Back to the Future

It's been a real joy to connect with the Luther Memorial congregation via phone over these first weeks that I've been on board as your Transition Pastor. The conversations have been just wonderful, I've learned a lot about you, and I hope you've gotten to know me a bit as well. Who would have thought, in February 2020, that the only way to meet one another would be via phone, e-mail, or Zoom? Yet, here we are. One whole Covid-laden year later

In almost every conversation, I heard the exact same longing and desire, sometimes in different words, but always with the same intensity: I can't wait until we can get back to worship in the building again.

Believe me, I hear you. Even though I have a much shorter emotional history inside the walls of 13047 Greenwood Ave N, I still love that place, and in the few times that I've visited the building since 1 December I always walk into the empty sanctuary and imagine Pr. Laura and myself leading all of you "just like it used to be."

But here's the thing. It won't be "just like it used to be." Because no matter when we get back, we will not be going back to February 2020. We will be going back to the future.

As we begin to think about reoccupying our beloved worship home, it is good for all of us to keep in mind that things will be different. And, as our governor Jay Inslee has said so many times, "going back will be more like turning a dial than flipping a switch." We will no doubt return gradually, with small numbers to begin with, and all with masks, vaccinated or not.

We will likely not be singing, at least not at first. We will have to think about communion and its distribution in new, safer ways. There will probably be no coffee hour – perhaps parking lot socializing instead with masks and social distance.

And, more deeply than these changes around our ritual lives there will be this truth with which we will deal: we are all returning as different people in a world that's different than the one we left behind at the final service in late winter of 2020. Some of us are slimmer, more toned. Others are grayer. We've all dealt with the isolation of 2020 and early 2021 in different ways. A contested election, the failed take-over of our nation's capitol building and the government it houses, months without hugs have all taken their toll. We are not the same.

So, my friends, what we will be going back to sometime in the months to come is a new, shared future. Yep. *Back to the future.* Who knows exactly what it will hold? Who knows what joys and challenges will lie ahead of us? Who knows what traumas from 2020 might flare or comforts from 2021 might console? What we do know for sure, as we contemplate coming *back to the future*, is that the future to which we return belongs to God. It is held in God's beloved and compassionate hands. No wonder we long for it so much. For all its challenges, God will meet us with joy. For all its differences, Christ's love will be its still, strong self. For all its changes, the breath of the Spirit will still blow through our assembly. And for all of that and so much more, we should all be looking forward in hope.


FROM PASTOR LAURA

It's also been the best way he could think of to connect with each LMLC household in these days when we're socially isolated from one another. LIVING WORD Ministry

There are fifteen or so faithful members of Luther Memorial who have not had an opportunity to access live worship in any way since our services went online back in March. Finding themselves without a computer, or current Zoom or YouTube technology, some of our longest standing faithful members have been left with little contact other than a weekly mailing of the print edition of worship, and phone calls from both council members and friends.

Now, a new ministry has begun called LIVING WORD. Through this ministry, each of the folks who have no other access receive a weekly phone call from a volunteer who reads a devotion that our pastors prepare. In this way, they have been able to reconnect to the LIVING WORD, Jesus Christ. In the book of Romans, St. Paul reminds us: *faith comes from what is heard*. Also, shelf stable milk cartons are well appreciated. The supply in the food pantry can turn over as quickly as two days. What a great beacon of hope to our neighbors.

Finally, our lunches are in need of granola bars, Vienna sausages, tuna packs, and cookies.

ELCA New Hymnal

It's been a well-kept secret in these Covid days, but – YES! – the ELCA has introduced a new hymnal. It's called ALL CREATION SINGS. Little by little, our congregation will be exploring its treasury of new hymns and liturgies. In the month of February, we'll sing *Dazzling Presence on the Mountain* during the Transfiguration Sunday liturgy. Its text was written by our own Pastor Hoffman and is his first hymn text to appear in an ELCA worship resource. On Ash Wednesday, our liturgy will include Thomas Troeger's new text, *All Things of Dust to Dust Return*.

Some will no doubt remember the paperback "blue hymnal," With One Voice. This was a supplemental resource to our former green book. In the same way, All Creation Sings, is a supplemental resource to the red book, Evangelical Lutheran Worship which, believe it or not, is now 15 years old. It was released in 2006. This newest supplement of hymns, liturgies, and other worship resources finds its home inside a lovely purple cover.

FINANCES

Financial Update

2021 Budget Recap

Total Revenue= \$210,621
Total Expenses= \$211, 120
Total Deficit= \$499

Our total pledged amount is \$108,421.32 with 30 giving units and we are using \$80,000 from the ELCA Fund A (parking lot sale) to supplement the budget.

Endowment Update

Currently, the endowment fund has \$56,253.83. The endowment fund committee is chaired by Diane Chapman and the other members include Diane MacKechnie, Pastors, and the Council President.

In 2020, we used the interest from the endowment fund to support the following ministries with a total of \$562.40 going to each organization:

- Extraordinary Lutheran Ministries
- ELCA World Hunger
- Northwest Washington Synod COVID Relief Fund
- Religica
- Compass Housing Alliance

What an amazing use of these funds to support ministries doing vital work throughout the world.
