Dear Community of Faith at Luther Memorial:

Back in the winter, I encouraged us to think about our crawl out of Covid as a moment in which we go "back to the future..." Now that a return seems to be unfolding, that way of thinking about things seems more pertinent than ever.

By now, many of us have been vaccinated and begun to see family and friends. But it's not quite the same, is it? We aren't simply going back. We are going back to the future.

Many of us have picked up plans that were suddenly upended in March of 2020. Some of those are plans to travel, to initiate or complete a project, to get healthier or pivot to a new outlook. But it's not quite the same, is it? We aren't simply going back. We are going back to the future.

Many of us have adjusted to (or rebelled against!) visits on Zoom, Teams, or FaceTime. We've learned how to smile "with our eyes," mouths covered by masks out of care and concern for others. Some things about life are very, very new. Very, very different. We have not simply gone back. We have gone back to something new.

At Luther Memorial, this pandemic year has also been a year of transition and change. When we finally do get back together for worship in the building, we will be doing so as a **new** community of faith. Some familiar faces will be missing. There will be new worshipers to welcome. Even at our recent outdoor Easter service, this was the case. We had visitors! And we looked longingly around the circle of cars for loved ones who -- for whatever reason -- just weren't there. It is a new day.

Of course the Big Story of this move "back to the future" is the story of moving into a new era of pastoral leadership. Who will our new leader be? When will this happen? What is the process? How much longer will you be with us, Pastor Hoffman? These are all questions that I field in almost every conversation with folks in the community of faith that is Luther Memorial.

I don't know the answers to most of those questions; even the ones that I have an inkling about, it is just that - only a conjecture.

But here's what I do know, with no level of uncertainty whatsoever. We are being led back to the future by the one who holds all things in nail-printed hands. We are being led there by Jesus Christ who has risen from the dead. This Easter season is the perfect time to think about where we are heading: as God's people, as a congregation, as a city, nation, and world. The place we can anchor our hope and our trust is that in the future to which we are headed, Christ will be leading the way. And it will be a place of life that is always new.



The LMLC Council, Pastors, and re-opening task force continue to assess the ongoing statistics regarding COVID-19 and how it relates to our life together. The synod hosted a Zoom webinar with an epidemiologist and King County health official regarding our worship life together. We will continue to move forward and continue to keep everyone's health and safety as the utmost concern.

Our 12 step groups have requested more information about when they might meet again. The re-opening task force will meet regarding this request and take seriously the needs for these in-person meetings as they are vital for their sobriety.





#### Our Building

- Remodeled and renovated 1984-85 provided us added storage, rebuilt sacristy, enlarged narthex and offices
- 2019 remodel created a welcoming and functional social gathering with a fully equipped, eco-friendly kitchen area and a separate entrance from the street
- A dramatic and prominent presence at the corner of Greenwood Ave North and 132nd Street, punctuated by an A frame style with one of Seattle's tallest rock walls
- Beautiful open worship space

#### Worship Space that is liturgical, flexible, beautiful

- Excellent acoustics for music and other performing art
- Equipped with organ and piano
- Supports sound equipment
- Filled with glorious light pouring in through east and west facing stained glass windows
- Flexible seating
- · Can be sectioned off for multiple events
- Chapel for small group/individual worship/contemplative/meditation

#### Prominent place on Greenwood Ave N


- Neighbors to Foss Home and Village, B/T Elementary School, Public Library, Compass Broadview Low Income Housing, Ida Culver Retirement Community

#### LMLC's Commitment to Community Outreach, Local and Global

- Involvement in neighborhood associations in the effort to understand the forces at work within our neighborhoods
- Actively supported grant process for addition of 132nd St sidewalk and other local infrastructure improvements
- Purposely frequenting businesses along Greenwood Ave to highlight them monthly and financially support the neighborhood as we travel to and from our church building
- Kaleidoscope: a toddler parent learn-and-play session taught one morning a week. Applied and received a grant to fund this early education program

#### **Feeding Ministries**

- Free Food Pantry whose traffic has greatly expanded during the pandemic and to which we have recently added a larger cabinet to accommodate more food donations
- Lunchtime Program which operates from 10am-12pm Mon-Fri staffed by church members offering both meat and nonmeat portable lunch options
- The addition of an Amazon wishlist that can be modified to meet the needs of our outreach programs
- · Garden plots offered to neighbors

- Annual benevolence gift to the NWWA Synod
- Support of ELCA, World Hunger, Lutheran World Relief
- Past/Current Committee and Board Service of Members and/ or staff

#### Compass Broadview Low Income Housing

- 59 apartments for permanent low income family housing were created when LMLC sold a portion of the parking lot to Compass Housing Ministry
- Dreams and possibilities for the relationship to expand and flourish post-Covid
- Establish a relationship with the social worker partnered with the residents so we might better understand residents' needs

#### Foss Home and Village Partnership

- Group created through Transition Team to explore opportunities to help both Foss and Luther Memorial
- Possibilities of how and where we could help one another are listed below:
  - Plan in place to provide weekly worship service and pastoral visits
  - Share call of the new rostered leader
  - Share custodian and facilities maintenance
  - Offer our building to Foss to use when offsite meeting space is needed
  - Volunteer drivers to deliver meals to seniors who want to continue to live in their homes
  - Use Foss purchasing power to buy food supplies for our food programs
  - Volunteer art and music activities (intergenerational)
  - o More ideas to come...

\$22,951	\$5,358	(\$12,142)

Our primary financial difficulty in March was lack of income, having received only 61 % of what is needed monthly to meet expenses. In addition, expenditures for the month of March were skewed due to an annual payment for King County assessment of \$7,628, which accounts for two years of this charge as the previous year was not paid.
