day deliberations and decisions made by our leaders and government.

21 The Rev. Michael Fonner and Elizabeth Hendrickson are ELCA missionaries in Kenya, and the Rev. Linda Johnson Seyenkulo and the Rev. Brian Palmer serve in Liberia. Pray for their ministries, witness and the skills they bring to our partnerships with companion churches for sharing the gospel and serving neighbors in need.

22 Nearing the mid-year for many teachers, teacher assistants, educators and professors, pray for their continued strength, creativity and enthusiasm as they teach and care for their students – children, youth and young adults of diverse needs, abilities and backgrounds.

23 We lift up and give thanks to God for followers of Christ who have lost their lives for their faith and have inspired the church and other believers throughout history and pray we likewise will be self-sacrificing, fearless witnesses and servants of Jesus Christ in the world.

24 Pray that God will teach us, help us understand and open our hearts and eyes to God's word and commandments that we may follow in God's ways.

25 We remember in our prayers the deaconess community and women who have been called to Word and Service ministry as deaconesses. We pray the Spirit will guide and sustain them in their commitment to justice and mercy, bridge-building with others in mission and public witness to the gospel.

26 *Transfiguration of our Lord* Give thanks to God for revealing to us Jesus Christ as Son of God and Son of Man, our Lord and Savior, the promised Messiah, our salvation and light. Pray we not keep the good news to ourselves or become arrogant as Christians but willingly respond to God's sending us into the world to share the gospel.

27 Turn to God in praise and thanks for the gifts of faith and clarity that enable us to recognize and embrace the good news of Jesus Christ amid false promises, prophecies and distractions that would lead us away from the truth.

28 *Shrove Tuesday* On this day, we humble ourselves and pray for forgiveness and ask God to create in us generous hearts and caring spirits that we may attend to the needs of our neighbors who are hungry, living in poverty and long for hope.

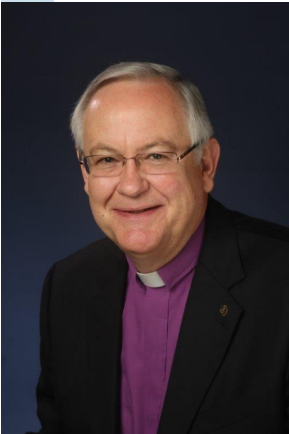

Companionship by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop



What is it about eating together that draws people into deeper relationship? It is true for meals of romance, friendship and even business. Sitting across the table, face to face, enjoying good food and beverage has its own magic.

It works whether you start out as complete strangers or you are lifelong friends. Meal is part of the

glue that holds friendships together.

When I traveled to Ethiopia I learned how important sharing a meal is the world around. The villagers that we visited spent the entire day - from before sunrise until dinner - working on behalf of the meal. It began with the women walking for miles to find sticks for the fire. The younger women were sent out to get clean water. Then there was the preparation of the "tef" which is what they call the grain out of which they make their bread. It was back breaking work to grow which the men did on the hills that they first had to terrace with rocks. Tef has to be separated and pounded and sifted before it can be cooked. Goat meat was an added treat.

The young boys of the village raised the goats by tending to them all day long. A life spent preparing for daily meal made the words of the Lord's Prayer come to life, "Give us this day our daily bread."

It was such an honor and a joy to be the guest knowing full well that we were receiving a portion of the meal that they themselves were sacrificing.

Meal is how we honor guest the world around. It is how we build lasting friendship.

The English "companion," the Spanish "compañero," the Italian "compagno," and the French "copain" all come from the Latin meaning "with whom one eats bread."

It is no wonder that the Bible is filled with meal stories, breaking bread, sharing fish, feasting, celebrating and huddling around fires.

This past year many of us in the Synod who are a part of the Living Local movement have been dwelling in the story of the, "Sending of the Seventy." In the story Jesus encourages the seventy, on more than one occasion, to enter the home of strangers and to eat whatever is set before them.

This is what radical hospitality is about. It is one thing to set table for another. It is something else to sit as guest and to receive what is offered.

Living Local is a movement within our Synod that is based upon an accompaniment model.

Accompaniment is how we discover God together with our neighbors by breaking bread with them. We have living examples of where this is happening through block parties, barbecues, in-home meals and often at place like Luther's Table.

It is one of the hoped for outcomes of our Neighbors in Faith movement – breaking bread together with our Muslim and Jewish neighbors.

Jesus was on to something on the night in which he was betrayed, when he took bread and broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat. This is my body given for you."

Friends, companions, I continue to believe at my deepest level that this is precisely what the world is hungering for – Companionship!

Assembly Planning

The 2017 Northwest Washington Synod Assembly will be a ONE-day, business-focused meeting. It will be held on Saturday, May 20, 9am-6pm at Salem Lutheran Church in Mount Vernon. Read more at: www.lutheransnw.org/2017-Synod-Assembly. Online registration will be open April 1-28. Please note the deadlines for nominations, resolutions and display tables will be April 28.

The 2016 NWWA Synod Assembly voted to amend our synod constitution returning to the language in the ELCA Model Constitution for Synods. It states that the assembly shall meet at least every two years (instead of annually). The hope is this will allow greater flexibility in how we go about the business of the synod, reduce costs, and garner a greater level of participation from congregational members.

The Synod Council determined that 2017 was a good year to begin experimenting. We will hold a one-day meeting focusing on business: reports, elections, resolutions, constitution amendments, budget approval, etc. The council hopes that holding a one-day on a Saturday will allow greater participation from attendees who work during the week. By holding a

one-day event in a local congregation, we will reduce the overall budget for the assembly - and that will be reflected in the cost per person attending. (A huge thank you to Salem Lutheran and their pastor, Marc Hander for responding to the invitation to host!)

During the 2016 assembly discussion regarding changing the pattern from every year to something less frequent, there were concerns raised that as a synod we enjoy and need to gather together. Have no fear! We will meet again in 2018 - but it will take a different shape. We are beginning to plan a gathering that will focus on education and fellowship (no business). This may be one large gathering or 2-3 smaller identical gatherings around the synod.

Too Uncomfortable

Here's the truth, some things are just plain hard.

Using our last meaning of "too," we could say relationships are often *very* uncomfortable whether the relationship is with people or with God. We can push the discomfort away, block it out, try to ignore it, but eventually we have to face it. Relationships can be too (*very*) uncomfortable.

Often the human way to deal with this discomfort is to get angry at the other person for making us so uncomfortable that getting angry may work, but it is not healthy for the relationship. Relationships can bring up past hurts which is a cue it needs to be dealt with and not ignored. Relationships are complicated and messy. Learning to deal with past pain can give freedom to be in the present with our relationships.

We can feel this way with God too. Sometimes, like Tevye in *Fiddler on the Roof*, we wish that God had better things to do than allow troubles into our lives. But, really, troubles come to us because we are human and live in a fallen world. Our choices can be selfish which can bring breaks in relationships. God allows us to have free will and is always available to forgive us.

Perhaps we could move to a cave and give relationships up, but that is a bit extreme and we'd still have to live with ourselves anyway.

So rather than giving up on relationships, maybe we can just remember that they can be "too uncomfortable" and embrace them anyway.
